GRIFFITH DENIES SINN FEIN SPLIT HARDING TAKES DECISIVE STAND ON LEAGUE ISSUE

COMES OUT FOR REJECTION OF PACT ENTIRELY

G. O. P. Nominee Accepts Direct Issue of Ratifying or Rejecting PROMISES TO WORK FOR WORLD ASSOCIATION Harding Wants to Turn His Back on All Proposed Reservations

DES MOINES, Ia., Oct. 7.—American troops have no business in Germany, Senator Warren G. Harding declared here today in response to a question from his audience.

Referring to a list of questions on the league of nations submitted by the Iowa Democratic state committee, Senator Harding said he did not want to be in the attitude of a nominee answering questions when the party platform had stated the party's principles.

"But I want to say to my Democratic friends," he said, "that before they take up the question of ratifying the league, they should consider themselves to the welfare of the United States and not that of the Old World."

Taking up one of the questions about separate peace with Germany, Senator Harding reiterated that he had no idea such a step would be necessary.

"I am happy to say," he replied, "that I have no objection to approaching the solution of the Irish question. I would no more tell Great Britain what to do with Ireland than I would permit Great Britain to tell us what to do with the Philippines."

DES MOINES, Ia., Oct. 7.—A direct issue of ratifying or rejecting the league of nations was accepted by Senator Harding in a speech here today.

MAN FROM UTAH ON 84TH DAY OF HUNGER STRIKE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—While Benjamin J. Salmon, a conscientious objector, continued his hunger strike which began July 15 when he was admitted to St. Elizabeth's military hospital here, attorneys for Salmon today sought to obtain his release from the institution through habeas corpus proceedings.

Immediately upon being brought to St. Elizabeth's from Fort Douglas, Utah, Benjamin Salmon, whose home is in Denver, refused to eat and despite partly successful attempts at forcible feeding, he has maintained his attitude for 84 days.

POPULATION OF UNITED STATES 105,683,108

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—The total population of continental United States is 105,683,108, an increase of 13,710,842 or 14.9 per cent.

This figure does not include approximately 12,250,000 people living in the country's outlying possessions. The population of Alaska and the total classed under the military and naval service abroad are yet to be announced.

JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL BOY IN COLLISION

Darrell Tracy Seriously Hurt in Crash With Heavy Truck

His right arm torn and mangled from shoulder to wrist, and fractured just below the elbow, Darrell Tracy, 12-year-old Central Junior High school student lies at the Bee hospital in a serious condition following a collision between a heavy truck and the boy's bicycle.

Following the accident he was rushed to the hospital where he was treated by Dr. Ezra C. Rich. According to hospital authorities the flesh of the boy's right arm was badly torn, a gash extending from his shoulder the full length of his arm.
