'BREAD ON STICK' LATEST CAMP FOOD FOR BOYS

OMAHA—Omaha kids have invented a new delicacy. They call it "bread-on-a-stick"—probably because that is what it is.
Dean Ringer, Jr., age 11, Hiram Prueks, 12, and Herb Smith, 13, are the originators. They have taken out no patent or copyright.
While Dean built the fire and Hiram skinned some sticks, Hank explained the process.
"You take six tablespoonfuls of flour, two tablespoonfuls of baking powder, a teaspoonful of lard, a dab of salt and enough milk to make 'er sorta like patty," he directed, doing so.
"Then you wrap it round the end of your stick and toast it. It gets nice and brown and comes off in a sorta tube, and you put butter on 'em inside and eat it like—a like a banana. It's awful good."
"We skinned the sticks 'em all come off easy," H explained. "An it's cleaner, too, though we ain't so awful particular about that," he added honestly.

Mayor Frank Francis and members of the board of city commissioners will attend the session of the State Municipal League, which will open next Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock in the offices of Mayor Clarence C. Nealen of Salt Lake.

Mayor Francis has been asked to present a paper pertaining to the issuance of licenses and it is probable that other Ogden members of the board will speak at the session.

A large representation of mayors and other municipal officers from the cities and towns in the state is anticipated, because of the keen interest at this time in the home-rule-charters amendment upon which the electors will vote November 2, as well as in legislation affecting municipalities which is due to come up for consideration at the next session of the state legislature.

CITY ACTS ON BOXING BOUTS

Will Assure Fans Clean Bills; Carnivals Banned; Park Games Eliminated

With public sentiment overwhelmingly against a repetition of an affair in Ogden such as the boxing program in the Army, where 2000 citizens last night donated approximately the sum of \$2500 for seats and came away after witnessing nothing more than a few rounds of languid boxing, Mayor Frank Francis today decided to put the ban on all future activities that might take the money of the people and give nothing in return.

There will be no future boxing contests in Ogden unless the city commissioners can be assured that the promoter will witness clean sport and get value for their money, it was decided. It also was agreed that the commission did not mean to become extremely belligerent in the matter of sports and take action that might interfere with the furtherance of sports and athletic contests in Ogden, but to put the damper on those which smelt unclean. If this is accomplished it is thought that the real sport in the city can then thrive and grow.

The decision of the commission will mean that the future fight promoter who brings forth his mitt artists with a view of exhibiting them before Ogden fans, will be compelled to do some good, straight talking before Mayor Francis and the commission members. He will have to show all of his cards and then give some definite assurance that the fans will receive full value for the good money they turn in to the box office. His word, unless his name is as good as a certified check, will have to be backed with something more substantial than the ordinary promise to give value for value received.

Before a permit will be issued for the promoter to stage his contest, the commission must know that the affair will furnish everything promised and that there will be no feature which might detract from the future of the sport game in Ogden.
