

AGREE TO ORDER WHISKEY FLOOD

Judge Finds No Order Issued
For Destruction of 230
Pints of Rum

Judge A. W. Agee of the district court announced today he would issue orders for the destruction of 230 pints of real, old, bonded, smooth whiskey which was seized by the sheriff in an automobile driven by William Hoff last year.

The case was tried and a judgment rendered by Judge Agee that an order should be issued for the destruction of the flood. The records show that no such order has yet been presented to Judge Agee.

According to Judge Agee the order for destruction apparently was over-looked by the district attorney.

In view of the fact that this certain brand of whiskey had many hundreds of friends before prohibition, it is likely that many will want to be present at the destruction of the flood when the destruction order is issued and carried out. The order will state that the destruction must be made publicly and as a result no mourners will be barred from attending.

The destruction should be made within a few days, for Judge Agee said he would ask that the sheriff be issued an order so that he could sign.

Former Soldier Held for Investigation

Found praying and uttering incoherent religious quotations on the street near the Healy hotel this morning, George L. Phelps, 32, who claims to have a motor license in Salt Lake, was taken into custody by Deputy Sheriff Dick Wootton for investigation.

When taken to the sheriff's office Phelps said he was a discharged soldier and saw active service in France. He declared he was discharged through physical disability. His army discharge book and his status book were carried in check books.

Cards bearing quotations from scriptures and religious poems were found in his pockets. He said he had been working in Montana for the past two years.

Phelps appeared dazed and it is believed that he is suffering from an abnormal mental condition. He had no money, but carried a check book.

Deputy Wootton said that an effort will be made to have the man cared for through the army. Phelps said he is now receiving a small compensation from the government.

Stolen Foods Found; Two Men Arrested

Detective Robert Chambers and Patrolman Ezra Farr, this morning recovered an overcoat and a leather satchel which were stolen from an automobile belonging to J. C. Gephart of Tremonton, Utah last night and arrested the alleged thieves.

Shortly after the theft of the coat and grip, Patrolman Farr located the coat, which had been sold to a second hand dealer.

This morning, Detective Chambers was seeking information regarding the man who sold the coat and while in a second hand store in search of the grip, he found Malcolm Ingles trying to sell a grip. The man attempted to peddle the grip to the detective when another man rushed in and told Detective Chambers that the peddler of the stolen coat was across the street. This fellow was arrested. He gave the name of John McDonald.

Ingles, who followed the detective, was taken in tow. Both men admitted the theft, say the police. They will appear before the city court tomorrow morning.

Says Wife in Mental Hospital; Asks Divorce

Alleging that his wife is permanently insane and has been confined in the Strosari state mental hospital for the last five years, William H. Mankopf has filed suit for divorce in the district court from Lucretia A. Mankopf.

The complaint sets forth that the couple was married in Memphis, Missouri, and have two children. More than five years ago, it is alleged, Mrs. Mankopf was adjudged insane and ordered confined in the mental hospital at Fulton, Miss. It is said there is no hope for a cure.

Mr. Mankopf explains that he has paid \$30 a month for her support and will continue to do so in the future. He asks that the marriage bonds be dissolved and the children be given in his custody.
