Report Says Insurgents Have Proclaimed New Russian Government

POLISH ARMISTICE NOT YET SIGNED

Bolsheviks Open New Offensive Against Foes In Word From Riga

WARSAW, Oct. 8.—A new insurrection against the Russian soviet government has broken out in the district of Nizhni-Novgorod, 265 miles north-east of Moscow, according to information reaching this city.

NEW GOVERNMENT. The insurgents, the advisers state, have proclaimed a new government, the members of which are Martyn Petrovski and Gavrilov and Mito Miro Spiridonov, the latter a noted woman revolutionary leader, for years active in the movement against the imperial regime.

RED LEADERS KILLED. Insurgents, led by "white" officers, have occupied Tomsk, Siberia, and killed several red commissaries, according to the Petrograd Izvestia, as quoted in a Helmsford dispatch to the Times.

NO ARMISTICE YET. RIGA, Oct. 9.—Delegates of Poland and soviet Russia who held a long session last night in an effort to reach an agreement for an armistice resumed their attempts today.

NEW OFFENSIVE. LONDON, Oct. 9.—Bolshevik reports at Riga indicate a new offensive against the Poles by the bolsheviks, says the Daily Mail's correspondent in that city.

STORY OF JAP MILITARY RULE IN SIBERIA TOLD

Correspondent Visits Scenes in District Where Nippon Is Maintaining Army

VILLAGES DESTROYED, MANY MADE ORPHANS

Hatred Causing Residents to Join Bolsheviki, Writer Declares

VLADIVOSTOK, Russian Siberia.—(By Messenger and Mail.)—I am just back from a thousand-mile trip—each way—to the ruined city of Nikolayevsk, scene of a recent massacre of Japanese soldiers and "White" Russians by the Bolsheviki.

No other newspaper man has been able to visit that district of horror and desolation. Around it the Japanese army draws a ring of bayonets. Travel overland and by steamer alike are forbidden. All commerce is cut off. By fortuitous circumstances I went with the Red Cross steamer Erivan, carrying relief to Russian refugees. No other vessel has reached there, except army transports from Japan.

To understand the ominous world-importance of what is now happening over here, you must realize what has happened since 1917—and visualize definitely the big map of Eastern Asia. The maritime province of Siberia stretches like a gigantic fringe—50 to 200 miles deep—along more than 2000 miles of irregular coast bordering the Sea of Japan, the Gulf of Tartary, the Sea of Okhotsk and the north Pacific ocean. It runs from Korea (gobbled by Japan in 1910) clear to the frozen Arctic.

VLADIVOSTOK is its ocean port, the outlet to the sea for a vast Siberian hinterland. This great maritime province Japan has seized. She rules it with military terror. Behind it, to the west, is the large Amur province, which almost touches upon the mouth of the Amur river. It is fertile for colonization and rich in minerals.

JAPAN ALSO PRUSSIANIZED IT. This, also, Japan has grabbed and Prussianized. Behind it, yet to be held when the allies sent their joint expedition for the avowed purpose of helping 60,000 stranded Czech soldiers get out of Siberia. Each ally has to furnish 60,000 soldiers—and through some route to guard and operate the railroad while the Czechs came through, and then leave Siberia.
