

OGDEN CHURCH WINS BANNER

First Christian Has Largest Representation at Endeavorer's Meeting

Members of the First Christian church of Ogden last night brought to this city a large banner awarded them at the state convention of the Utah Christian Endeavor union in Salt Lake, for the best out-of-town representation from any Utah city. The convention closed last night after the most largely attended sessions ever held in Utah.

Yesterday afternoon, between 3 and 4 o'clock, Mrs. Edna Flandro, state junior superintendent, conducted a junior rally at which many Ogden members were present. Earlier in the day Mrs. Rocco C. Whitley of Ogden conducted a sunrise prayer meeting.

Plans were put under way for the participation of Utah Christian Endeavorers at the international convention at New York City next July by the formation of a Utah-New York club. Elaborate arrangements have already been made for the entertainment of delegates to the New York meeting. A southwestern federation special will take the Christian Endeavorers from Utah, southern Wyoming, Texas, Colorado, New Mexico and the other states in the southwestern federation to the convention. Scenic trips to Niagara Falls, the Great Lakes, Lake Champlain, the Hudson river and other picturesque places are in the route of travel for the special train.

Dr. George E. Davies of the First Presbyterian church of Salt Lake conducted the devotional services after John Cecil led in a song service. Special music was furnished by the ladies' orchestra of Ogden.

Mr. Breg installed the new officers, Miss Nina McArthur, president, spoke on behalf of the officers. Other chief executives are John Thomas, vice president; Miss Edith William, secretary, and George Garnick, treasurer.

WILL TALK AT HEALTH SESSION

Miss Sophie Larsen, Ogden Nurse to Address State Meeting

Miss Sophie K. Larsen, public health nurse of Ogden, under whose supervision a tuberculosis survey of Weber county is being conducted, will be one of the principal speakers today at the annual meeting of the Utah Public Health association in Salt Lake, which opens at 4 o'clock in the Hotel Utah.

Miss Larsen will tell of conditions in Ogden and Weber county in regard to tuberculosis and will also outline other public health activities conducted since she has been stationed here.

The story of Utah's first Christmas seal sale, conducted eight years ago by the federated club women, will be told by Mrs. A. J. Gorham, director of the initial campaign.

That first sale raised \$1000 as Utah's share toward the national fight against tuberculosis. This money was turned in by the various clubs to what was known as the Red Cross fund, which was devoted entirely to anti-tuberculosis work. The club women were so successful in conducting the first sale that they were given charge of the campaign the second year. As an outgrowth of these two preliminary sales the Utah Public Health association was organized.

Mrs. Gorham's recital of the early history of the Christmas seal sale will be only one of the features on the program, which includes an address by United States Senator Reed Smoot on "Public Health, a National Asset." James Buck, western representative of the National Tuberculosis association, will be the principal out-of-town speaker. He will discuss the 1920 Seal Sale.

Mutuals Sessions To Start Wednesday

The opening sessions of the Mutual Improvement association in all the city wards of the Ogden, North Ogden and Weber stakes will be held Wednesday evening at 7:30 o'clock. An invitation is extended to all young men and young women of "Mutual" age to attend.

Officers of the organization announce that the course of studies is exceptionally interesting and attractive this year. The program for the season includes many social features, in addition to the studies.

It is expected that a special program will be a feature of the opening session in most of the wards. The meetings in the county wards will be held Sunday evenings as usual.

TWO SHOOTING AFFRAYS AT TRINIDAD; ONE KILLED

TRINIDAD, Colo., Oct. 11.—Sam Duran, a Mexican coal miner, is in the hospital with a bullet wound in his neck and face and John Davis, proprietor of a pool hall at Tabasco, a coal camp, is in jail, having surrendered himself voluntarily. Davis says he shot the Mexican when the latter attacked him with a knife and used abusive language in the presence of Davis' wife.

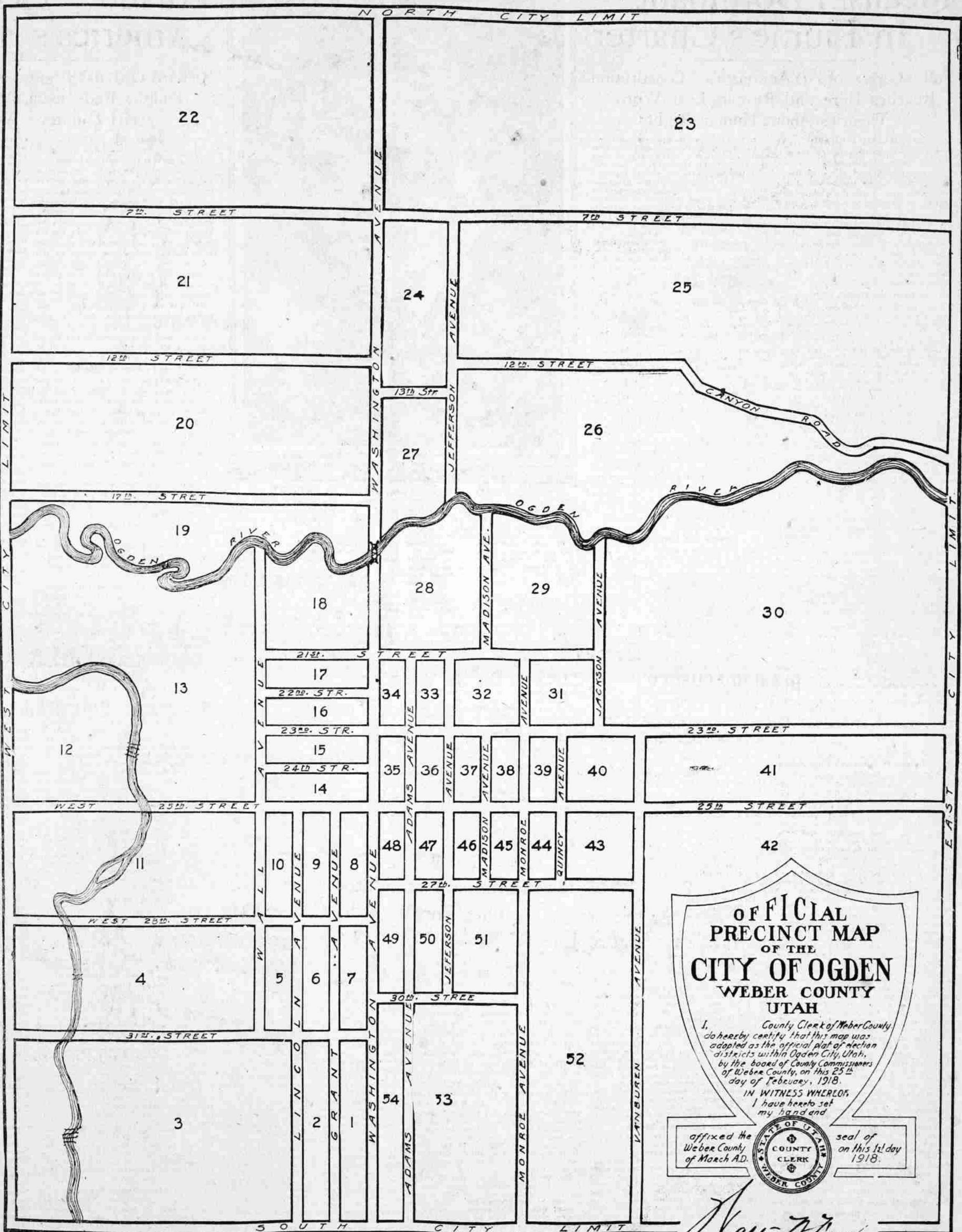

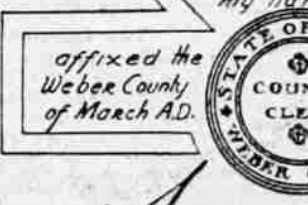
