Widow of William Fife, Ogden Architect Dies in 57th Year

Mrs. Elizabeth Stewart Fife, widow of William W. Fife, architect of Ogden, died yesterday afternoon at her home, 2125 Adams avenue, at 12:30 o'clock. Mrs. Fife was the daughter of the late Bishop Isaac M. Stewart of Draper, at which place she was born September 3, 1862. Following her marriage on December 7, 1882, she moved to Ogden, where she had resided since.

Mrs. Fife's husband died in 1897, leaving her with six sons and one daughter, all of whom survive her. They are William S. Fife of Metropolitan, Nev.; Isaac D. Fife of Salt Lake; Leland Fife of Magna; Mrs. Fretta E. Lindsay, of Ogden; Randolph W. Fife, of Kansas; and Walter W. and Joseph E. Fife, now attending college in Iowa. Mrs. Fife was a sister of the late Isaac J. Stewart of Rexburg, Idaho; Professor William M. Stewart of the University of Utah and Joshua Stewart of Salt Lake. She is survived by the following brothers and sisters: Judge J. Z. Stewart, and Mrs. Richard A. Ballantyne, of Logan; Mrs. E. H. Strimmgelow; Mrs. John D. Fife; Mrs. James B. Porter; Mrs. A. H. Taylor; Judge S. W. Stewart and Attorney C. E. and Bernard J. Stewart, Salt Lake. Also thirteen grandchildren. Funeral services will be held in the Fourth Ward chapel at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Bishop H. E. Lund will officiate. The body may be viewed at the home Tuesday and Wednesday.

RICHARDS MAY GET BIG PLUM

Former Ogden Man Recommended for State Prohibition Director

Lorenzo Richards of Ogden, has been recommended for the position of federal prohibition director of Utah to succeed Mathoniah Thomas, who resigned when nominated by the Democratic party as a candidate for congress from the second district.

Mr. Richards is a native of Ogden, and for a short time was Democratic county chairman here, following his return from Washington, where he was secretary to Senator W. H. King. He subsequently took up residence in Salt Lake, where he is now a member of the law firm of Richards & Mitchell.

Mr. Richards is a former service man, having served during the world war in the U. S. naval aviation corps. Mr. Richards is endorsed by Senator King, Congressman James H. Mays and Milton H. Welling; Mathoniah Thomas, former prohibition director; Mayor C. Clarence Nielsen of Salt Lake, and Mayor Frank Francis of Ogden.

DR. M'KEEVER TO TALK HERE

Noted Educator Will Deliver Series of Lectures in Ogden Wednesday

Superintendent W. Karl Hopkins of the Ogden school system has completed arrangements with Dr. William A. McKeever of the University of Kansas to spend Wednesday in Ogden as a guest of the schools of the city. Dr. McKeever is scheduled to arrive in Ogden from the east shortly after 10 o'clock on Union Pacific train 19, after which he will be taken over the city in an automobile.

He will address the students of the Ogden high school at 11 o'clock; his subject to be "What is Your Measure?" Following the address at the high school, Dr. McKeever will deliver an address before the Ogden Rotarians at their weekly luncheon Wednesday afternoon at the Weber club. In his address to the Rotarians he will speak on "Rounding up the Boy." In the afternoon he will address all teachers of the Ogden schools at the Ogden high school. This address will be made at 2:30 o'clock. "The School as Life and Progress" as the theme chosen for the teachers meeting by Dr. McKeever.

At the Tabernacle under the auspices of the Federation of Women's clubs, Dr. McKeever will deliver an address on "The Young and Creative Democracy." His evening lecture will be free to the public.

Night School Work Will Start Tonight

Regular night school classes at the Ogden high school will start this evening, according to Supt. W. Karl Hopkins. More than 400 students registered for the various courses at the school last week and more than 200 more are expected to enter the school during the present week. The greatest variety ever offered in the history of the night schools in this city have been arranged for.

Instructors from the University of Utah will have direct charge of the University extension classes. Students taking courses in this department will receive university credits.

Classes will be held Monday and Thursday evening of each week.

Recovers Rifle Lost More Than Year Ago

J. M. McCannatt, 2335 Washington avenue, is jubilant today over the recovery of a rifle stolen from his home between May 8 and 29, 1919.

The police were notified last week that a rifle had been found in a clump of brush near a tennis court on Twenty-third street, between Washington and Adams avenues.

A careful search was made to discover who had hidden the gun, and the purpose for hiding the rifle. No clue as to the owner of the rifle could be found.

A report of the incident was given in the newspapers and McCannatt read of the rifle which was found. He gave an accurate description of the weapon which was turned over to him.

"He got it just in time to oil it up and get ready for a deer hunt," one of the officers stated.

Appeals Dance Case To District Court

Appeal of the case of Steve Gray, who was recently fined \$10 by Judge D. R. Roberts of the city court on a charge of unlawfully conducting a public dance hall in the basement of the Merion hotel without a license, was filed in the district court today.

The conviction of Gray was made under the recently passed dance hall ordinance which the city commission ratified May 11, 1920. The appeal of the case is expected to attack the constitutionality of the ordinance, for its provisions set forth plainly that no dance hall must be conducted without a license and the license can only be obtained where investigation has first been made by the department of public safety.

Provide Showers for High School Athletes

Ogden high school athletes will have advantage of improved shower bath equipment from now on, it was announced today. Because of the inadequacy of the old shower bath arrangement, it was decided that new equipment should be installed.

Six showers have been completed, a waterproof flooring has been placed and the showers are now ready for use. Athletes experienced difficulty during the first part of the football season in taking shower baths following their daily practice, it is reported.

Veteran Returned to Home at Sawtelle

Garrison Crane, 53 years of age, a Civil War veteran who was taken from a train here a week ago, suffering from weakness and who had lost a railroad ticket which he said was to take him to the east to visit relatives, has been sent back to the old Soldiers' Home in Sawtelle, Cal., from where he started his journey.

The man, outwitted by old age and travel, was in pitiable condition when he reached Ogden. He had no ticket and practically no funds. During his period here he was cared for at the county jail while efforts were made to obtain funds with which to send him back to the California home.

Transportation was furnished him yesterday by the Southern Pacific railroad with the understanding that he would reimburse the railroad from his pension money. Deputy Sheriff Jay West took the old man to the depot and placed him safely on the train.

The illness of the man made it impossible for him to continue the trip east unaccompanied and it was decided that he would be better cared for through being returned to the soldiers' home.

Inspects Roads in South Part of State

E. E. Kidder of the United States bureau of public roads has returned from an inspection tour of roads in southern Utah. Mr. Kidder reports that the survey of the Beaver-Potter Lake road has been completed and that work on this project will be started during the coming spring. This road is 14 to 12 miles long.

The Cedar-Long Valley dirt road of 19 miles is now under course of construction. This work is being done by men working in that vicinity, Mr. Kidder reports.



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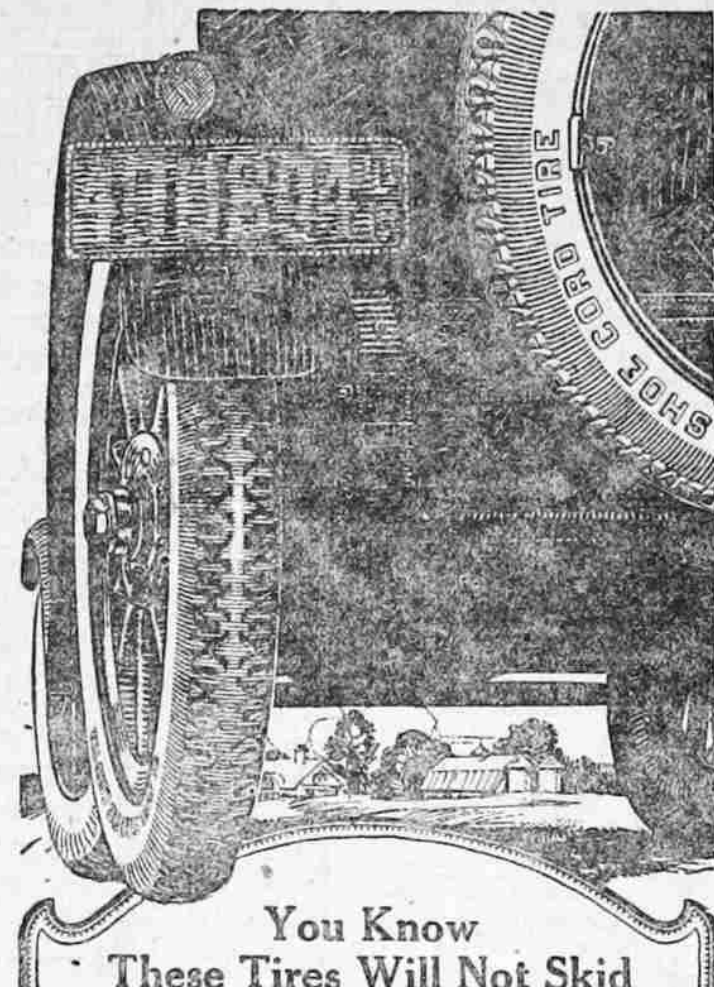

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Showers General in North Part of State

Although deluges of rain, interspersed with hail, fell on Ogden and vicinity yesterday and last night, the official weather record today shows the precipitation to have been but 77 of an inch. The storms were reported general over the northern portion of the state and Davis county was given even a more severe drenching than Weber county.

Fair is again predicted for this section tonight and tomorrow, according to the weather report which arrived in Ogden this morning. Frost is scheduled for the central portion of the state.

Scores of motorists returning from the conference in Salt Lake last night were drenched, even though side curtains were securely fastened. The rain was so intense that it swept in through the smallest crack and splattered over the occupants of the machines. Several cars were compelled to halt by the roadside and await a lull in the downpour when the water poured in on their engines and short-circuited the wiring.

Section of Lincoln Highway in Bad Shape

Roads in Nevada are in bad condition, according to Senior Highway Engineer W. N. Erickstad, who returned yesterday from an inspection of roads between Salt Lake City and Carson City, Nevada, over the Lincoln highway for the United States bureau of public roads.

Mr. Erickstad reports progress on the roads near Ely and on the road between Austin and Fallon.

During the present year the state of Nevada has completed four projects according to Mr. Erickstad. The work done by the state of Utah on the Lincoln highway at Fisher's pass is regarded as an ideal piece of work, he said. The road between Salt Lake and Carson City, with few exceptions, he reports in bad condition, the roads through the mountains being far superior to those in the desert sections.
