LONDON, Oct. 12.—Leaders of the Sinn Fein movement regard the speech made at Carnarvon, Wales, on Sunday by Premier Lloyd George as almost a "declaration of war on Ireland," says the Dublin correspondent of the London Times.

KILLED AND WOUNDED

BALLINDERRY, Ireland, Oct. 12.—Constables Kenny and Crawford were shot dead and a sergeant and two other constables were badly wounded when a police motor car running between Liscomon to Ballahaderone, county of Mayo, was fired upon today.

RAID BY POLICE

LONDON, Ireland, Oct. 12.—Following a raid by the police and military on Hancock Falls, Bogside, a nationalist district in Sunday night in which two men were arrested charged with having seditious literature in their possession, a threatening crowd followed the police and their captives to the station. Shots in the air failed to disperse the gathering and the police and military charged with clubs and bayonets, driving the nationalists back to their quarters.

WARDEN KIDNAPED

CORK, Oct. 11.—The first known case of an attack on an Irish prison official, occurred yesterday when Thomas Griffin, warden in the Cork jail was kidnaped. No trace of him has been found.

NEW TRIAL ORDERED IN ALLEGED SLAYER'S CASE

WINE PARTY AT HOME LEADS TO SEVERAL DEATHS

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia., Oct. 12.—Two people died here early this morning from poison in some form, taken during a wine party at the home of J. E. McPherson. McPherson was the first to die and his death was quickly followed by that of another. It is reported there are six others dead, but owing to the confusion and excitement following the death of McPherson and the hurried departure of the guests, the authorities have been unable to verify this report.

ATTEMPTS OF PRISONERS TO GET AWAY FAIL

Three Rescued After Leaving Alcatraz Island on Rough Raft

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 12.—Attempts of three military prisoners to escape on an improvised log raft from the army disciplinary barracks on Alcatraz island, in San Francisco bay, failed today when they were rescued at dawn by a ferry boat, nearly senseless from submergence and all night exposure.

BISBEE SUBURB SWEEP BY DISASTROUS BLAZE

BISBEE, Ariz., Oct. 12.—The town of Lowell, a Bisbee suburb, today is seeking to bring order out of the chaos caused by a disastrous fire which last night destroyed half the town, sweeping through a dozen of more business places and causing a loss which Fire Chief Wilson estimated at a quarter of a million dollars.

EXPOSITION DEBT PAID BY ACTION OF CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—Bonds totalling approximately \$2,000,000 the last of three \$5,000,000 issued by the city of Chicago to finance the world's Columbian exhibition in 1893, will be redeemed January 1, George F. Harding, city comptroller, announced here.

LOS ANGELES BANKS AID SOUTHWEST COTTON CROP

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 12.—All banks of Los Angeles have joined in an arrangement to finance the cotton crop of California, Arizona and New Mexico to the extent of \$2,500,000, according to an announcement today by J. Dalbey, vice president of the First National bank.

Night Riders Alarm the South Where Cost of Cotton Angers Producers

GRAIN DEALERS HOPE TO QUIET DISCONTENT

Farmers Meet in Capital to Discuss Problem of Falling Prices

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 12.—The shooting to death yesterday of a negro guard at a cotton gin in Arkansas, numerous fires of undetermined origin in which cotton has been destroyed and widespread threats of night riders to burn gins whose owners ignore warnings to discontinue operations until the staple reaches a price of forty cents a pound have resulted in the issuance of proclamations by Governors Brough, of Arkansas, and Vihby, of Alabama, and statements of their position by Governors Dorsey, of Georgia, and Cooper, of South Carolina.

WOOL YARN DROPS

MONTREAL, Oct. 12.—The retail price of Canadian woolen yarn made a sensational drop this week when the price of the cheapest grade came down from \$3.25 a pound to \$1.35. This is the first manufactured article which reflects the very low values of real wool, although it is thought by wool manufacturers here that goods by the yard will soon be brought down also by the action of American manufacturers.

FATHER ADMITS HE KILLED HIS TWO DAUGHTERS

LANSING, Mich., Oct. 12.—Earl Roop, a farmer living near here, today confessed, according to Sheriff Silsbee, that late yesterday he chloroformed his two daughters, aged two and three years, and buried their bodies in the bed of the Red Cedar river, a short distance from his home.

CAPITAL SEES END OF SOVIET RULE IN RUSSIA

What Will Take Place of Bolshevism Is Question Now Asked
