PARLEY P. IS N. Y. SPEAKER

Tells Gotham It Doesn't Know What Is Happening Out In the West

CLINTON, Ia., Oct. 12.—Parley Parker Christensen, Farmer-Labor party presidential candidate, who is to address an afternoon meeting here tomorrow, will be welcomed by city officials, elected on the Labor ticket last spring, according to plans announced today.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—Parley P. Christensen, Farmer-Labor party candidate for president, spoke before his first New York audience last night and declared that New York does not know what is going on in the western part of the country, which has awakened and no longer attaches any significance to the terms, "Republican and Democratic parties."

"As a national factor," Mr. Christensen said, "the Farmer-Labor party is simply putting on a hastily arranged first campaign. It has had no money to carry on a large propaganda or support an adequate working organization. But it has in it the spirit of permanency and it looks about the country at the amazing growth of popular political and economic intelligence as the surety of its future."

NATIONAL BANKS SELL LIBERTY BOND HOLDINGS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—Constant reduction of the amount of Liberty bonds held by national banks was reported by John Skelton Williams, comptroller of the currency. Records of the banks show an encouraging absorption of such securities by the investing public, the statement said. National banks held on June 30 Liberty bonds and Victory notes equal to only about three and one half percent of their total resources. Mr. Williams said. On that date, national banks owned \$775,361,000 of such securities while their resources aggregated more than twenty-two billion dollars. The aggregate of Liberty bonds held by the national banks June 30, as collateral amounted to \$25,353,000 while six months previously they had held more than \$269,000,000 according to the statement.

IRREGULARITY IN BUYING OF ARMY GOODS CHARGED

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—Representative Julius Kahn of California, head of the house military affairs committee, announced in a statement yesterday that when congress reconvenes he will institute an investigation into "deliberate evasions of provisions of the army reorganization act by Secretary of War Baker."

BUDDHISTS ASK S. S. MEN TO FIX COAST TROUBLE

TOKIO, Oct. 11.—The new Buddhist association, organized by the progressive Buddhists at a public meeting today, adopted a resolution requesting the Sunday school association to exert its influence toward peaceful and satisfactory solution of the problems arising out of the anti-Japanese measures in California. The resolution declared that the measures menace the friendly relations between Japan and the United States and expressed the hope that the leaders of Christianity who are devoted to justice and humanity will remain indifferent.

TELLS WOMEN JAZZ BARBARIC

Mrs. Anne Oberdorfer Denounces Majority of Modern Songs

Is the popular jazz, which now holds the American people in a tight grip, fit to enter the American home? "No," declares Mrs. Anne Oberdorfer, national music chairman of the General Federation of Women's clubs, who is in Ogden, attending the convention sessions of the Utah Federation.

THE LEADER OF the crusade declares that ninety per cent of the popular songs are unpeppable. While no specific instances are given of these offenders, it is known that a few are given a clean bill of health, such as "The Long Long Trail" and "Keep the Home Fires Burning."

"I have worked for twenty years," she said, "on the theory that 'jazz' and 'ragtime' in its original form, would be the basis of the future American school. But that is no reason why I cannot see that 'ragtime' and 'jazz' when vulgarized, are an actual menace to the life, morals, and education of young America today."

When one knows that in one of Chicago's biggest and best high schools one student bought 2000 copies of popular songs in two weeks, and the committee of students appointed by the school found only forty which they considered fit for boys and girls to sing together, don't you really think something should happen to awake American parents to their responsibilities?

In a middle-western city where I had been giving talks in which I attacked the evil popular songs, I said to the manager of a music shop that I hoped I had not hurt her business. She replied, "If I could help you in this campaign I'd give up everything in the world to do it."

She told me that seventy-five per cent of her customers were high school boys and girls who bought nothing but this trash, and she said they blushed."

CALLS IT BARBARIC

Mrs. Oberdorfer, while denouncing "jazz" music as barbaric and as arousing the worst emotions, does not drop the subject at this point, but offers many suggestions for its correction. Yesterday before the club women of Utah, she said in part: "At no time in the history of the world has any nation faced such an opportunity for the development of a national art as that which lies before America today. The General Federation of Women's clubs has pledged its support to all good American music. What are we to do about it? Let us start daily music in our homes when we sing the good old folk songs of America, which our Americanization work has taught us really are the folk songs of the whole world. Let us encourage our children to play good music for us in our homes. Let us use our phonographs and player-pianos as a force for good amusement and education in our home circles."

HERE'S HER PLAN

Briefly, the plan is to enlist the support of the clubs, boards of education, superintendents of schools, supervisors of music, newspapers and music dealers. A list of fifty instrumental compositions is made on records, player-piano rolls, and in these selections should be available simple piano sheet music which the children can play themselves. The newspapers should publish the lists, and possibly a short analysis of each number. At the end of six weeks, or two months, these fifty good compositions will be known by every child and in every home in your community. Then the contests should be held, with preliminary contests in each school. Eight or ten of the compositions should be played, without programs, the children writing down the name of the composition, composer and possibly when and where he lived. The twenty-five best papers should constitute the school team, and the final contest of teams might be held in a big hall, under the auspices of the community musical interests which the women's clubs have gathered together.
