

Carnivals Carrying Improper Sideshows Scored By Women

Gambling Devices and Objectionable Features Are Denounced at Morning Session of Federated Clubs; Banquet at 5 P. M.; Drama Club Plays Tonight.

Traveling carnivals which carry objectionable features such as suggestive side shows and gambling devices, were scored at the early morning meeting today of the president's council of the Utah Federation of Women's clubs convention which is being held in the Elk's club in Ogden. The discussion in regard to the professional traveling carnival was brought up by Mrs. W. A. Wright of Salt Lake, and later was joined by several other club presidents.

Carnivals recently staged in Salt Lake and Springfield were mentioned as objectionable from a moral standpoint and the women agreed that some action should be taken to ban them in the future. No mention was made of the carnival held in Ogden this summer.

The women who participated in the discussion made it clear that they did not wish to bring about a total abolition of carnivals, but the consensus of opinion was that a committee should be formed which would have the authority to furnish the names of the features of the exhibits and bar those which they deem as improper.

NO DEFINITE ACTION.
No definite action was taken in the matter this morning, but the subject will come up later for discussion and it is probable that a resolution will be endorsed by the club women tomorrow, seeking a solution to the problem, resulting in clean amusement.

Mayor Frank Francis and members of the board of city commissioners of Ogden were roundly praised by the women for their recent stand in placing a ban on all future carnivals which plan to bring unsavory features to the city. At the same time the commissioners took this action, they also barred all games of chance in city parks holding that the parks can be made more attractive through elimination of these features.

The annual session opened this morning at 10 o'clock and brought a greatly increased attendance over yesterday's meetings. Club women from distant parts of the state arrived in the city last night and appeared at today's session.

Mrs. M. S. Avery of Salt Lake, superintendent of the community clinic in that city, spoke at some length on the subject of clinics. She outlined many suggestions which might be used in the proposed establishment of community clinics in Ogden, Logan, Provo and other Utah cities.

Dr. Jane Skolfield outlined health matters and Mrs. G. M. Bacon spoke on child welfare work in Utah and explained the pre-school plan.

The session was opened by community singing and was followed by an address by Mrs. E. O. Leatherwood of Salt Lake, president of the state federation.

COMMUNITY SERVICE.
"Community Service" was the keynote of last evening's session of the convention, featuring addresses on "Mothercraft," by Miss May Bliss Dickinson of Boston; Miss Majorie Day of Los Angeles, on "Community Service for Girls"; and Mrs. Philip W. Kinsley of Ogden, on "The Club Woman's Responsibility Toward the Young People of Her Community."

Miss Dickinson defined "mothercraft" as the training of girls to look after the welfare of young children, whether as "little mothers," left in care of small brothers and sisters, or as a preparation for the responsibilities of their own families in after years. The speaker said Utah had been a pioneer and leader in the mothercraft movement, since it had been a part of the curriculum of the University of Utah and the Utah Agricultural college for some time, as well as being taught in the public schools of the state.

"It is not only a benefit to the girls themselves," the speaker said, "but it is a great thing for the mothers in foreign homes, from which the girls come and is one of the greatest aids to Americanization. It is also a great inspiration toward teaching

girls the beauty and sacredness of life. The instruction is given by the school nurse, and deals with personal hygiene and cleanliness and sanitation in the home, as well as the care of the health and physical development of the girls under training.

"One of the things emphasized as a health measure is sensible shoes. Care of babies during their first year is a part of the training, and the right sort of nutrition is given particular attention. The club women all over the country are behind the movement and are using their influence to have it introduced in the course of studies in all schools, in the interest of making the world safer for motherhood."

Miss Day in her address on "Community Service Work for Girls," took the position that the word community is elastic, extending from the home to the county, to the state, nation and finally to the world.

"The aim of community service," Miss Day said, "is to look after the leisure time of the working classes, for it is that time when the greatest opportunity is given for their advancement. Some wholesome amusement must be furnished of an uplifting nature to take the place of the former open saloons, for the men and the working girl should be given homelike surroundings after working hours. They should be given amusement and physical recreation. An outlet should be furnished for their creative instincts, such as talents for music, art and drama. They should be allowed an opportunity for a wholesome association with men and their desire for service and helpfulness for others should be encouraged. The club work

Development of Music As National Art Urged

Resume of the speech of Mrs. Anno Paulner Oberdorfer, national music chairman, general federation of women's clubs, before the Utah Federation of Women's clubs at the First Congressional church last night.

"At no time in the history of the world has any nation faced such an opportunity for the development of a national art as that which lies before America today. From every great war in the past some one nation has arisen supreme in political and commercial importance. Then begins the development of its arts, and if we review the pages of musical history, we will find that the greatest growth in music always follows some great war. Today we face the same situation in America."

HAVE WRONG ATTITUDE.
"We Americans have had the wrong attitude regarding music for so many years that it is difficult for us to grasp quickly the full realization of its power. As a nation we have treated music as a thing apart from life, instead of as a part of it. It is not so many years ago that the average American business man was all but ashamed to acknowledge a love for music. Now a change has come. Music has become a force and not an adjunct in the life of every American citizen. The pre-war status of music in America will never return."

"Confucius once said: 'If you would know if a country is well governed, and of good morals, listen to its music.' The folk music of any land is its most important musical asset, yet it has only been recently that we in America have come to realize the wealth of our own folk material. We are just beginning to recognize the marvelous strength of our Indian music, just as we are at last discovering the true worth of the Indian legends. In the native songs of the American West are to be found the most interesting and unique expression ever contributed to literature and music by a primitive folk."

The general federation of women's clubs has pledged its support to all good American music. What are we to do about it? First, we must familiarize ourselves with the music that is being used in our homes, our clubs, our schools, our churches, Sunday schools, theatres, moving picture houses, and the music that is being advertised in the shops, magazines and newspapers. We will be surprised; we may even be horrified with what we find, but it is time that we know. When you consider the titles, the pictures on the covers, one does not need to look at the words themselves to know that the song is vile 'jazz' music in its original form was used as the accompaniment to the Vodoo ceremonies by which the uneducated, almost barbaric negro

men are the torch bearers in this as well as all other inspirational movements for making the world better."

SEIZURE BARES BIG OPIUM RING

Three Coast Smugglers and Two at New York Held By U. S. Agents.

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—A trunk containing 110 one-pound cans of opium was captured in a railway station here last week, and has uncovered what federal authorities say is an international opium smuggling ring, and caused the arrest of three men in San Francisco and two in New York who were shipped here today.

HEAVY CAPTURE.
The men arrested in San Francisco are Harry and John Pinsler, brothers and John Clarkson. The two in New York are Alvin Earl and Leo Couture of Montreal. In their possession was found 250 pounds of Asia Minor opium, the product of the black poppy, it was said.

Word came here from Boise, Idaho, that federal agents there were awaiting the arrival of 125 pounds of white poppy opium, said to have been shipped by the Pinsler brothers from San Francisco.

WORTH \$100,000 RETAIL.
The arrests in San Francisco were made, it was said, after W. J. Fong, a Chinaman seized by federal authorities, had confessed to selling thousands of dollars worth of opium. He involved Clarkson and the Pinsler brothers, according to H. W. Tidwell, special agent of the United States treasury department.

The value of the opium seized in Chicago at wholesale price was said to be about \$15,000. At present retail prices it would bring about \$100,000 authorities declared.

DEMOCRATS HAVE FAILED. HOOVER ASSURES WOMAN

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 12.—A letter from Herbert Hoover, to Mrs. Robert J. Burdette, of California, saying that since the armistice the administration has made a failure by all the tests we can supply, was made public last night by western headquarters of the Republican national committee.

Mrs. Burdette was one of a party of women who held meetings in advocacy of the league last year. The letter said in part:

"I have no doubt our Democratic friends will argue that they are martyrs to adherence to a great principle in the unmodified covenant of the league of nations. They are seeking martyrdom upon a false premise. The questions involved in the league of nations concern one great principle and numbers of alternative methods of its accomplishment."

The Republican party and Senator Harding have repeatedly expressed their great devotion to this great principle. Article ten and other articles objected to are but part of the methods of reaching this great object. These articles, adhered to by the Democratic party, are today regarded as the majority of our people as dangerous not only to our own country, but to the league itself.

"The responsibilities of government should be transferred. I therefore wholeheartedly support the Republican candidate."
