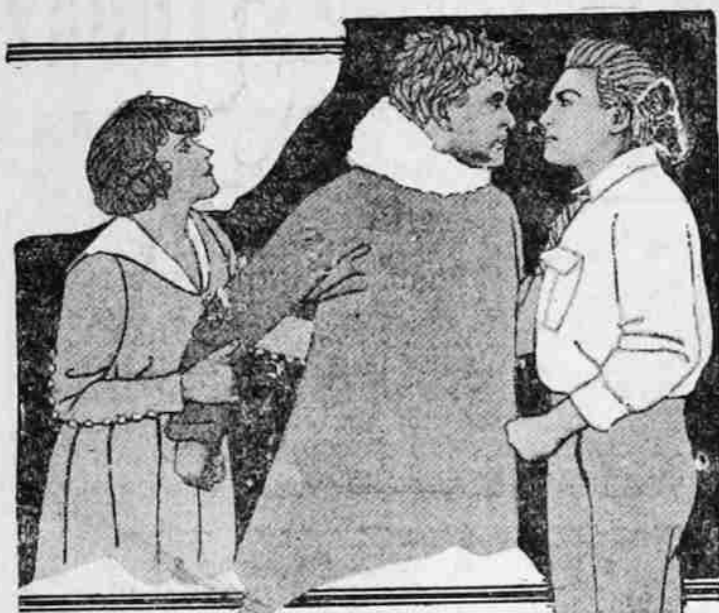

SENATOR SMOOT TALKS TONIGHT
MAN KILLED IN FALL OFF ROOF

Will Address Young Men
Republicans' Club at
Headquarters.

Senator Reed Smoot will fire the opening shot of his campaign in Weber county tonight when he will talk to men in the Republican headquarters hall on Hudson avenue at 8 o'clock. The meeting has been arranged by the Young Men's Republican club of Weber county, and owing to the limited space offered in the hall, only men will be admitted. All men in the county, in addition to the club members are invited to attend. In order that the women of Weber county have also the opportunity of hearing the speaker a reception will be arranged at a later date which will be attended, exclusively by women. It was announced this morning at county headquarters by William T. Greenwell, secretary. The event tonight is in the nature of a reception and in addition to scheduled speeches, refreshments will be served.
