

NO FEDERAL AID FOR DIRT ROADS

Ogden Engineer Explains New Policy of National Roads Bureau

Announcing a change of policy of the government, which amounts to a withdrawal of federal aid from earth road projects a letter from B. J. Finch, district engineer of the Ogden Bureau of Public Roads, was presented before a meeting of the state road commission at Salt Lake yesterday. Mr. Finch pointed out a letter from Thomas H. McDonald, chief of the Public Roads Bureau, to the district engineers, which follows:

"The question of a more definite policy to be followed in connection with the approval of earth road federal aid projects which involve grading and draining only has for some time been under consideration, and it has been decided that hereafter such projects will only be approved on condition that the state highway department agree, in so far as it may legally do so, that within a reasonable time after completion of the improvement of the project as an earth road it will place on cause to be placed thereon an adequate and substantial type of surfacing.

"By adequate and substantial type of surfacing is meant such type as will carry the prospective traffic with such maintenance expenses that the total annual charges will represent a reasonable expenditure for the public service rendered by the highway."

MANY PROJECTS HIT.
It was accepted that the new policy would mean the death of several hundred projects that have been authorized, inasmuch as even a gravel surfacing on many of the roads to out of the way settlements would be entirely too expensive to be carried out until the population and traffic is much more dense than it is at present.

The new ruling applies to every federal aid project in Utah on which the new agreement has not actually been signed by the state road commission and the bureau of public roads. The signing of the project agreement is the last step before submitting the road for bids.

Other business transacted by the commission in a long session is summarized as follows:

Contract was let to Watts & Samuelson for channel change in the Weber River at Riverdale, near the state highway crossing, at 70 cents a cubic yard. The new channel will be 200 feet wide and a minimum of 7000 cubic yards is to be moved.

The Heisel Construction Company was awarded a contract for surfacing the approach to the new bridge over the Boulderger tracks at \$150 a cubic yard, the work to be done within 110 days.

A claim from Watts & Samuelson for \$1,442.08, as an extra charge on 19,281 yards of excess excavation at the point of the mountain, was denied.

Investigation was made of a line change in the Milford Enterprise road, approved by the county commission of Iron county, represented by Commissioner Henry W. Burt.

Contract for rebuilding of the "Red bridge" over the south fork of the Sevier, in Piute county, was let to Watts & Samuelson for \$12,500. The work to be completed as soon as possible. On this contract the bid of T. W. Burt, at \$6485.50 was so low that the commission believed it was made under a misapprehension of the specifications. Watts & Samuelson were next low out of two bidders.

The commission decided on strenuous action to prevent damage to roads by trailing of sheep. A detour for stock in Wasatch county near the Heber-Fruiland road, will be completed at once.

Fetion of ten draftmen for the commission for a rate of \$20 a month each was referred to Auditor Joseph Ririe for report.

Requests from federal authorities for immediate action on preservation of the Ogden-Hooper macadam road by proper maintenance were referred to District Engineer Reuben Simpson, of Ogden, for an estimate of the cost. More gravel and binder are required it was thought.

Contractors were notified not to tear up any more state roads than they can complete this year, in view of the danger of winter approaching and leaving the roads in impassable condition for several months.

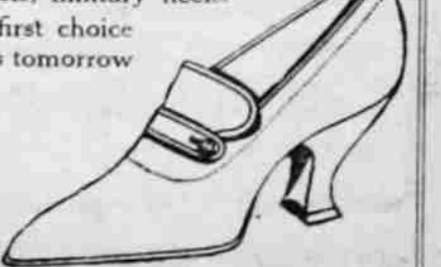
