MABEY TO TALK AT HERO'S BIER

Former Major to Be Speaker At Funeral of Raymond Holmes

Major Charles R. Mabey, Republican candidate for governor of Utah, has volunteered his services, and will be the principal speaker at the funeral of Private Raymond M. Holmes...

Private Holmes was with the famous First Division, 28 infantry, which was commanded by Major General Hunter Liggett, in the battle of Soissons which was one of the deciding battles of the war.

His brother, Dewey Holmes, was at Tours at the time, but did not know that Raymond was there, or had been in action. He later learned from home of the death of his brother, and then visited the hospital and talked with the nurse who had treated his brother and learned the details of his death.

The remains of Private Holmes were recently disinterred and shipped to Ogden by the government, at his father's request, arriving in Ogden yesterday afternoon.

Major Mabey is scheduled to speak at both Huntsville and Eden on Wednesday evening, October 20th and in Hooper and Riverdale, on Monday, October 25th.
