

KATZ GOING TO COAST STATION

Ogden Arsenal Officer Transferred to Fort Mason Near San Francisco

Lieutenant William F. Katz has been transferred from the Ogden Arsenal to Fort Mason, San Francisco, according to advices received here today from the war department at Washington. Lieutenant Katz has been in Ogden since last May and was the officer who started work at the Ogden Arsenal.

Lieutenant Katz will depart from Ogden for his new post about November 1, according to present information while rumors have been received stating that he would be transferred to San Diego from Fort Mason in due time.

Lieutenant Katz came to Ogden from an eastern army camp and was instrumental in getting work at the Arsenal under way. He has been connected with the government since 1917 and has had charge of construction work at two other arsenals.

ENGLISH LABOR STUDIES STRIKE

Unions Discuss Sympathetic Action With Miners; Com promise Expected

LONDON, Oct. 20.—The National Union of Railway Men, transport workers, and the parliamentary committee of the trades union congress held meeting this afternoon to consider their attitude toward the coal strike, but thus far no decision has been taken.

After approximately two hours of discussion, James Henry Thomas, general secretary of the railway men's union, said the whole situation had been reviewed and adjournment taken until Thursday. The executive of the transport workers and the trades union committee continued their meeting this afternoon.

READY TO SETTLE

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Negotiations which might settle the strike of coal miners were believed today to be assured. Government officials and labor officials who outlined their positions before the opening session of parliament have shown their desire to reach an understanding. Belief was general today that proposals were in preparation by both sides.

Treasury Secretary George has said definitely he is ready to enter into negotiations. He has, however, stated plans for a relative wage increase pending a complete adjustment which would be satisfactory to both sides. He threatened to call a meeting of the coal miners' union, he says, must be announced and he may submit some proposals which will deal with this phase of the situation.

BITTERNESS MISSING

This morning's papers comment appreciatively on the calm and dignified tone yesterday in the house of commons and the absence of provocation. This fact is regarded as a good omen, journals maintaining that although the deadlock still exists the debate has cleared the stage for a compromise.

NEW 12-CLUB LEAGUE FAVORED BY HERRMANN

CINCINNATI, O., Oct. 20.—August Herrmann, president of the Cincinnati National League club, today said that although he believed a twelve-club league would be impracticable, it would be a novelty for a year or two until a permanent plan could be adopted. He said he subscribed to the Chicago reorganization plan to abolish the national commission and form a new agreement and hoped the five American league clubs and representatives would join in the plan.

Mr. Herrmann said he thought a new controlling body should become operative at the earliest possible time.

COLLEGES MAY ORGANIZE BOXING ASSOCIATION

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—Formation of an intercollegiate boxing association will be considered at a meeting here next Friday night of professors from institutions interested in the project. Tentative rules have been drawn up.

SEMENOFF RENEWS ANTI-RED DRIVE

It is reported, General Uvaren Stenberg, Semenov's chief lieutenant, is said to be recruiting insurgents against the Bolshevik regime in Siberia in his march to cut the Kyskma road, 20 miles south of Verkhne-Dinsk, capital of the far eastern republic.

BANKERS PLAN BIG EXPORT FIRM

\$100,000,000 Corporation to Finance Nation's Foreign Trade Is Approved

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—Approval of a proposal to organize a \$100,000,000 corporation to finance the nation's foreign trade was given today by the American Bankers' association, in convention here.

President Hayes was authorized to call a meeting of bankers and business men to work out plans for the formation of such a corporation under the provisions of the recently enacted Edge law, as proposed in the report of the association's committee on commerce and merchant marine, which was presented today.

GREAT BOND ISSUE

Proposal for organization of a \$100,000,000 corporation for foreign trade financing under the auspices of the American Bankers' association was put before that body by its department of commerce and marine. By cooperating with merchants, manufacturers, exporters and producers, the report said, and taking advantage of the Edge law, the corporation could issue a billion dollars in debenture bonds for sale in the United States and the extension of credits abroad.

John McHugh, chairman of the committee, presented the report which recommended steps to put the corporation into business operation by January 1 and solicitation of subscriptions to its capital stock by the public.

LARGE CORPORATION BEST

"We recommend the organization under the plan of a large corporation as preferable to a smaller one," the report said, "because it will attract the best expert talent, will have the efficiency attaching to large organizations, will give the utmost protection to the investor, and will readily create a market for its debentures by its avowed purpose of creating thrift."

The report said the economic future of the United States "was bound up in the future of our trade relations with other peoples."

POWER ALCOHOL FROM PACIFIC PLANT WASTE
LONDON, Oct. 16.—There is enough raw material for the manufacture of 58,000,000 gallons of power alcohol yearly in the Pacific Islands, particularly Fiji and with that from British East Africa and Kenya Colony, the total requirements of the world could be met, says the Autocar.

The three raw materials contemplated are maize, cassava and sugar cane, and it is estimated that the cost of these crops would be such as to enable the raw material for a gallon of power alcohol to be available at 12 cents.

The periodical estimates that after paying the cost of transportation the fuel could be marketed over here at the equivalent of 42 cents per gallon.
