BUTLER DAMAGE SUIT CONTINUED

Case Expected to Go on Several Days; \$30,500 Sought

Two or three days will be consumed before the case of George H. Butler, administrator for the estate of Ormand H. Butler, against the Oregon Short Line railroad will be completed, according to estimates made this morning. The plaintiff is suing the railroad for damages totaling \$30,500 for the death of Ormand Butler and the destruction of his automobile when a train struck the car at the Twelfth street crossing in March, 1919. The plaintiff seeks \$30,000 for the death of Mr. Butler and \$500 for wreckage of the automobile. The case is being heard before a jury in Judge A. E. Pratt's division of the district court.

Taking of testimony of witnesses for the plaintiff has now continued two days and there are still several additional witnesses to be examined, it is said. The defense will then present witnesses and cross-examine those who have taken the stand.

An attempt is being made by the plaintiff to show that the train was proceeding at a rate of sixty miles an hour when it reached the crossing and no warning was given such as the blowing of a whistle or the sounding of a bell. The railroad company maintains that Mr. Butler, in approaching the crossing, had an unobstructed view of the tracks and claims the accident was due to his carelessness and through no fault of the railroad or its employees.

The jurors in the case are: Leroy Buchmiller, H. C. Farrell, Lionel Ingretson, G. Morris Flowers, Walter L. Stephen, John Doxy and Charles S. Murphy.

Pitcher Hurler Gives Up His Bail of \$50

S. B. Roberts, who created considerable excitement yesterday by hurling a water pitcher through the window of an apartment house on Twenty-fourth street, failed to appear before the city court this morning on a charge of drunkenness. His bail, amounting to \$50 was declared forfeited.

Miss Maude Roberts, 19-year-old daughter of the defendant, held in investigation, by the police, was released.

Engineer Held for Eureka Authorities

Julius L. Peterson, 41 years of age, a stationary engineer, was arrested last night by Deputy Sheriff William Brown upon advice of the authorities at Eureka. The Eureka officers in asking for the arrest of the man did not mention the charge placed against him, but said they held a warrant. He is now being held in the county jail awaiting arrival of the Eureka officers.

When a stranger snatched a valuable handbag from her hand at the Union Depot yesterday afternoon, Mrs. Mathilda Haas, of Lodi, Cal., lost in addition to her pocketbook and \$13.50 cash, two valuable lavalliers. The police were immediately notified and set out in search of the man, who disappeared in the crowd of passengers at the depot. The man was described by Mrs. Haas as being of medium height, sandy complexioned, and wore peculiar shoes, description of which were given the police.

DEMAND GROWS FOR SUGAR HERE

Flurry in Market Results in Many Requests for Product

The flurry in the sugar market which boosted sugar prices a dollar has created an acute demand for sugar by the public at large, according to Ogdan grocers.

It is reported that the rise is but a flurry of an unsettled market and that lower prices are looked for by the dealers. Sugar is expected to be selling at prices from 10 to 15 per sack in the near future, it is reported. Conditions in the potato market are also unsettled, it is reported. Comparatively few farmers have dug their potatoes, it is reported, and those who have them out of the ground are holding them for higher prices. With the return of a week or two of good weather, the entire potato crop will be ready for moving, and there will be an adequate supply.

Practically no new arrivals are on the local market at present.

While a few grapefruit have been received, the citrus fruit crop is not expected to be moving at full blast until after Thanksgiving.

City Will Purchase Tractor for Snowplow

Preparations for coming winter were made today by the board of city commissioners, when they authorized the purchase of a tractor and snowplow, which will be used on the streets during the heavy storms. The tractor will be purchased from the R. T. Mitchell company and is known as the "Chetrac." Immediate delivery is promised on the tractor and Mr. Mitchell has wired that the snow plow be shipped at once. It is expected here within ten days.

With the tractor snowplow in action, Ogdan will be one of the first cities of the west to adopt this system of keeping its streets cleared of snow. It is said, New York has adopted the tractor method and has disposed of practically all its horses. The tractor, it is said, can accomplish much more work than horse drawn plows.

The new tractor will be used for many other purposes beside use for snow plowing, Mayor Francis said.

Sunshine Promised For Ogdan Tomorrow

After twelve days of cloudiness, rain and snowstorms, Ogdan and the surrounding district is promised clear weather tomorrow with cooler temperatures, according to the United States weather report, which reached the city this morning. More rain and snow may come at intervals tonight, it is stated, but sunshine is promised for tomorrow.

Yesterday's temperature was 45 degrees with a minimum last night of 23 degrees. Snow and rain of yesterday and last night brought precipitation of .37 of an inch, according to measurements made by Charles Haas, local weather observer.
