CENTRE COLLEGE AFTER GRID WIN

Famous Kentucky Aggregation To Be Pitted Against Harvard in Feature Contest

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—An inter-scholastic football game of far more than normal interest features the gridiron schedule of Saturday in the meeting of Harvard University and Centre college, of Danville, Ky. In facing Centre college at Cambridge, there are unusual features which separate the contest from even the occasional intercollegiate game which brings together the supposedly best eleven of two sections of the country.

Attention was first focused upon Centre college, leading several seasons ago when reports of large and one-sided scores began to be published. When the season of 1919 closed and it was seen that Centre had rolled up 485 points against 23 for her nine opponents and that two members of the team were selected for the All-American eleven with a third placed among the substitutes of that mythical all-star combination, football followers throughout the country began to take Centre college seriously. She was invited to arrange a game with Harvard and quickly accepted.

Early today the Centre college football squad, accompanied by more than 500 rooters, including the president of the college and a number of staid Kentucky business men, passed through this city on their way to Boston. The team is in charge of the coach, Chas. Moran, who also holds the position of National league baseball umpire in the summer time. While the invading combination is not boastful, it is apparent that Centre supporters expect the team to win.

The entire south is backing the eleven. What the "Colonels" will do against the powerful Harvard team, however, cannot be foretold. CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Oct. 22.—The names of Centre college and Harvard University were on the lips of every football fan in this section of the country on this, the day before the Colonels from Kentucky and the Crimson meet on the gridiron. Harvard enthusiasts were heartened today when Coach Fisher gave out the word that Captain Horween had recovered sufficiently from an injury to his side to start in the game. Three other regulars, Keith Kane, end, Tom Woods, guard, and "Bubbles" Havermeier, center, also stepped out of the hospital list and were slated to be in the lineup. A warm welcome awaited the team and its supporters from the Blue Grass state and everyone was anxious to see the eleven which has not been defeated in two seasons.

JENNINGS MAY LEAD CORNELL BALL CLUB

ITHACA, N. Y., Oct. 22.—Hugh Jennings, former manager of the Detroit American league baseball club, may be chosen as Cornell University baseball coach at a meeting of the alumni baseball association here Saturday to select a coach for next season. Jennings, it was announced here today, is expected to attend the meeting. The former Detroit manager is an alumnus of Cornell and coached the university baseball team in 1904.

Penn State is said to be the strongest institution located in Kentucky, is also picked to upset some dope. Thus far this season the Centre College eleven has made history. In three games they have totaled 241 points to 9 for their opponents.

The contest between Cornell and Colgate at Ithaca should be a thriller. Gil Dobe's eleven will get their first chance to show their wares in this battle. In the western conference several important battles are to be staged. The Michigan-Illinois battle at Ann Arbor, the Ohio State-Wisconsin battle at Columbus, and the Chicago-Iowa contest at Chicago should be the top-notchers.

In the Rockies the Utah Aztec-Montana State contest at Bozeman should be a thriller. The Montana aggregation triumphed the Washington State eleven, one of the best teams in the coast conference, last week, 14 to 12. While the Aggies are doing battle against the Montana twinklers the

Utah University will be clashing against the fast University of California team at Berkeley. At Fort Collins tomorrow afternoon, the Colorado School of Mines will vie with the Colorado Aggies. At Denver Colorado College will tangle with Denver University.

Vern "Rock" Funtz, star athlete at the West high school, was yesterday elected to captain the 1926 grid aggregation. Funtz is an all-around man and is rated as one of the most promising comers in the west. He was all-state fullback last season and capped the quarter mile in the state track meet from O'Keefe of Ogden.

The 2:10 class pace open to southern horses proved one of the most closely contested matches of the season here and was won by George M., owned by William Gallagher, of Selma, Ala., and piloted by Edman.

CONSIDERABLE INTEREST HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 22.—Interest in the international ocean race between the Nova Scotia schooner Delphin and the Gloucester schooner Esperanto, off Halifax, October 30, was heightened today when two more skipper's asked permission to enter the contest.
