

MODERN CRUSOE RETURNS TO PRESENT-DAY LIFE AFTER 12 YEARS ON A LONELY ISLAND



ISLAND SIDELIGHTS.
Hardenburg went to the island Oct. 20, 1908, and has just now left it. He is a man of much personality, and is fond of and liked by people.

Hardenburg used a gourd for a dipper and in the 12 years he drank no water that he didn't pump from his well. Exercise was automatic with him. Chesapeake bay was his bathtub.

In his home on Watts island, there was not one so-called modern convenience. In Jersey City he only touched a button to get anything he desired.

"My strength returned from the start," said Hardenburg. "I soon got so I could eat five or six meals a day and never suffer from it. I was always hungry. Before I never had an appetite for one meal a day."

Figs, apples, peaches, plums and pears all grew in abundance on the island. Crusoe's grapes, limes and lemons had nothing on Hardenburg's domain.

"I saved a seven-year clothes and board bill," said Hardenburg.

Hardenburg says his friends uniformly agree that his island life was ideal, with one exception—they all declare he should have had a mate.

Exile Was Voluntary to Regain Health; Found Nature Good Doctor

My right there is none to dispute;
From the center all round to the sea
I am lord of the fowls and the brute."

CRISFIELD, Md. — Self-banished from society, cut off from mankind, on Watts island, 12 miles from here, Charles H. Hardenburg spent 12 years of his life.

Hardenburg is truly a modern Robinson Crusoe. Like Crusoe, he has finally found deliverance from his "island of Despair," and returned to civilization. Watts island is a tiny "jewel" of green forest and white beach set in turquoise and turquoise waters of Chesapeake bay. It is two miles long and of 200 acres, a third of which is high ground.

The nearest inhabited land is Tangier island, six miles away, where a constable not long ago shot a boy who broke the "no-to-burn" law. Crisfield is 15 miles to the north. Though Watts is nearest Maryland, it is part of Virginia. There is a light-house and a frame dwelling built by Hardenburg's ancestors in 1784. His uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. F. H. Foreman, lived 30 years on Watts and four of his ancestors are buried there. Hardenburg, Princeton graduate and wealthy attorney of Jersey City, was sick, and his physicians told him that unless he "went back to nature" he would die. Mrs. Daniel S. Hardenburg, Charles' mother, and an eminent Jersey physician, was so sure that his brother's death was soon that he bought Watts island from their aunt and gave it to Charles.

Then came the exile and the long sojourn on this "continent" alone with the sea, his dog, with the ceaseless booming of the surf and the cry calls of the seagulls as the only sound to break the silence. Fate lent Crusoe to his island and he longed constantly for the life of comfort he had left. So it was with Hardenburg, but his indomitable will to health kept him in solitude.

"I hadn't been there long until I knew that life on the island was my way to health," he told me. "I truly believe I would have been in my grave today had I not gone to Watts. So, when people say they think I wasted 12 years of my life, I disagree."

HELD HIM TOO.
At times fate, too, held Hardenburg's captive. Two years ago the sea to shoreward was frozen over and Hardenburg's supplies grew low. He lived on unleavened bread, the fat of a goose he killed, and coffee. When the ice broke people of Onancock, Va., sent relief supplies.

Life was pretty much "one thing after another" to Hardenburg. He rose at sunrise, cooked his meal and cleaned his house. Then he rowed his boat to his fish traps and, in the afternoon, hunted geese, brant and swan. There was an inexhaustive supply of shell-fish at his door.

In the summer Hardenburg kept a garden and in the winter spent most of his time with books. "Rover," his dog, lived seven years. The loss of his toes by a gun shot and a fight with a muskrat hastened his end. Hardenburg missed "Rover."

Hardenburg brought a "Tabby cat" to his island and a year later a fisherman from Tangier left him a "Tom cat." Now there are "wild cats" all over the island. And they are wild!

RE-ADAPTATION HARD.
Year followed year and while Hardenburg never quite gave up his longing for the gentler things of life, he found interest in his solitude.

Now Hardenburg finds it a little hard to re-adapt himself to the ways of civilization. "I have an indescribable feeling that I cannot find enough excitement to offset the solitude of the island life," he told me at Tifton, Ga., where he has accepted a position with his

brother, E. P. Beasley, of the Title Guarantee company. Crusoe married on his return, May 2, Hardenburg would not I found him the center of society in Tifton.

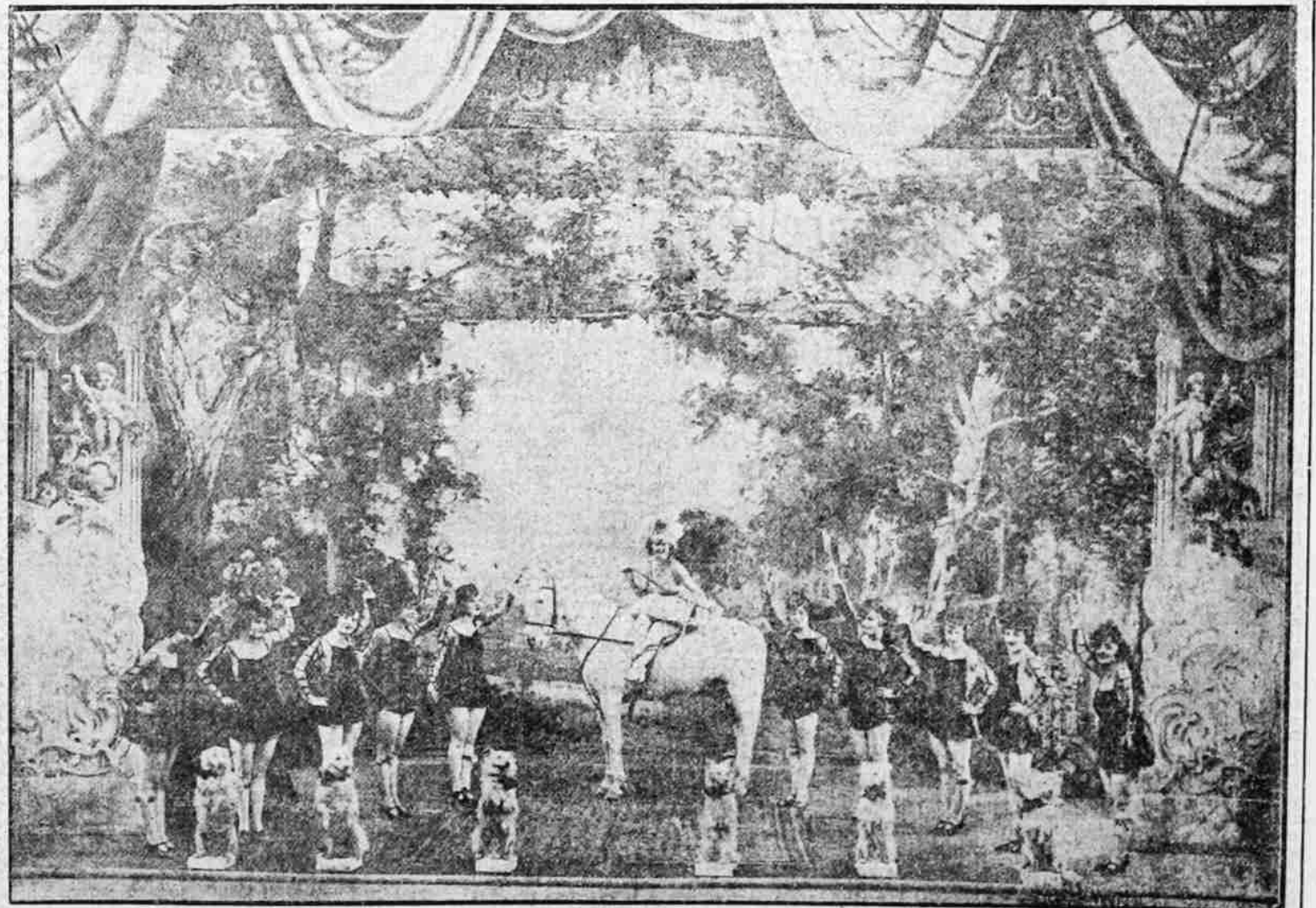
