PARLEY P. WILL GIVE ADDRESS IN OGDEN SUNDAY

The Farmer-Labor Party's candidate for president, Parley P. Christensen, will be in Ogden Sunday, October 31st, and all those interested are invited to hear him speak in the Alhambra theatre on that date.

The Farmer-Labor party held a rally at North Ogden Wednesday evening and at Plain City Friday evening. At both places the candidates were enthusiastically received. The citizens of Plain City donated a band of 39 pieces and there was an audience of three hundred people.

The principal speakers at these meetings were Joseph Young, candidate for state representative; George Crosby, candidate for governor; William Piggott for congressman; and Charles H. Schaeffer for recorder. Mr. Elwood of Ogden, a friend of the Farmer-Labor party explained the Farmer-Labor movement. Mrs. Alice Snell Meyer, candidate for state senator, spoke with reference to the use of the ballot by women.

Topics of both meetings were profits, co-operation, league of nations, the Esch-Cummins bill and other items that appeal to the farmers and industrial workers.

Horace Havemeyer Inspects Local Plants of Amalgamated Company

Mr. Havemeyer is on his annual inspection tour of factories of the Great Western Sugar company and the Amalgamated Sugar company. Mr. Havemeyer is one of the directors of the Amalgamated Sugar company and will in all probability attend the meeting of the board of directors to be held Tuesday afternoon in this city.

On his inspection tour of the factories in Idaho Mr. Havemeyer reports much progress, according to local officials of the Amalgamated Sugar company.

He visited and inspected the Ogden plant today.

LIVESTOCK YARD LEADERS MEET

Stabilizing of Prices From Day to Day Is Chief Problem Considered

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—Presidents of the American livestock exchanges at a conference here today appointed a committee to investigate and recommend means to prevent sudden fluctuations in the prices of meat. Everett C. Brown, president of the National Livestock exchange, presided and representatives were present from Baltimore, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Denver, Detroit, Buffalo, Indianapolis, Jacksonville, Milwaukee, Montgomery, Nashville, New York, New Orleans, Oklahoma City, Omaha, Peoria, Pittsburg, Portland, Sioux City, Sioux Falls, St. Joseph, St. Louis, St. Paul and Chicago.

At a meeting here the principal livestock exchanges of the United States have authorized the appointment of a committee to work out some plan for more nearly stabilizing the markets.

"The problem is fundamentally one of better adjusting the supply of livestock to the demand. Under the present system the number of meat animals received at the different markets varies by thousands from day to day and week to week. This tends to cause price fluctuations up and down of the prices received for livestock."

The committee appointed includes Mr. Brown, Thomas E. Wilson, C. H. Swift, F. E. White, L. H. Heymann, James P. Arar, M. Greenwald, F. Wadelle, Emil Ingwersen, T. W. Jerrens and S. Bruce Stafford.

HARDING SPENDS DAY AT HIS DESK

MARION, O., Oct. 25.—Senator Harding began the last full week of the campaign with another day spent at his desk at work on the final public utterances with which he will rest his candidacy.

The speech to be delivered Saturday night at Columbus occupied the nominee's major attention, though it was said the final data still remained to be prepared for the race he will deliver during the week at Cleveland, Akron and Cincinnati. In all of these addresses he is expected to enunciate his position on the league of nations and also to sum up the domestic policies he has advocated in the course of the campaign.

Expert on Ballet to Instruct 'Three Twins'

J. S. Lewis informed Mr. Major that the rooms of the building occupied by the Moose club and the Watson-Piggare Hardware company, were at the disposal of the opera company for rehearsals. The rooms are now being rented out for practices. Lights are being installed and a stage is being prepared for the big cast of dancing girls. The rooms will be fitted up as a permanent home by the Altriant Society.

Another rehearsal will be held tonight at the Eagles' club, to which all girls are asked to bring their dancing costumes.

BRITISH COLUMBIA TO CONTROL LIQUOR TRADE

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 25.—Nominations of candidates for the next British Columbia legislature, which was dissolved last Saturday, will be held on November 10. The general election will be on December 1. Government liquor regulation proposals will be presented at the next session.

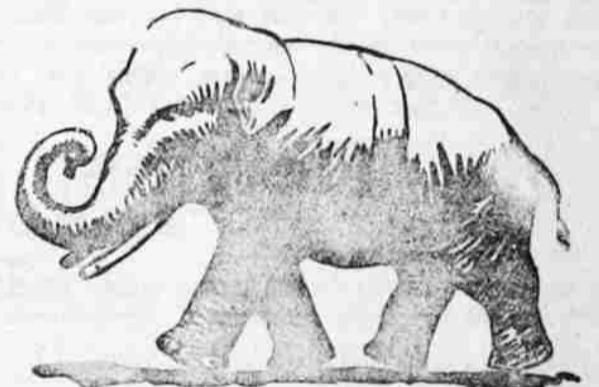
