

HARDING DENIES SIBERIA STORY

Nominee Says He Is Not Connected With Vanderlip Project in East

MARION, Ohio, Oct. 27.—Direct denial was made by Senator Harding Tuesday of reports reaching the state department that Washington D. Vanderlip was acting as his agent in Russia.

"I have never heard of Mr. Vanderlip," said the senator. "He is not my agent and I have no agent. I know absolutely nothing about any such matter as is discussed in these dispatches, and have no interest in it whatever."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—Secretary Colby announced today that Commissioner Young at Riga had informed the state department that Washington Vanderlip who recently obtained concessions in Siberia, was reported to have told Nikolai Lenine, Russia Bolshevik premier, that he represented Senator Harding, the Republican presidential candidate.

The commissioner's dispatch dated October 25, said Vanderlip had informed H. G. Wells, British writer, that Mr. Vanderlip had made certain proposals to the soviet government at Moscow looking to the recognition of the Bolshevik government by the United States.

Secretary Colby in making public the statement, said the dispatch contained no information beyond that contained in the dispatch. He said, however, that it comes without qualifying terms from an official of the department in whom he places much confidence.

It furthermore would be most regrettable if any confusion should arise in the minds of the soviet authorities as to the attitude of this government on the question of political recognition. This attitude has been stated in unmistakable terms.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 27.—The situation is this, said Leo A. Phillips, insurance man, and a member of the syndicate. "Mr. Vanderlip came to me and others and reported that by his long sojourn in Siberia, he knew of the existence of rich fields of minerals, oil, etc. He said he believed he could secure a concession if properly financed. We financed the trip. The first information we received from him came through the press. I have my very serious doubts that Mr. Vanderlip made any fair representations. He had no authority from us to do so. The project has no political significance. It is purely a business affair."

If there is any political significance about it I don't know it. I'm an oil man, not a politician."

"I know nothing about it whatever," said F. W. Braun, wholesale druggist. "I have no information about what Mr. Vanderlip has been doing. All I have learned about it has reached me through the press."
