Reception and Dance at Weber to Bring Campaign to Close

Celebrating the end of an intensive campaign, Republicans tonight will make a merry at a reception and dance to be held in the Weber Normal college auditorium at 8 o'clock. The affair will be known as the "Candidate's reception" and all those functioning for office within the county will be present to mix with the guests and get better acquainted.

The reception will be open to all and invitation is especially extended to the younger people as well as those of other ages. Refreshments will be served and the entertainment committee promises some surprises and a general good time for all.

With the weather permitting, a parade will be staged in the business district preceding the reception, but no details have been given out for the reason that the parade is to contain many surprises which are held secret. The parade, however, will not be held if the weather brings an evening storm.

Tonight's affair will be given over entirely to entertainment and with the exception of probable introduction of the candidates, no speaking program has been arranged. A special musical program has been planned in addition to dancing.

All candidates are urged to be present in Republican headquarters this afternoon at 2 o'clock to attend a final candidates' meeting. They will go into conference with Arthur Woolley, county chairman and members of committee.

Tonight will also bring meetings to a close within the county with rallies at Huntsville, Eden and Pleasant View. Dr. J. B. Brimhall, president of the Brigham Young University, will be the principal speaker at Huntsville and Eden, and W. R. Peeler, Jr., and Mrs. Georgea Macriotti, president of the Woman's Republican club of Weber county, will address the meeting at Pleasant View.

Each morning he has the same query: "Will daddy be home today?"

Huntsville Home Destroyed by Fire

SOCIALISTS HAVE BIG GAINS, CLAIM

Party Will Poll a Vote of Three Millions Says Campaign Manager

CHICAGO, Nov. 1.—The Socialist party will "come back" at Tuesday's election, Otto Braunetter, campaign manager and national secretary of the party, declared Sunday. He predicted the re-election of Victor Berger to congress as well as the re-election of the five quoted New York assembly-

men and estimated the social presidential vote at 3,000,000.

Reviewing the Socialist campaign, Secretary Braunetter said:

"After three years of persecuting by the government and of lawless terrorization, sanctioned and encouraged by the recognized leaders and the press of both the Democratic and the Republican parties, the Socialist party covered this campaign with our presidential candidate in prison, the most of our papers suppressed, our organization entirely destroyed in many states, with a bankrupt treasury and heavily in debt.

"Despite these handicaps, the party has made one of the most wonderful campaigns in its history and the vote on November 2 will show that we have come back and come back strong. Reports from all sections indicate a wonderful sentiment for Socialism and a tremendously increased vote for our party candidates.

"A tremendously increased vote with the possibility of the election of a large number of Socialist candidates is a certainty in Oklahoma and Nevada. The triple alliance in the state of Washington and the members of the Nonpartisan league in North Dakota, Minnesota and Nebraska will cast a heavy vote for Debs and Steadman and the Socialist vote in the solid south will be twice what it ever was before."
