### HARDING WILL HUNT IN TEXAS

Port Isabel Is Paradise for Shooter and Fisherman

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas, Nov. 2.—Point Isabel, Texas, where Senator W. G. Harding has chosen to spend a vacation is a small fishing village and watering place of some 400 inhabitants on the gulf of Mexico and is the southern most mainland point of the United States.

A narrow gauge railroad connects the picturesque little city with Brownsville.

Off shore a little more than a mile is a narrow strip of land which skirts the Texas coast from Corpus Christi to the Rio Grande, about 120 miles.

**SPLENDID HUNTING.**

Point Isabel is famous as a sportsman's paradise. Fishing is excellent while adjacent marshes now abound in geese and ducks. Point Isabel also is noted for its oysters, edible the entire year.

Hotel accommodations are meagre, but an old club house, unused for several years, probably will be put in order for the senator.

During the Mexican war a part of General Taylor's army was landed at Point Isabel and marched westward to Brownsville, then Fort Brown.

Since then the little port has had its ups and downs. Until the building of the Brownsville railroad into the valley country 15 years ago light draught steamers landed at Point Isabel and provided communication with the world.

**SOLID FOR HARDING.**

People of the valley section contiguous to Brownsville urged development of Point Isabel as a deep water port. The project recently was recognized by an appropriation which will insure a harbor for vessels drawing 15 feet and citizens of the valley country have just subscribed for a bond issue to standardize the little railroad.

As if to preface a welcome for Harding, Point Isabel voted solidly for him, being one of the few southern towns to show him that honor. Brownsville nearby, is the home of B. H. Creager, who seconded Senator Harding's nomination at the Chicago convention.

### HARDING READY FOR VACATION

Successful Candidate to Journey to Texas Coast for Recreation

MARION, O., Nov. 3.—No longer a party nominee, but president-elect of the United States, Warren G. Harding turned his thoughts toward recreation today before approaching the formulation of his administration machinery and politics.

He plans to take a real vacation trip, which will give him two weeks of seclusion on the Texas coast, and a week of scouting in the Panama canal zone before he goes seriously to work choosing his cabinet and mapping the work he is to do after March 4.

He probably will leave Saturday morning, not to return again until about mid-December.

One of his tasks today was to read and acknowledge hundreds of telegrams of congratulation that had been pouring in since the balloting began yesterday. During the night as the proportions of the landslide to him became apparent the Marion telegraph offices were flooded beyond capacity and today the influx of messages and good wishes continued to come in in proportions that outdid the liveliest days of the campaign.

The senator did not get to his office until late in the forenoon, however, having been kept awake until long after midnight by his exultant fellow townsmen who chose his lawn as the forum for a succession of celebrations over the honor that had come to Marion and to their neighbor.

### FRENCH TO INTERFERE IF GREEK RETURNS

PARIS, Nov. 2.—The French foreign office informed the Associated Press today that France would not interfere in the Greek situation unless former King Constantine attempts to return to Greece. In such case it was added, "France will take such measures as are deemed necessary."

GENEVA, Nov. 2.—Constantine and Sophie, the former king and queen of Greece, still are keeping to their rooms in the hotel National at Lucerne, although Prince Paul is seen in the streets.

Constantine is greatly depressed by the report that Great Britain and France, which guaranteed the kingdom of Greece, would refuse even if the elections were favorable to him, to allow his return to the Greek throne.

### NEVADA BECOMES REPUBLICAN AFTER 12-YEAR ABSENCE

RENO, Nev., Nov. 3.—For the first time in twelve years Nevada has elected a national Republican presidential nominee. Incomplete returns show that Republican Charles Foxley has been elected by a majority of at least seven thousand. For United States senator, former Governor Odell has defeated Senator Henderson, Democrat incumbent. Ar-ents, Republican, has defeated Evans, Democrat, for congressman.

### DEPUTY SHERIFF ACCUSED BY 'DRY'

Michigan Officer Guided Rum Caravan to Safety, U. S. Chief Says.

MARQUETTE, Mich., Nov. 3.—Leo J. Grove, prohibition enforcement chief in the Michigan peninsula Tuesday wrote District Attorney A. C. Wolfe at Madison, Wis., asking the arrest of Ed Evenson, deputy sheriff of Iron county, Wisconsin, and Philip Shields, both of Marquette, Wis., charging conspiracy to violate the Volstead act.

Grove charges that after he had requested the assistance of Evenson in the capture of twenty-two automobile loads of whiskey being carried from Milwaukee to Hurley, Wis., the night of October 9, the latter stationed Shields on the route to warn the runners and the proximity of the federal agents. The letter alleges that Shields confessed to the prohibition agents in the peninsula territory of having been posted by Evenson to re-route the liquor burdener trucks.

Two of the trucks were captured after a battle which resulted in the death of John Chlapusko, Hurley whiskey runner, the letter to the district attorney states.

### NON-PARTISAN LOSES STATE

DENVER, Nov. 3.—Indications early today were that Colorado Non-Partisan league followers were beaten in their effort to gain control of the state government through the Democratic ticket in yesterday's election. With more than a fourth of the state reported, Governor Shoup, Republican, had a two to one lead over James M. Collins, Democrat-Non-Partisan candidate for governor. The ratio of Harding's plurality over Cox was nearly as great.

Manager returns in the congressional contests indicated the reelection of Congressman Valle, Timberlake and Hardy, Republicans. In the Fourth district, Congressman Taylor, Democrat, had a slight lead over Merie B. Vincent, of Grand Junction. Both Vincent and Taylor failed to carry their home precincts.

Four hundred and two precincts of the 1482 in Colorado gave: Cox 26-197; Harding 46,719.

Three hundred ninety-eight precincts for governor gave: Collins, Democrat, 24,656; Shoup 49,021.

In the congressional contests, 78 of 211 precincts in the first district gave Hilliard, Democrat, 7259; Valle, Republican, 15,218. Second district 27 of 461 precincts gave: Brown, Democrat, 1823; Timberlake, Republican, 4998. Third district, 80 of 471 precincts gave: Burris, Democrat, 3309; Hardy, Republican, 6094. Fourth district, 64 of 351 precincts gave: Taylor, Democrat, 3329; Vincent, Republican, 3242.

### NEGROES DIE IN ELECTION FIGHT

ORLANDO, Fla., Nov. 3.—Five negroes have been burned to death and another hung to a tree as a result of a fight which started at the polls at Coosa, near here, last night, after election officials had refused to permit Moses Norman, a negro, to vote on the ground that he had failed to pay his poll tax.

Two white men were shot and killed and several others, including a former police chief, were wounded in the fight which preceded the wholesale lynching. The negroes burned met death in houses in which they had congregated and which were fired.

### SENATOR-ELECT NOTED SPEAKER

Shortridge of California Put in Quarter Century in G. O. P. Politics

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 3.—Samuel Shortridge, senator-elect from California, has been prominent in politics of this state for more than a quarter of a century and has long been known as a clear and forceful orator. He has practiced law here since 1884 and in 1888, 1900 and 1908 was a presidential elector. Shortridge was born at Mount Pleasant, Henry county, Iowa, August 3, 1861.

Arthur M. Free, who was elected a member of the house of representatives from the eighth district, California, formerly was district attorney of Santa Clara county. Phil D. Swing, elected representative from the eleventh district, is superior judge of Imperial county, California. Free and Swing are Republicans and will replace Democrats.

### IDAHO SWINGS TO REPUBLICANS

Two to One Majority of G. O. P. Extends to Every Candidate

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 3.—Returns coming in today from yesterday's general election served only to increase the leads of Republican candidates showed over the Democratic and independent ones last night. Seven of these were in the ratio of two Republican votes to every Democratic one.

Robert N. Dunn had the largest lead of the lesser offices. Eighty-eight precincts in five counties gave him 12,707 and his Democratic opponent, J. H. Forney, 5572.

All Democratic candidates for national office and the Democratic candidates for governor are far behind on the face of returns from 398 precincts out of 825 in Idaho early today which gave:

Harding, 49,480; Cox, 25,190.

For senator, Frank R. Gooding, Republican, 28,774; John F. Nugent, Democrat, incumbent 32,246.

For governor, D. W. Davis, Republican incumbent 37,057; T. A. Walters, Democrat, 19,262; S. D. Fairchild, independent, endorsed by Non-Partisan league, 12,029.

For representative in congress 170 precincts in the first district gave Burton L. French, Republican, 14,734 and Mrs. Nell K. Iron, Democrat, and the only woman nominated for national office in Idaho this year, 7,352.

For representative from the second district, Addison T. Smith, Republican, received 24,529, and W. P. Whitaker, Democrat, 13,214 in 222 precincts reporting.

On the supreme court amendment 23 precincts gave for 2048 against 1332.
