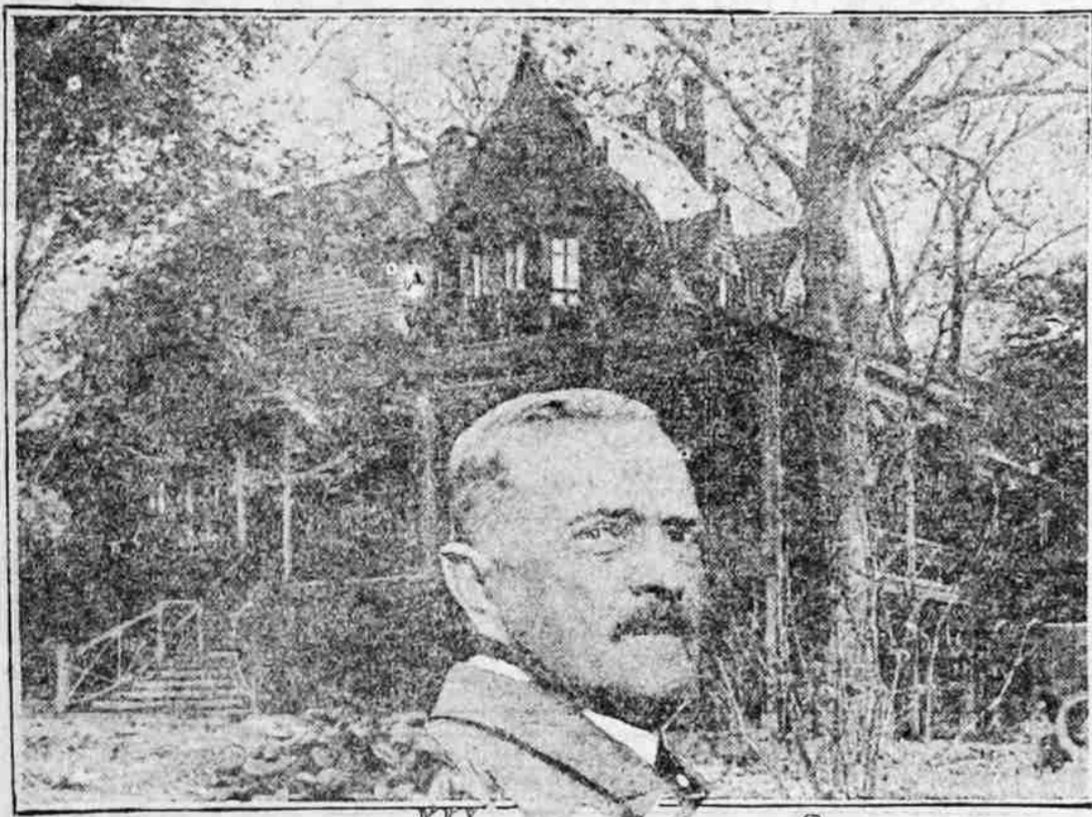

Declaring that in event of a money judgment he would be unable to collect, A. J. Walker this morning filed an amended complaint in his suit against Otto Meek and the Walker company.

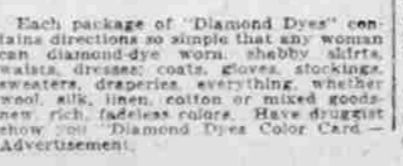
