HOGGE HELD ON SERIOUS CHARGE SPELL OF HARD LUCK STRIKES HARDING PARTY

Married Man Accused of Intimacy With 18-Year-Old Girl

David S. Hogge of West Weber, 27 years of age, was arrested at 1036 Twenty-second street early Sunday morning, with him the police say was an 18-year-old girl.

The arresting officers were Sergeant A. M. Stephens and Detective W. A. Jones.

Hogge is accused by the police of intimacy with the girl. His bail was fixed at \$1000.

According to the police the girl's parents have been away from the city and during their absence, Hogge is alleged to have lived with the girl at her home.

Hogge has appeared upon numerous occasions before Judge D. R. Roberts recently. His first offense was for checks which he had issued without sufficient funds. He was given a suspended sentence, with admonition that it was merely for the sake of his family that he was being allowed to go.

His wife, in addition to caring for her three children, paid for Hogge's bad checks. It is said.

Later Hogge was arrested on a charge of neglecting his wife and family. He was again given a suspended sentence and was warned that a jail sentence would result in case he again appeared. Later, the police say, Hogge went to his wife, who was living in destitute circumstances, to get bed clothing, he having secured a job on a threshing crew in Huntsville. His wife gave him what bed clothing she had, with the exception of one quilt. Hogge got the job and when it was finished, threw the bedding away. It is alleged, despite the fact that it was needed by his wife and children.

Train Breaks Down When He Seeks to Flee From Wind and Cold

POINT ISABEL, Tex., Nov. 15.—His vacation broken up and roadways to the outside world temporarily blocked by one of the worst storms in this section of the gulf coast, President Elect Harding planned to make another attempt today to get into Brownsville to spend in comfort the remaining two days of his visit to Texas.

He had already said goodbye to the frail seaside cottage that has sheltered him through three days of wind and cold, but his effort to get away came to grief when his special train, narrow gauge and gasoline propelled, broke down just outside of Point Isabel. After a dismal four hours on the windswept prairie he was returned here after dark last night, but his train was held for another try about noon today.

WILL MEET FALL.

In Brownsville Mr. Harding is to meet Senator Fall of New Mexico, who is chairman of the senate sub-committee on Mexican affairs, and they are expected to talk over border conditions. Members of the president-elect's party say there is no special significance in the meeting, however.

WORKING ON SPEECH.

During the morning Senator Harding did some work on the speech he is to deliver next Thursday at New Orleans just before he sails for Panama. He has not indicated what subjects he will discuss, but the economic possibilities of the south are expected generally to be a feature of the address. It is known that he has watched the general financial situation, especially stock market fluctuations, with interest and is making a study of remedying economic tendencies.

Impressive Service for Otto P. Farley

Speakers at the services were Superintendent Frank M. Briggs of the State school for the deaf and blind; Elder Max Woodbury; Paul Mark, E. A. Larkin and Mervyn Fowler.

Paul Mark, delivered his speech in the language common to the deaf and dumb. His words were interpreted to those who could not understand the signs, by Superintendent Briggs.

Each speech, as it was given, was translated either into one form of expression or the other, so that all present would know what was being said.

Musical selections were given by Robert Greenwell, Mrs. Mary Farley and Miss Lorene Snyder. Interment was in the Ogden City cemetery. E. A. Larkin dedicating the grave.

Soldier Accorded Military Honors

A military funeral for Private Frank A. Isaakson was held at 12:15 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the Fourth ward chapel. Bishop Hyrum Lund officiated.

Speakers at the services were Captain A. W. Clawson of Salt Lake; Elder Anderson of Hyrum; Mrs. J. G. Paick, representing the Service Star Legion; Captain J. R. Wadsworth, Lyles W. Larkin and Bishop's Counselor Edward Saunders.

Robert Greenwell, formerly of the marine corps, sang "The Americans Come" and "No Night There." Miss Josephine Shorten sang "My Task" and "The Flag Without a Stain."

The body was interred at the Ogden city cemetery, Lyles W. Larkin dedicating the grave.

The State industrial school band played a dirge as the cortege made its way from the chapel to the cemetery. Two hundred members of the Ogden high school R. O. T. C. and representatives of the 145th (Utah) field artillery accompanied the body. Pall bearers marched on each side of the hearse. A firing squad accompanied the body and fired a volley over the grave of their departed comrade.

Bugler Irving Hodge of the high school R. O. T. C. played taps over the grave. As the body was lowered the S. I. S. band played a funeral selection.

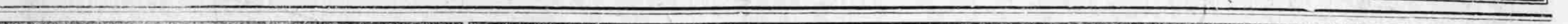

The work of the congress in co-operation with the federal government with mining operators and others interested in the development and utilization of our mineral resources has been and will be of immense benefit. It provides an opportunity for discussion, education and dissemination of information and cannot fail to be helpful in improving and advancing the mining industry.
