FIFTY-SIX TRAINS IN 24 HOURS With the issuing of a new time table by the Ogden Union Railway and Depot company, this city has fifty-six regular passenger trains arriving and departing each day on the steam roads and, in addition, electric cars are north and south bound every hour.

There are six Union Pacific trains arriving each day, bringing traffic from the east. West of here the Southern Pacific is operating five trains each way, a new train having been placed in service on November 14.

The Union Pacific and Southern Pacific roads, during all the period since the completion of the first transcontinental in 1869, have more than kept pace with the progress of the country.

JAPANESE IN THE ISLANDS.

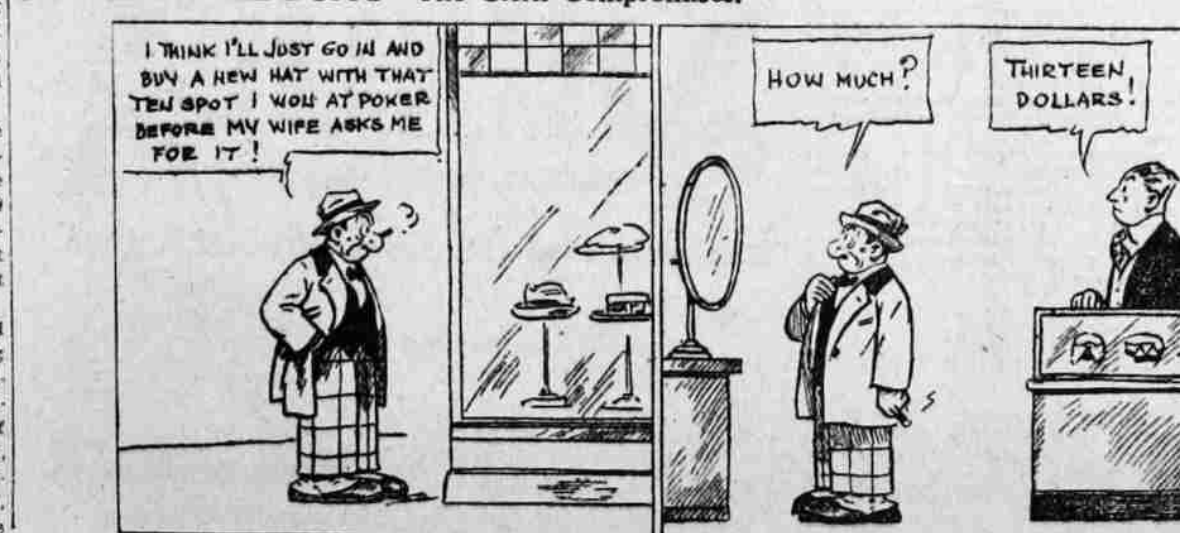
