

## PLAN FLIGHT TO HERE IN SPRING

March Field Squadron to Fly  
Here Probably During  
April

Twelve army aviators will make the hop from March field, Sacramento, to Ogden during the early part of 1921, according to Captain Walter Marchant, aviator, who was in Ogden, visitor early today en route to his home at Omaha, where he will spend Thanksgiving holidays.

The trip, according to Captain Marchant, will be made to determine whether or not Ogden will be represented with a flying field as well as an arsenal in 1921.

Although little has been said about the proposed landing field and aviation center at the arsenal, it is stated that such a field will be prepared and that if the flights to and from March field are successful, army planes will be stationed at the arsenal for flights to and from the coast.

"Although no definite dates have been set as yet for the trials for the flights, it is expected that they will be held during the month of April," said Captain Marchant.

March field has some of the best flyers in the service and the twelve best flyers at that camp will make the trip. Present plans call for an aviation center at the arsenal site, but these plans, of course, will have to receive the sanction of the war department at Washington.

Three Utahns are stationed at March field and will, in all probability, be listed with the flyers to make the trip, if the plans of the war department are worked out, according to Captain Marchant.

## Al Young Meets Papke Monday Night

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 19.—Young Papke, the Sacramento lightweight who beat Eddie Lynch of Nebraska in the semi-final of last Monday night's boxing show at the Manhattan club, has been matched to meet Al Young of Ogden in the six-round feature event of Hardy K. Downing's weekly show in the Hippodrome theater Monday night.

There will also be a number of other feature bouts on the card, as well as an added attraction in the form of an extra number between Willie Solits and Frankie Harris of Ogden, which should make the bill one of the best ever staged by the club.

Harris and Solits were booked for last Monday night and considerable disappointment was caused when Harris failed to show or notify the local promoter so that he could secure a substitute. However, it has since developed that Harris injured his hand Monday afternoon and sent a wire in ample time, saying that he would be unable to appear, but the message was not delivered until the following morning. In view of the fact that Harris was not at fault, and as Manager Downing promised the fans an extra bout next week to make up for the one cancelled last Monday night, he decided to give the fans the same match as the added feature.

The semi-final will bring out a couple of headliners in Red Newey of Ogden and Jack Costello of Fort Douglas. These boys are both clean and hard-hitting welterweights who are likely to bring home the bacon any time they connect, and, as they are both willing mixers, they should furnish plenty of real thrills.

These two were booked a short time ago, but Costello was on the sick list the night of the bout. They are both on the job now and will battle it out this time.

Jimmie Munson, the promising youngster from the west side, will tackle a new comer in Connie Mack, Johnny Williams, another west side who made such a hit with the fans last winter by his gameness and willingness to battle, will be in the lineup for the first time this season when he meets Walt Heart, the hard-hitting brother of Art Brugger.

Mack Fadden and Bert Nelson, a brand-new pair of middleweights, will make their debut before the local club in the first preliminary of the evening, while West Ketchell and Jack Rato, another new pair, will furnish the opening bout.

## S. P. WORKS ON IMPROVEMENTS

Trackage at Ogden, Carlin  
And Other Nevada Points  
Increased

Improvements totalling more than \$100,000 are being made by the Southern Pacific lines in the Salt Lake division according to local officials. The improvements consist of relaying rails, enlarging the trackage in the yards at Ogden, Wells, Carlin and Sparks and the building of several new spurs to be used as sidings.

The yards at Carlin will be made 50 per cent larger than they are at the present time, it is said. Work on the local yards is now underway and improvements totalling more than \$25,000 will be made, according to local officials.

Road equipment totalling more than \$250,000 to be used on the entire Southern Pacific system, consisting of rails, ties, engines and other equipment, has been ordered for immediate delivery.

With the enlarging of trackage in the local yards, it is expected that the traffic in freight shipments will be handled faster and with better results.

New ties are being laid over parts of the road between Ogden and San Francisco and in some places the road is being double tracked.

## REDS FEAR BRITISH WILL SEIZE BLACK SEA TOWN

LONDON, Nov. 19.—A wireless message from Moscow says that M. Tschitcherin, the foreign minister, has received information that the British intend to seize the Black sea port of Batum. M. Tschitcherin protests to the British foreign minister against the seizure of Russian towns. In this way, the soviet minister says, the allies would seek to create a new front in the Caucasus.

Tschitcherin declares the soviet government will combat any such seizure in a way.

A similar notification has been sent to the government of Georgia, the soviet foreign minister says.

The foreign office here today denied that Great Britain had any intention of seizing Batum or other ports on the Black sea.

## Cooler Temperatures Promised for Ogden

Rain and cooler temperatures are predicted for tonight in the Ogden district, according to the report of the United States weather bureau, which reached the city this morning. The rain, however, will be of short duration, for the forecast for tomorrow is "fair."

Yesterday's maximum temperature was 65 degrees, with a minimum of 48 degrees last night.

## NEGRO ATTORNEY SEEKS JACK JOHNSON'S RELEASE

TOPEKA, Kan., Nov. 19.—Eliha Scott, a negro attorney of Topeka, left last night for Washington to ask the federal pardon board for the release of Jack Johnson, former heavyweight pugilist champion, from the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas.

## PRISONERS MAKE ATTACK ON JAILED 'DRY' AGENT

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Nov. 19.—S. Glenn Young of East St. Louis, prohibition enforcement officer, was attacked and beaten by a number of federal prisoners in the county jail here last night when he was incarcerated on an indictment returned in Madison county charged him with murder. Young was placed in the "bull pen" of the jail until a writ of habeas corpus could be secured for his release. A number of the prisoners who held him responsible for their being in jail for violation of the prohibition laws attacked him. They administered a severe beating and were throwing hot water upon him when jail officials came to his rescue. Young was indicted for the murder of Luke Vuckovic on November 6 at Madison, Ill., during a raid upon the Vuckovic home in search of whiskey.

## FARMERS LIKE OPEN SHOP AND BARGAINING PLAN

BOSTON, Nov. 19.—The National Grange adopted a resolution Thursday declaring for the open shop and in favor of collective bargaining.

"We disapprove of any system," the resolution said, "which denied to any individual the right to work in any place where there is need of his industry at any time and at any wage which is satisfactory to him, or to quit his employment wherever and whatever reason may be to him controlling, subject only to such contract obligations as he may willingly enter into and as may be imposed in an American court of justice."

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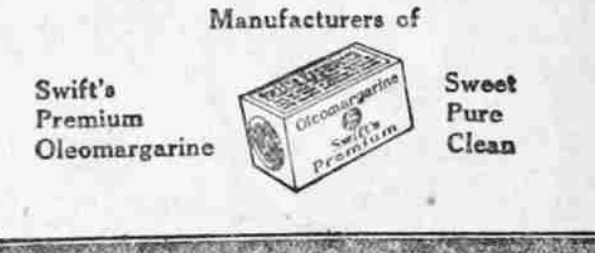
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
