

# 'BLACK AND TAN' RAID DESCRIBED

### Irish Town Commissioner Tells of Cruelties at Inquiry Here

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—(By the Associated Press.) "Charging that the black and tan riots in Ireland made raids without provocation John Derham, town commissioner of Balbriggan, Ireland, gave today to the commission of the committee of one hundred investigating the Irish question what he described as details of the September raid on his home town, which, he said, resulted in the death of half a dozen persons.

"The black and tan spent a night of yelling, burning and shooting," said Mr. Derham.

The Balbriggan commissioner declared that James Lawless and John Gibbons were stabbed by the militia. He said that a score of houses were burned and that the contents of those left standing were wrecked. About 100 refugees were herded into a hotel Mr. Derham said.

Mr. Derham said he was dragged from his bed and severely beaten by troops and then his own shop was first ransacked and his stocks of liquor destroyed before his house was burned.

The final act of destruction, he said, was the burning of the 500,000 horse-power factory which, he charged was done to cause unemployment and destitution.

This raid followed the killing of one policeman and the wounding of another, Mr. Derham told the commission. The military inquiry, however, had failed to establish the identity of the persons who had killed the officer, who was shot, Mr. Derham stated, while in the act of taking liquor from a bar room where the barmaid had refused to sell him more because of his intoxicated condition.

The resignation is effective January 1 next, at which time Dr. Finley will have completed seven years' service as commissioner of education.

"My conscience would trouble me in leaving this field if I did not feel that having served nearly 20 years in it, in one or another capacity, I must return to the profession for which I especially prepared myself," he said in a statement.

Dr. Finley explained that during his student days at Knox college, he intended to enter the newspaper field. While a student he "stuck type" on a village newspaper, worked as reporter and had some experience as an editor. After his graduation he engaged in newspaper work for some time but left it to accept the presidency of Knox college.

He is 57 years old and a native of Illinois. He was graduated from Knox college in 1887. He has received honorary degrees from many American universities and colleges.

## UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT ENTERS NEWSPAPER WORK

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 19.—Dr. John Huston Finley rendered his resignation as state commissioner of education and president of the University of the state of New York to the board of regents Thursday. He will enter "an important advisory and editorial position," with the New York Times.

## COURT DECIDES AGAINST D. & R. G. STOCKHOLDERS

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 19.—Refusal to permit postponement of the sale of Colorado property of the Denver and Rio Grande railroad was announced in a decision by the circuit court of appeals here today. A petition of stockholders, for the postponement was heard at Omaha last Monday.

The sale was originally ordered as the only practical way of satisfying a judgment against the railroad company amounting to \$25,000,000. Payment of principal and interest of \$50,000,000 bonds of the Western Pacific road, a subsidiary, was guaranteed by the Denver and Rio Grande.

Judge Walter H. Sanborn, who gave out the decision today, held the petitioners for postponement of the sale failed to present facts on which a court of equity could annul the judgment obtained in New York by the Equitable Trust company in 1917.

## TWO THOUSAND GO BACK TO WILLYS AUTO PLANT

TOLEDO, Ohio, Nov. 19.—Two thousand men have been put back to work in the parts department of the Willys Overland Automobile company according to an announcement by Vice President Kilpatrick. The announcement carried the statement that there has been no reduction, purporting to correct a rumor that some of the men accepted 55 cents an hour with a maximum of 57 cents an hour.

The company in normal times employs men and women. It is said, The entire plant was shut down recently.

## WOMEN ALSO MUST DOFF HATS IN THE COURTROOM

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—Equal suffrage for women means that they must not wear their hats when in his court room. Justice of the Peace E. P. Aring, declared Thursday when he fined two women \$5 each for contempt of court when they refused to remove their hats. The women paid.

When the justice called the court to order he said:

"Everybody will please remove their hats."

Mrs. Oscar McCann and Mrs. Frederick Ritter, failed to do so.

"Five dollars and costs for contempt of court," said the judge.

"If women can have equal suffrage with men, they can also remove their hats in my court room."

## EGAN REFUSES PLACE ON IRISH PROBE BOARD

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—Dr. Maurice Francis Egan, former United States minister to Copenhagen, recently appointed a member of the committee of one hundred investigating the Irish question, sent a telegram expressing his regret at being obliged to resign from the committee as he felt no findings could be useful unless the committee had power to enforce the presence of witnesses.

A statement by Professor Irving Fisher of Yale university, made public here, said that he was invited to join the committee, but never accepted.
