MURDER EXCITES N. Y. CHINATOWN

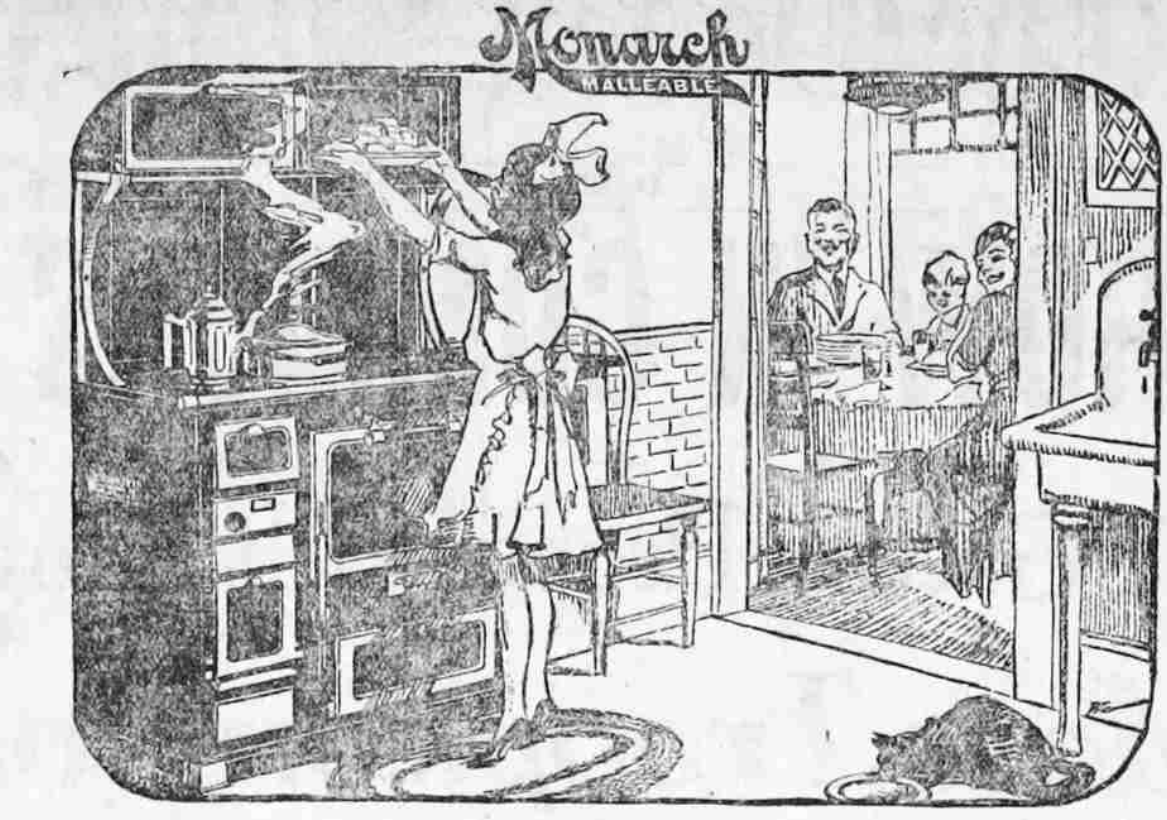
Believe Longman Revealed Secrets to Rival Society

MEXICAN NOT AUTHORIZED TO DEBAR SENATOR FALL

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 22.—Roberto V. Pesquera, Mexican confidential agent in the United States, acted without authority in ordering Mexican consular agents on the international frontier not to vize the passports of United States Senator Albert E. Fall, of New Mexico, who proposed to visit Mexico City and attend the inauguration of General Alvaro Obregon as president on December 1.

INCREASED GRAIN RATES TO MIDWEST SUSPENDED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—The interstate commerce commission suspended today until March 23, 1921, schedules providing for increased commodity rates on grain and grain products in railroad lots from St. Louis, Mo., Minneapolis, Chicago and Peoria, Ill., and all points taking the same rates, to Kansas City, Mo.

RAILROADS PROTECTED ON CANADIAN MONEY LOSSES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—The interstate commerce commission today approved an order requiring the payment in United States money and payment of charges on shipments between Canada and the United States. The effect of the action would be to require shippers to prepay in American money charges for interstate transportation wholly within the United States. American railroads would thus be protected against loss by reason of depreciation in Canadian money.

WOMAN THOUGHT OFFICER WAS BANDIT; KILLED HIM

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 22.—Charles J. Becker, 48, a guard in one of the city parks, was shot to death early Sunday by Mrs. Marie Scott, 34, when Becker and another guard halted an automobile occupied by Mrs. Scott and her husband, Samuel J. Scott, after pursuing it through the park in a truck. The Scotts, according to the police, stated they thought Becker and his companion were bandits and Mrs. Scott is said to have explained she intended only to "scare" them. They were released on bond pending an inquest.

MURDER OF OFFICERS FOLLOWED BY FIRING ON FOOTBALL CROWD

DUBLIN, Nov. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—Twenty-six persons are dead and seventy others are lying in hospitals as a result of Sunday's orgy of assassinations and the wholesale shooting in Crooke park, where soldiers fired on the crowd which gathered to witness a football game between the Dublin and Tipperary teams.
