\$400,000 Gem Theft Victim

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—Police and detectives here are searching for nearly a half million dollars' worth of gems and jewelry stolen from Mrs. Charlotte King Palmer, wealthy divorcee here. The thieves first bound and gagged the house servants after they had answered the doorbell, believing their mistress wished entrance, and then, awaiting Mrs. Palmer's return, seized and gagged her also before stealing jewels she wore, worth \$400,000.

STOCK MEN GET CHANGE TO BUY PACKER'S STOCK

Morris and Company Presents Plans for Disposal of Holdings

CHICAGO, Nov. 23.—Plans for the sale of the interest of Morris and company, packers, in stockyards and terminals in such a manner as to permit their acquisition by livestock producers and the general public, was to be filed today in the supreme court of the District of Columbia. Interests which it is proposed to offer under the plan are: Kansas City Stockyard company, Kansas City, Mo.; St. Joseph Stockyards company, St. Joseph, Mo.; St. Louis National Stockyards, East St. Louis, Ill.; Oklahoma National Stockyards company, Oklahoma City, Okla.; Crescent City Stockyards and slaughter house, limited, New Orleans, La.; El Paso Union Stockyards company, El Paso, Tex.; New York Stockyards company, New York.

CAPITAL STOCK LISTED. Capital stock in four stockyard terminal railroads is listed. The proffer is in compliance with the decree made mandatory February 27, 1920, by consent of the "big five" packers and the department of justice for the divorce of the packing business from stockyards and other industries not directly connected with the meat business.

PRISON TERMS FOLLOW ATTACK ON CONSULATE

BRUSSELS, Germany, Nov. 23.—Fifteen persons accused of the recent attack on the French consulate here, some found guilty and have been sentenced to terms varying from one to twelve months in prison. Five of the accused persons were acquitted.

GREAT BRITAIN TO TELL KING NOT TO RETURN

Premier Rhalhis Says Greece Is Ready to Give Allies Guarantees

ATHENS, Nov. 23.—The government has decided, in order to expedite matters, that the plebiscite on the return of former King Constantine shall be held on the electoral lists. The government newspapers announce that Premier Rhalhis will visit the entire capitals to open direct negotiations with the allied governments.

PARIS, Nov. 23.—Great Britain has already taken steps to inform former King Constantine of Greece, and George Rhalhis, the new Greek premier, that she is absolutely opposed to the return of Constantine to the Greek throne.

FORMER EMPRESS OF GERMANY SEEMS TO BE AT DEATH'S DOOR

DOORN, Holland, Nov. 23.—(By the Associated Press).—Former Empress Augusta Victoria, of Germany, was very weak this morning. Her temperature rose to 104 degrees during the night. The former empress has been unconscious since the beginning of her latest attack yesterday.

NOISY WELCOME GIVEN HARDING ON ARRIVAL

COLON, Vanuatu, Nov. 23.—Warren G. Harding, president-elect of the United States, arrived at Cristobal at 9 o'clock this morning on board the steamer Parisina. He was given a noisy welcome by the craft in the harbor. Mr. Harding went direct to a hotel.

AUTO BREAKS UP PLOT TO MURDER JAPAN PREMIER

TOKIO, Nov. 20.—An attempt to assassinate Premier Hara was to be made on May 8, last, it is disclosed by the publication of the findings of a preliminary court which tried a former artilleryman named Ito, who was charged with planning an attempt against the premier's person with seven bombs.

FLOATING MAD HOUSES FILLED WITH MISERY

Indescribable Conditions Are Found on Horror Vessels At Constantinople

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 23.—(By the Associated Press).—The condition of the refugees aboard the ninety or more ships strung along the Bosphorus is a terrible catastrophe. The correspondent visited several of these "floating hospitals and mad houses" Monday and returned to shore with forebodings of impending calamity.

GERMANS SEE COIN SMUGGLED BY ARISTOCRACY

One Hundred Eminent Persons Accused of "Sneaking" Money to Holland

BERLIN, Nov. 23.—One hundred eminent persons, among them Crown Prince Rupprecht, Prince Eitel Friedrich, Prince August Wilhelm, the late Prince Joachim, Count Radolin and Princess Wanda Radolovitch have smugged to Holland money aggregating 250,000,000 marks, asserted Hermann Mueller, former German chancellor, in the Reichstag today.

ST. LOUIS STRIVES TO KEEP COMMERCE STEADY

National Move Launched to Prevent Stagnation and Unemployment.

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—Representatives of more than 1200 retailers of clothing, dry goods, shoes and millinery throughout the country organized the Council of National Retail Associations here today in an effort to meet the crisis in the retail trade due to steadily falling prices.

PREMIER TRICKED INTO FALSE HOPE BY RUSE OF FOE

PARIS, Nov. 23.—Former Premier Venizelos of Greece is despondent over his defeat at the polls on November 14 and may retire permanently from politics. In any event he will await definition by the powers of their attitude toward Greece, said Sophocles Venizelos, son of the former premier, to Paris correspondents at Nice this morning.

ASSEMBLY AND COUNCIL TILT OVER ARMENIA

Question of Carrying Out Resolution for Intervention Causes Interest

COMMITTEE NAMED TO LOOK INTO SITUATION

Clash to Come If Counsel Refuses to Carry Out Body's Determination

GENEVA, Nov. 23.—(By the Associated Press).—A clash between the council and the assembly of the league of nations on the question of carrying out the assembly's resolution of yesterday for intervention in the Armenian situation loomed up as a possibility this forenoon as the assembly met for today's session.

FLORIN CONTINUES TO DROP, BUT BAKERS MAKE ONLY SMALL CUT

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 23.—In line with yesterday's break in the wheat market, flour extended its decline of yesterday with an additional break today of 20 cents in the price for family patents. Although one large mill's quotations were unchanged, another flour house reduced their price to \$5.40 a barrel from \$5.60. Quotations in the flour market here today ranged from \$5.40 to \$5.90 a barrel.

BOLSHEVIK FORCES ALSO VICTORIOUS ON FAR EASTERN FRONT

HAREN, Manchuria, Nov. 23.—Units of General Semenov's anti-Bolshevik army have surrendered to the Russian soviet forces which they are said to have joined. It is reported these units which made up a considerable portion of the force commanded by General Semenov, killed their officers. Many of the men managed to escape into Mongolia.

GERMAN DYE MAKERS TO ERECT PLANT HERE

BERLIN, Nov. 23.—Preparations have been made by the German aniline syndicate to erect nitrogen plants in the United States and Japan and directors of the syndicate have already opened negotiations with those governments, says the Zeitsung Am Mittag.

STATES IN ARGENTINE SHAKEN BY TREMBLOR

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 23.—Earthquake shocks were felt in the states of Cordoba and San Luis at 6:29 o'clock last evening. No damage has been reported.

REVISION URGED

The subject of the covenant of the league of nations came up again at today's session of the assembly of the league. H. A. Van Karmbeck, of Holland, addressing the assembly on his resolution that a committee be charged with the study of the revision of Article XVIII on the registration of treaties, held that the article was now subject to three different interpretations as to the legality of unregistered treaties. He urged revision of the article to make its meaning clearer.

DEBATE AVOIDED

Debate on the Polish-Lithuanian conflict, which was threatened for a time on a demand by Lord Robert Cecil for full information, was avoided by an explanation from the chair that negotiations on the subject by the council were still in progress. Lord Robert also demanded greater publicity for the proceedings of the council and a promise was made on behalf of the latter to comply.

MEX CONSULS ORDERED TO ADMIT SENATOR FALL

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 23.—Mexican border consuls have been instructed by the foreign office to issue the passport of United States Senator Albert B. Fall, of New Mexico, who announced a few days ago he intended to come to this city to attend the inauguration of General Alvaro Obregon as president of the Mexican republic. This order from the foreign office disregards the action taken on Saturday by Roberto A. Pesqueira, Mexican confidential agent in Washington, who instructed Mexican consuls along the frontier not to issue any passport presented by Senator Fall.

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
