Mystery Accident At Hot Springs Is Investigated

VICTIM UNABLE TO GIVE REASON FOR HIS INJURY

Unknown Worker Left Refuge From Storm, Dragged Himself Back

TWO COUNTIES UNITE TO MAKE INVESTIGATION
Sub-station Operator Finds Pool of Blood Along Tracks

At press time today it was learned that the man hurt at Hot Springs was Carl Anderson, a sheet metal worker who had walked away from the Dec hospital yesterday.

Further investigation is said to have disclosed blood in a pump station at Hot Springs, adding strength to the theory that he was attacked and not hit by a train.

ASKS FOR SHELTER.
About 2 o'clock this morning the stranger entered the sub-station of the Utah-Idaho Central railroad at Hot Springs and asked for shelter from the blizzard then raging.

INVESTIGATION STARTED.
The sub-station operator made an investigation. He found some of the stranger's gold teeth on the railroad ties.

BAVARIA FOR LAW AND ORDER OFFICIAL SAYS

Reports of Plans to Restore Monarch Misleading, Minister Tells Correspondent

BERLIN, Nov. 27.—(By the Associated Press.) Reports that organizations have been formed in Bavaria for the purpose of restoring the monarchy are misleading and are being used by the government to stir up the passions of the people.

LAW AND ORDER.
"In the first place let me say that 'Ordnung' does not exist in Bavaria," he said. Herr Escherich is head of the state police and he has been in discussion with that organization, which centered a movement to restore the Wittelsbach regime in Bavaria and carry out a program of far-reaching changes in German government.

LIKE VOLUNTEER FIREMEN.
"How many members has the 'Einwohnerwehr'?" he was asked. "Possibly 200,000," he answered, "and probably many less than that figure, as the organization is very loose and members are constantly joining and resigning."

1920 FOOTBALL SEASON CLAIMS THIRTEEN LIVES

Five More Victims Than in 1919, Reports on Death Show

LIST OF VICTIMS.
The list of victims: Franklin Worrell, Omaha, Neb., 12 years old, died October 20 of a fractured skull sustained in a "sand lot" game.

EDWARD BOHN, St. Louis, Mo., 22 years old, fractured skull as a result of a fractured spine as a result of being tackled.

JACK REEVES, 25 years old, fullback Kansas football team, died November 7, paralyzed as a result of spinal injury.

MELVIN KEPPLER, Lock Haven, Pa., 17 years old, died September 7; neck broken in high school game.

NEILSON LEMANNA, Pharr, Tex., 15 years old, died October 31; injured in high school game.

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RAY CLOUGH, 14, WILL TELL OF FATHER'S DEATH

Attorney Tells Jury That Mother Gave Pistol to Boy Slayer

HIDDEN IN WEEDS 'TIL DAY OF SHOOTING
Prosecution Completes Its Case; Defense Calls Younger Brother to Stand

LEO CLOUGH, 12-year-old brother of Ray Clough, 14-year-old Ogden boy on the trial for the murder of his father, before a jury in Judge A. W. Egge's division of the district court this morning took the witness stand and testified as to the bringing of the revolver with which his father was killed, to the Clough home.

RETURN WITH PISTOL.
Leo, when he took the stand, stated that he remembered his mother sending Ray and his smaller brother to the park to recover the pistol. They returned at dusk, he said.

YESTERDAY'S EVENTS.
At the completion of yesterday afternoon's session District Attorney Stuart P. Dobbis announced that the state rested. Detective Everett Noble continued testimony during the session opened at 1 o'clock and told of further details in regard to the statements of Ray Clough that he shot his father, believing him to have murdered his little brother. The officer also told of happenings at the Clough home following the shooting.

POSITION OF BODY.

The diagram was then submitted to the jury for examination.

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
