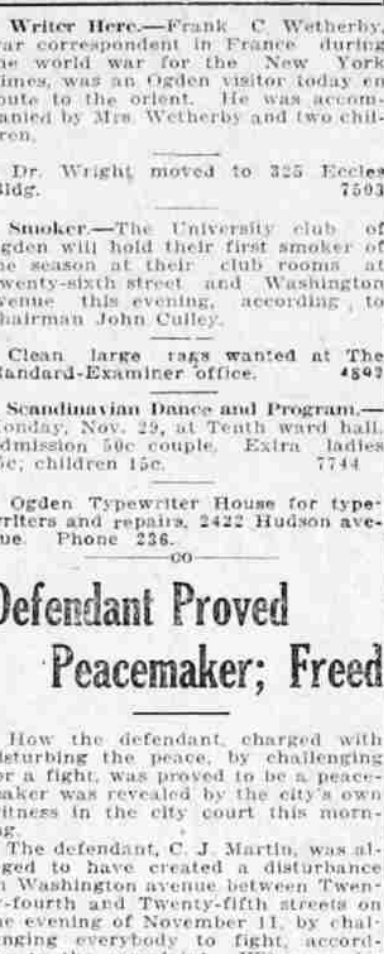
Horse Runs Away; Owner Fined \$10
