

SEAL ATTESTS TO PURITY OF CANNED GOODS

National Organization Maintains Branch in Ogden to Inspect Utah Factories

With the new sanitary seal of the National Canners' association inspection service, attesting to clean and healthful conditions in packing, more than 700,000 cans, bottles and jars of the 1920 food pack are now being placed on the market.

The inspection service has been directed in Utah by A. S. Daggett, chief inspector, with George Shorten as inspector, with headquarters in Ogden.

During the canning season, Captain Roy Noggle was with the inspection service. Utah canners have taken much interest in the inspection service this year and have assisted materially in carrying through the plan for all of the plants.

The sanitary seal is the mark of approval by an inspection service first inaugurated by the association over five years ago. The inspection service, with headquarters in Washington, is now organized in seventeen districts over the United States.

Every can labelled by the inspector, according to the committee's announcement, will give the purchaser the Association's assurance that the materials are sound and properly cleaned before canning.

The inspection and labeling service is a voluntary movement on part of the association to cover any requirements they consider as standard for properly canned foods and which are not specified by law.
