

# NEXT FIRST LADY AT WHITE HOUSE THREE PROPOSED IN NEW CABINET

### Mrs. Harding Entertained at Tea and Shown About Place by Mrs. Wilson

### John W. Weeks, Will Hays and Harry Daugherty Are Put Out in Front

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—For the first time within the memory of the oldest attaches of the White House, a first lady of the land, entertained Monday a next first lady of the land.

Mrs. Florence Kling Harding, wife of the president-elect, was the guest of Mrs. Edith Bolling Wilson, wife of the president, at an informal tea for two at the executive mansion late in the afternoon.

After Mrs. Wilson and Mrs. Harding had chatted a while, they walked about the White House through the green and red rooms and the state dining room, over which Mrs. Harding will be called upon to preside after next March 4. Mrs. Harding did not meet the president, who had retired to his study on the upper floor to read, nor was she shown over the White House kitchen.

Mrs. Harding prepared to depart after spending an hour with Mrs. Wilson and had progressed as far as the front doorway when Mrs. Wilson suddenly recalling details of the White House household organization, which she had forgotten to impart, invited her back and they withdrew again to the blue room, where they talked for another twenty minutes.

Upon leaving the White House, Mrs. Harding remarked that she had had "a very pleasant visit, indeed," but she asked to be excused from answering any questions as to her visit. This was her first meeting with Mrs. Wilson, and her first visit to the White House.

Mrs. Harding had a busy day in Washington. She went to the capitol in the morning and was in the gallery at the opening session of the senate. She had lunch at the capitol restaurant with her Washington hostess, Mrs. E. B. McLean, and Dr. and Mrs. C. E. Sawyer. As Mrs. Harding left the lunch room, she met Mrs. Marshall, wife of the vice president, and immediately, as old friends, they embraced.

Mrs. Wilson's invitation to have tea at the White House was received by Mrs. Harding in the forenoon, and she immediately accepted. Before going to the executive mansion, she called on a number of friends in Washington.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—(By the Associated Press).—Speculation about the possible cabinet selections of the incoming administration was cast into more definite lines Monday by consultations between President-elect Harding and leaders of his party in and out of congress.

Three names which stood in the foreground among the many discussed as possible cabinet members were those of John W. Weeks of Massachusetts, for secretary of the navy; Will H. Hays, of Indiana, the Republican national chairman for postmaster general, and Harry M. Daugherty, of Ohio, the Harding pre-convention manager, for attorney general.

Prominence also was given by the day's conferences to the possible selection of David Jayne Hill of New York, former ambassador to Germany, as secretary of state, although such leaders as Charles Evans Hughes, Ethel Ross, Senator Knox, Senator Lodge, Senator Fall and others still were prominently mentioned for the portfolio in some quarters.

Regarding the other places in the new official family, gossip was less definite and the list of possibilities was the Republican campaign committee.

That no formal offers had been made was emphasized by Mr. Harding himself as the only comment he was willing to make on reported selections or on his discussion of the subject with Republican leaders.

No place has been offered to anyone, the president-elect said. "Beyond that I can only reply to questions about the cabinet with sweeping assurance that I have nothing to say."

Mr. Hays, Mr. Daugherty and Mr. Weeks all were present at the conferences with Mr. Harding on this and other subjects. Throughout the campaign, these three were among Mr. Harding's closest advisers on questions of policy, all having been members of the Republican campaign committee.

Another close friend of the president-elect who took part in the conference was former Senator George Sutherland, of Utah. Heretofore his name also had been associated with cabinet gossip, but the impression gained around that he would prefer some other appointment, either in the diplomatic service or to the supreme court.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—An appropriation of one million dollars to be used in cooperation with the states in forestry work during the next fiscal year was asked of congress today by the department of agriculture.

Secretary Meredith also asked for legislation which would authorize him to recommend the essential and standard requirements to protect timbered and cut-over lands from fire in reforestation denuded lands and where necessary to aid in the proper methods of cutting and removing timber for the best promotion of continuous production.

## BOY TELLS WILD STORY IN COURT

Eastern Lad Took Payroll Money to Visit Wounded Father in Spokane

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Justice Franklin Chase Hoyt of the children's court who writes fiction stories in off-hours when he is not passing judgment on the alleged wrong doings of little girls and boys, had a start Monday when he recognized in a 14-year-old Elmer Michener, the original—or, at least, the twin brother of one of his own brain children.

Young Michener, arrested Saturday with \$2,640 in his pockets as he was buying a railroad ticket to San Francisco, had just recounted a tale which included all sorts of thrills from riding extra fare Pullman trains and playing the gentleman in sumptuous hotels to holding up a Philadelphia policeman.

"Hold on there, sonny," interjected the judge. "I wrote that story myself three months ago."

Then, after hearing him to the end, Judge Hoyt turned to the authorities of Philadelphia.

White-eyed, but without apparent emotion, young Michener, who said he had never seen his father, declared he left his mother and his Philadelphia home several weeks ago bound for Spokane, where his father is in a hospital recovering from gunshot wounds inflicted in Idaho. To raise transportation money, he said, he took part of the payroll of the Baldwin Locomotive works in Philadelphia.
