

LECTURE ON CHRISTIAN SCIENCE GIVEN HERE BY DR. JOHN M. TUTT

Dr. John M. Tutt, member of the board of lecturership of First Church of Christ, Scientist, Boston, last night gave an authorized lecture on Christian Science, entitled "Christian Science, the Leaven of Spirituality."

opening the way to a long delayed life work, and setting her feet upon the path of nearly a half-century of loving service. To her the spiritual leaven came, as through her selfless ministrations it has leavened to countless others.

"Christian Science is repeating that invitation today, and multitudes have accepted the loving call, and are learning, through its study and appreciation, how to make it practical in their earthly experiences, and it has indeed given them, as we read in Isaiah, beauty for ashes, the oil of joy for mourning, the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness."

"We have one with us this evening who will present this measure of the blessed Masters, as fully as it can be done in one short lecture. Friends, it is my greatest pleasure to introduce Dr. John M. Tutt, C. S. B., of Kansas City, Mo., or the board of lecturership of the Mother Church, the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass."

A summary of Dr. Tutt's lecture follows: The world today is experiencing a revival of interest in the things of the Spirit. Public expression abounds with reference to the spiritual needs of humanity. Materialism, even in its refinements, has failed to satisfy human aspiration. Everywhere men are turning from matter to Spirit, just as the confident that, under divine direction, spiritualization of life will justify human need today and will meet the longing and the hope for a spiritual tomorrow.

I am sure that those of you who have observed Christian Science enter the life of a friend or acquaintance, and there can be few, if any, who have not been witness to such a miracle, will testify to a deep, a fundamental change which has come over that individual; you will testify, moreover, that the change is decidedly for the better. Whereas, perchance, he was ill, he has become well; wherein he was a bad citizen he has become a better one; for what he has acquired is supply abundant for his needs, instead of gloom, he has come to radiate cheer, once dependent and fearful, he has become sufficient for his responsibilities and bold to meet them. What has happened to that man? He is being leavened. His thought, and hence his life, are becoming spiritualized. He is beginning to behold the vision of man untrammelled by matter and is coming into his rightful sense of dominion over all. He continues in the world, though no longer of it, yet tenderly responsive to its needs, and just as he himself is being leavened he communicates the ferment to his environment to the betterment of all with whom and with which he comes in contact.

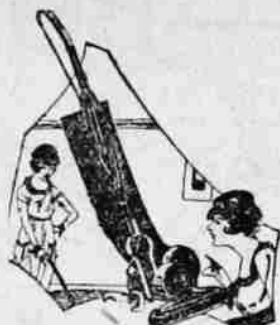
MRS. EDDY'S DISCOVERY. The purified state of consciousness is the kingdom of heaven on earth for which Jesus prayed and taught all Christians to pray. How much of this kingdom of harmony can we expect to see here and now? Just the degree of his leavening, just the measure of his spiritualized thought. Before one can go to heaven, heaven must come to him on earth. That is the import of Mrs. Eddy's great discovery. Christian Science was God's response to her uplifted heart, the reward of her unselfish devotion. It came freeing her from the limitations of a frail body, Science does not come to destroy

Science, theology and medicine, but rather to leaven the human concept of them. It comes to purify, and to old things. In the leavening, science is shown of physical fetters, theology is cleansed of the misconceptions of creed and dogma, and medicine is relieved of matter and properly related to Mind. Thus spiritualization of thought raises the concepts of science, theology, and medicine to a higher basis, reveals them to be in truth modes of divine Mind, and restores them in human consciousness to their rightful place, from which material theories have displaced them.

People generally are aware that Christian Science has touched the lives of individuals and has worked in such person profound changes for the better in mind, in morals, in body. Have you ever considered the changes in general thought and life since Christ? Science began its reformatory mission? Not only have individuals been affected directly, but the transforming influence has extended to the universal thought, so that those who have not yet come to know Christian Science have nevertheless been formed to much of its basic teaching. Science, though slowly, and oftentimes by devious by-paths, thought has come into agreement with the great spiritual facts revealed in Christian Science. Coincidentally basic changes have occurred in human affairs, touching the academy, the pulpit, and the medical forum to higher, even to more spiritual, levels. Science, theology and medicine are so woven into the warp and woof of human existence that they constitute its motif. Indeed, involving as they do salvation, both here and hereafter, these are the indispensable factors in human life today; they are the basis of the hope of a tomorrow. Now the human mind is finite, its every action is, of course, limited. The human mind's concepts of science, theology and medicine, never rise above the limits by which the human thought is bounded, for it can of itself rise no higher than itself. That self is material, and hence to the unenlightened thought, science, theology, and medicine seem material. Physical science, scholastic theology, and material medicine have operated in human consciousness to belittle God with finite, material matter, and to bind man with the trammels of matter.

DIVINE MENTAL MODES. Spiritually considered, and therefore rightly viewed, science, theology, and medicine express modes of divine consciousness, activities of the divine mind, or the infinite principle, God. To be true, to be Christian, religion must take into account these divine mental modes, human action based on them is most Christian, most spiritually scientific, hence nearest right. Christ Jesus, science, his theology, his medicine, were spiritual and therefore were true. Christian Science, without the limitations of matter, was the Science of Christ Jesus. Christian theology without scholastic dogmas was the religion of Christ Jesus, Christian healing without material media, was the medicine of Christ Jesus.

BRITAIN'S SILVER DEBT SETTLED

U. S. Grants More Time for Paying Obligation Incurred in War

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Under an agreement with the British government the debt of \$122,000,000 due this country for silver purchased during the war will be paid by 1924, according to details of the plan made public today by Secretary Houston. During the war the treasury arranged to sell the British government bullion obtained from melting silver dollars at the rate of \$1 an ounce in conformity with the Pittman act to relieve the silver shortage in India. Of the \$122,012,533 owed the United States for purchases of silver \$17,833 has been paid with interest. The remaining \$122,000,000, the secretary said, is to be paid in equal annual installments with accrued interest at five per cent from April 15, 1919. Until payment in full of the principal with interest, the secretary added, the British government will permit the treasury to make tenders to purchase Rupee credits offered by the Indian government on the same terms with British nations. This he explained, will afford an opportunity for

Americans to obtain Rupee credits at the same cost as those credits are offered British subjects.
