

BE TO PAY ON NEXT MONDAY

Date Advanced Two Days:
\$3,500,000 to Be Given Out

More than \$3,500,000 will be paid farmers of Utah and Idaho next Monday by the Amalgamated Beet Sugar Company for beets delivered to the various factories during the month of November, according to Vice President S. J. Black. The date has been changed from Dec. 15. The check for Idaho farmers will be mailed early Monday, while the Utah farmers will be paid at the local office. It is estimated that the Amalgamated will have paid out more than \$7,000,000 during the season for the beet crop which is a far greater amount than that which was paid out last year.

This year 600,000 tons of beets were purchased from the farmers by the Amalgamated sugar company, which is the largest crop ever contracted for here.

Factories in all sections of the state are in Idaho are working day and night on the beet crop, and it is expected that the heaviest part of the work will be completed during the early part of January.
