FORMER KING GETS WORD TO RETURN HOME

Constantine Tells United States He Feels Like a U. S. President

LUCERNE, Switzerland, Dec. 11.—(By the Associated Press.)—Official notification of the result of the plebiscite in Greece and an invitation to return to Athens and re-ascend the Greek throne immediately were received by former King Constantine here this morning.

QUEEN NOT WELL.—Because of the health of Queen Sophie, plans had been made for Constantine and his family to travel by the way of Brindisi, but on account of the arrangements made for his return, his plans have been changed and the family will leave Lucerne on an ordinary train probably on Monday.

MESSAGE TO AMERICA.—Former King Constantine of Greece in an open message to the American people today says he feels like the president of the United States inasmuch as he has been elected to rule over Greece by popular vote.

ELECTED TO OFFICE.—In returning to my country and reascending the Greek throne, which I was forced by the entente and the intrigues of a political party to abandon for three long and trying years, I feel more than ever as the president of the United States must feel.

TWO ARE BARRED.—Professor Georgios Strat, former foreign minister and Constantine's chief adviser during his exile, who is reputed to be pro-German, and Captain Stefan Paparrigopoulos, commander in the Greek navy and Constantine's aid de camp, are prohibited from returning to Greece by the Greek government in the telegram inviting Constantine to return.

WHOLESALE PRICES TOPPLE 35 PER CENT

But Cost of Living Drops Only 10 Per Cent, Says One Authority

Most authorities agree that real revival is unlikely until war inflation is squashed and prices are brought already depressed in a number of commodities. They should recover first.

LIVING COSTS.—Although wholesale prices have fallen on around 35 per cent from the peak, the cost of living is down less than 10 per cent.

UNDERTONE STEADY.—Business generally continues in an uncertain mood. A fever undertone appeared in a few lines last week, however. Holiday buying has helped retail trade.

ST. LOUIS PLAN.—Sentiment among merchants to place orders more liberally for spring is spreading. St. Louis stores have announced their intention of going into the market.

ADVERSE FACTORS.—Smaller bank clearings and rising business failures remind that readjustment is proceeding. Graduated reports that November insolvencies were 1925 with liabilities of \$29,751,000.

INDUSTRIAL CONDITIONS.—The credit clearing house says there is less buying at present and greater indebtedness than in 1917 or 1918. It bases its reports on information from many business houses.

WHEAT RECOVERERS.—Larger export sales, unfavorable foreign crop reports and hope of financial aid from congress have caused wheat to advance 25 cents a bushel from its recent low point.

COTTON LOW.—Cotton at around 16 cents a pound is believed at rock bottom. It has dropped from above 40 cents since summer.

COL. GEORGE HARVEY HOLDS CONFERENCE WITH SEN. HARDING.—MARION, O., Dec. 11.—Suggestions for a new American foreign policy, including the formation of an association of nations, were heard by President-elect Harding today from Colonel George Harvey, who was one of his closest advisers in formulating his campaign policies toward the Versailles league.

HUGE CONFAB ON BASEBALL IS UNDER WAY

Judge K. M. Landis to Be Given Powers of a Czar Over Game

NATIONAL AGREEMENT WILL BE FORMULATED

Restoration of Draft System Likely to Be One Result of Meet

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—Committees representing the major and minor leagues, with Judge Landis in the chair, convened here today for a new national agreement to govern professional baseball.
