ACTOR HURT AT M'GRAW HOME SUES FOR \$25,000

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—Suit for \$25,000 has been begun against John McGraw vice president and manager of the New York Giants, by John C. Slavin, actor. CZECHO-SLOVAK POLICE FIRE ON STREET CROWD

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Dec. 11.—(By the Associated Press.)—A detachment of police endeavoring to clear a crowd of demonstrators from in front of the parliament building today, finding itself surrounded and attacked, the authorities fired, first upon the crowd, wounding at least sixteen persons, four of them seriously. The government buildings are being guarded by troops.
