Appealing to Santa Claus for Christmas gifts of some kind, little girls and boys of Ogden are writing letters to their patron saint which would go unanswered were it not that Santa Claus has some assistants in Ogden this year the members of the Good Fellows. In many instances the children have lost one or the other parent, in some cases both. Some of them have crippled fathers; their mothers are invalids or, having fought against the high cost of living for months they have no funds with which to even buy the smallest trinkets for Christmas gifts.

Each year since that time Santa Claus has sent his Christmas presents to her the Good Fellow tracks. Now she needs shoes and clothing, and so do her brother and sister who are somewhat older, and who have gotten away from the idea of writing letters to Santa Claus. There will be in the next few days dozens of such letters to Santa Claus. Each year the people of Ogden have responded to the call of the Good Fellows, sponsored by the Ogden Standard-Examiner, and the anticipation is that they will send their contributions once more. Gifts of toys, dolls, books and games that have been used by children and are now being discarded for new are acceptable in many instances. Clothing of all kinds has found ready use—both for children and for their mothers. Food supplies are anxiously sought. Besides these there will be need of cash with which to buy other toys, dolls and clothing, especially shoes and stockings.

The Good Fellow fund has been started. A few dollars have been deposited with the Standard-Examiner for this fund. It should be increased each day, so that there will be an opportunity to prepare for the big distribution on Christmas eve and Christmas morning when the Boy Scouts will help the Good Fellows by taking the Santa Claus parcels from end to end of the city.

CITY'S SPEED LAWS UPHELD

Judge Pratt Rules That Municipality Has Right to Regulate Traffic

Reasonable speed regulations made by the city ordinance will be upheld by the district court, according to a ruling made yesterday afternoon by Judge A. E. Pratt in the appeal of the case of city against Sam Gravitt.

Gravitt was arrested by traffic officers several months ago upon the charge of driving his automobile with out license plate. He pleaded guilty in the city court and was fined \$5. Later he appealed the case to the district court, upon the ground that the city commission did not have the power to pass laws regarding automobile traffic. He contended that this power was held only by the state. The court yesterday sustained the demurrer of the city to appeal and ordered the case dismissed.

Fix Bonds for New County Officials

Bonds to be furnished Weber county by the Republican office holders who take the county reins January 3 at 12 o'clock noon, were set yesterday afternoon at the regular meeting of the board of county commissioners.

The highest bond to be given by any county officer is that of David Evans, county treasurer, who is already serving. The bond for this office is \$425,000.

The bonds of the new officers follows: County clerk and auditor, \$10,000; county recorder, \$10,000; county assessor, \$10,000; county sheriff, \$10,000; county surveyor, \$2000; county attorney, \$5000; justice of the peace, \$1000; constable, \$1000; members of the board of education, \$2000 each.

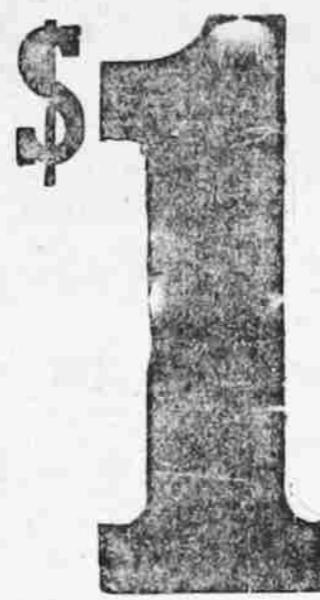
The bonds must be furnished when the new officers take office, January 3.

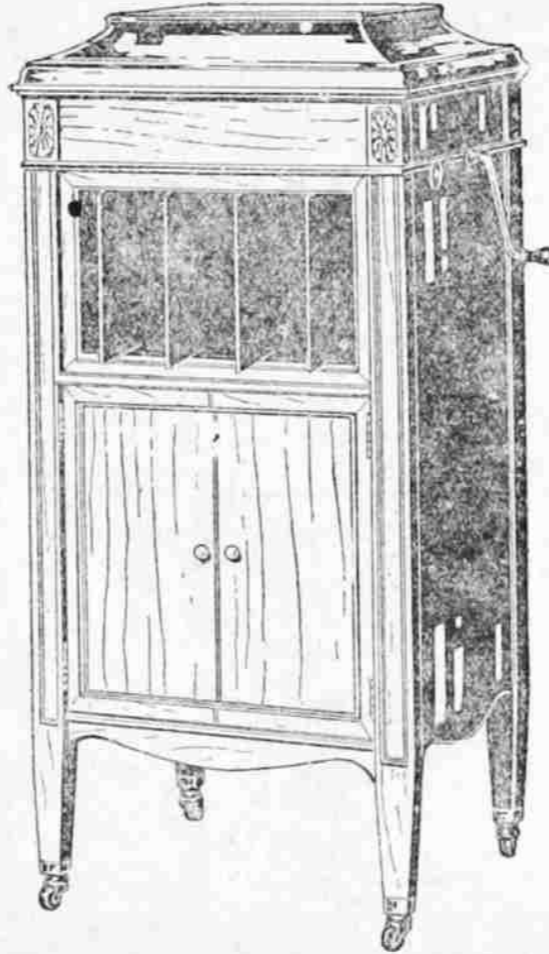
Hearings Postponed in District Court

Mayor Has Picture of Coast Lynching

A flashlight photograph of the three bodies of gangsters recently hanged near Santa Rosa, California, clearly showing the men hanging from a tree limb before having been cut down, has been received by Mayor Frank Francis. The men were taken from the jail by a mob and hanged after they had been arrested for attacks upon young girls and the murder of three peace officers.

The photograph was sent to Mayor Francis by E. S. Bassett, formerly of Ogden who is now obtaining a law education in California. Mr. Bassett said he would soon return to Ogden with a doctor's degree attached to his name.

The photograph is one which was withheld from publication in California newspapers owing to the hideousness of the scene. Mr. Bassett noted on the photograph, "This is just a sample of California civilization."

Seek to Have Woman Held for Murder Freed

Motion to quash information filed against Mrs. Laura Barker, charging her with murder in the first degree for the death of her husband, Charles Lee Barker from arsenic poisoning, has been filed in the district court by W. R. Shoen and George Halverson, attorneys for the woman. The motion declares there was no evidence adduced at the preliminary hearing held in the municipal court showing the defendant committed the act charged in the information.

Mrs. Barker is still being held in the county jail. The matter of admitting her to bail was brought before Judge A. E. Pratt in the district court yesterday, the court taking the case under advisement in this respect.

Sperry Mill to Start Operation Tomorrow

The flour mill at the Sperry Flour company's plant in Ogden will start operation for the first time since the mill was completed, tomorrow. Representatives from various Sperry plants throughout the west have arrived here to inspect the plant, and other officials will also attend.

Lighting systems for night work were tested last night. Work on the mill was started March 6, 1919, and has just been completed. The mill will have an output of 250 barrels of flour daily.

Convicted Men Taken to State Penitentiary

Fred Wasley, sentenced to serve from one to twenty years in the state penitentiary for the theft of an automobile, and Basil Demos, sentenced to serve one to ten years upon conviction of having obtained money under false pretenses, were taken to the state prison yesterday afternoon to begin their terms by Deputy Sheriff Dick Woodton.

Wasley was convicted in the district court last week of having stolen an automobile belonging to W. H. Draney, of Ogden. Demos was convicted of having sold a store and stock of merchandise to Charles S. Wheelwright, representing the stock free from debt. It developed after Demos had disappeared that \$700 was still due on the goods. Demos was arrested in East St. Louis, Mo., after a chase of several months.

'Swat the Fly Now,' Urges City Official

"Swatting the fly" at this time of the year may appear to be a matter of but little consequence to the average citizen, but the killing of one pair of the winged pests before Christmas will eliminate 452,900 offspring of that pair of flies next summer, according to information received by J. Ray Ward, commissioner of public safety. The request that Ogden take part in the early winter fly hunt has come from the Merchants' association on pollution and sewerage in New York.

Commissioner Ward has asked that Ogden residents aid in the fight against the fly and hunt them in out-of-the-way places where they are hibernating for the winter months. Electric light globular shades on front porches are mentioned as a place where these flies might be found at this time.

It will emerge from its winter quarters to greet us on Easter day and will begin to raise its summer progeny—the worst enemy to humanity. It may be found in all warm places in the home, especially in the kitchen and dining room, languid and lazy, and can easily be disposed of by housewives or children.
