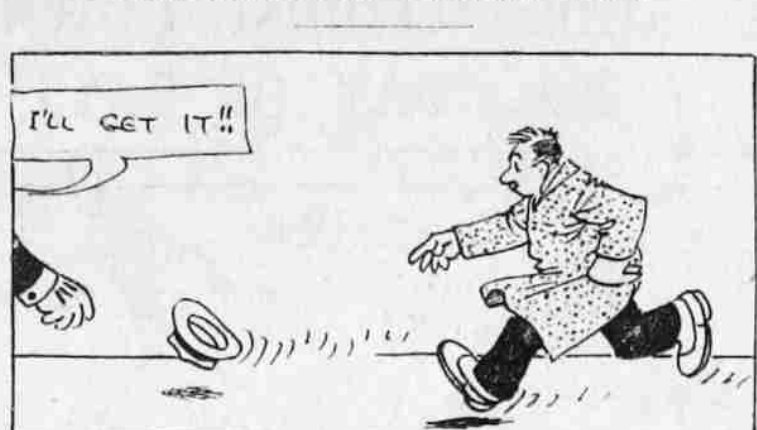

OFFERS BILL TO SAVE BUFFALO

Congressmen Welling Proposes to Make Preserve of Antelope Island

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—A bill appropriating \$300,000 for the purchase of Antelope Island in Great Salt Lake for a national bison range and game preserve, to be known thereafter as the Utah National Game Preserve, has been introduced by Representative Welling.

Another plan that has been discussed in this connection is one to place the state purchase of the island, the remainder into state park and game preserve, with the federal government retaining the right to acquire the island property would about pay the cost of removal.

It has been proposed that other wild animals native to Utah might be placed on the island, if it were made a national game preserve of the kind indicated in the Welling bill.

SALT LAKE, Dec. 18.—After a separation for seven years, Mrs. Anne Pilger yesterday arrived in Salt Lake from Pottitow, Poland, with her two sons to greet the husband and father.

came to see us." Speaking of conditions in Poland at the present time, Mrs. Pilger, through Mrs. Ann Zeifman, her Salt Lake friend and interpreter, said:

"The little sons of Mr. and Mrs. Pilger are Samuel, aged 9 years, and Solomon, two years younger. The second son was born four months after Mr. Pilger had set sail for the United States. He had been in America only two months when he came to Salt Lake and for the past six and a half years has conducted the Salt Lake Shoe Repairing company's business at its present location."

It was seven weeks to a day from the time we left Pottitow until we got here," she said. "I had to go with the children to Warsaw to get a passport through the American consul there. I don't remember his name. From Warsaw we went to Rotterdam, Holland. There they kept us, while we waited in a very bad place. It was awful; like hogs in a pen; thousand of men, women and children; white, black, yellow, well and sick; all mixed together—so dirty that many people took sick and died from the filth. The food was poor and they would not let anyone send out a letter or a telegram."

It was much better than the ship. They gave us plenty to eat, but everybody had to get up at 4 in the morning and eat breakfast at 5. At 11:30 we ate again and our night meal was at 6 o'clock. The Jewish Immigration Aid society (Mrs. Pilger is a Polish Jew) looks after all our people there and sees that they are well cared for. We are allowed to send word to our relatives in New York and they asked to tell how we was treated there said.
