At the conclusion of the contest the fans showered money on the two youthful stars, more than twenty dollars being collected by the coming champions.

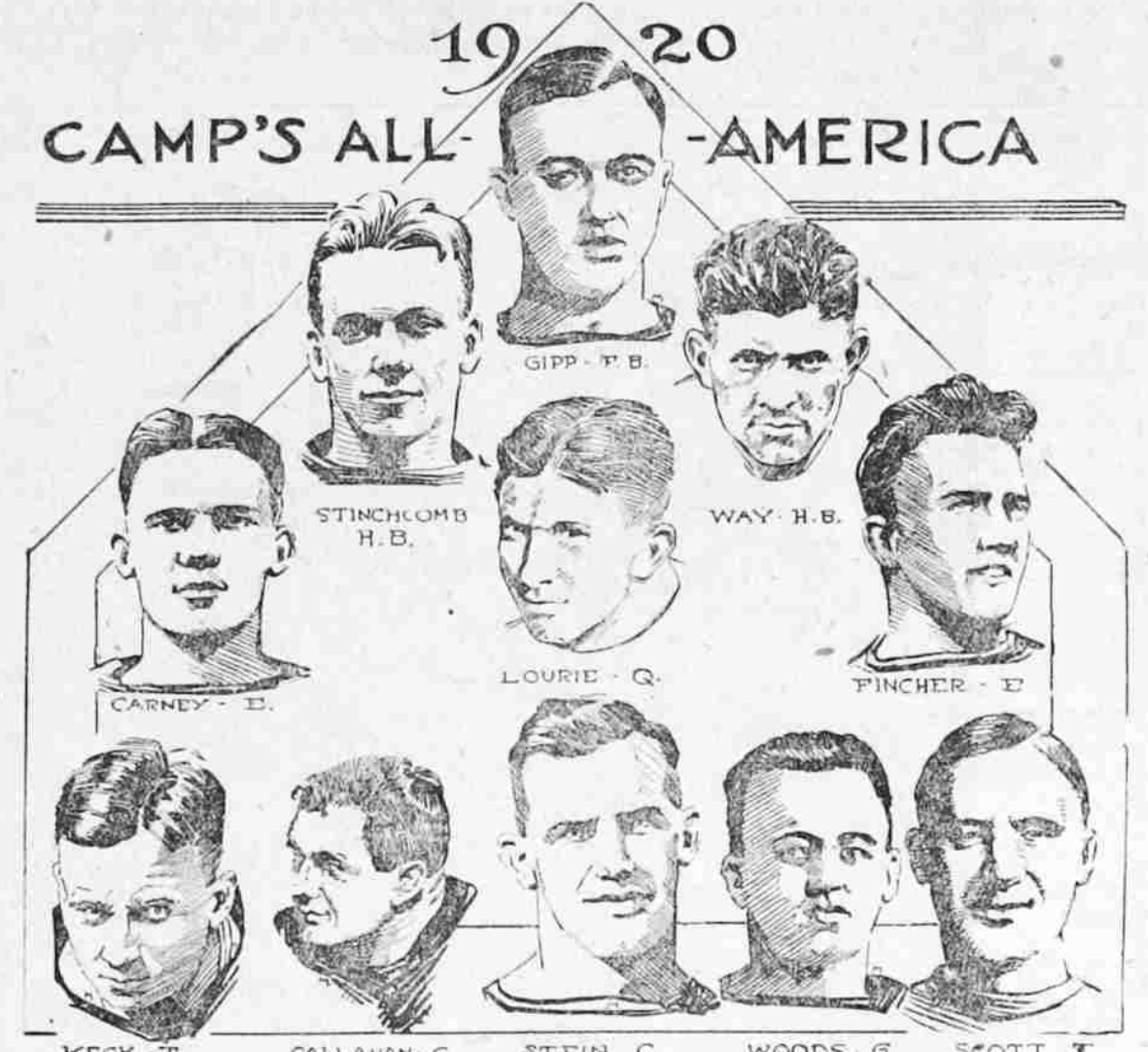

WALTER CAMP'S PICK Greater Breadth of Ability Represented On 1920 All-America Eleven, He Says



BY DEAN SNYDER. Perhaps no greater honor can come to a football player than to be named as a member of Walter Camp's All-American team.

Camp has been picking his mythical eleven since back in the '80s. But his selection for this year in Collier's magazine, in his opinion, a far greater breadth of ability of every member of it than any selection he has yet made.

He says that the development of the game has put additional requirements on each individual position, so that players have acquired an undreamed-of amount of football ability and smartness.

As an illustration he takes Stanley Keck, Princeton's star tackle, and shows what he actually accomplished in the Tigers' two hardest games of the year.

Keck, he says, met the charges of the Harvard men, shifted to meet formation plays, broke through and hurried the passer and kicker and finally brought about a touchdown by blocking a punt.

In the Yale game he did all these things with the exception of blocking a punt, but in addition he scored a field goal by a placement kick. He also acted as Lourie's interior when the brilliant quarter ran for a touchdown.

WISCONSIN'S STAR. Camp gives the other tackle position to Scott of Wisconsin. His reason for selecting the Wisconsin star is that Scott possesses great football power which is due to his weight, strength and speed for a heavy man.

One guard is allotted to Tim Callahan of Yale and the other to Woods of Harvard. 'They are both huge,' he says, 'and possess ability to diagnose plays quickly and as lightning they are impragmable.'

ENDS AND CENTER. Carney of Illinois and Fincher of Georgia Tech are given the rank of being the best ends of the year. 'Carney has played practically an errorless game and Fincher,' he says, 'is needed for a mythical eleven on account of his power in attack, his long reach and his general build.'

Camp picks as center, Captain Stein of Pittsburgh. In his opinion there isn't much difference in his first choice and his second, Bill Cunningham of Dartmouth. Stein came through the season with a little less glib, says Camp.

BACKFIELD CHOICES. Louie of Princeton is his 1920 All-America quarter, due to his uncanny consistency with Yale. McMullin and Boynton are on a joint with the Tiger star in all other points.

George Gipp of Notre Dame draws the full back position on Camp's first stringers on account of his versatility and power. His ability to punt to drop-kick, forward-pass, run and tackle, is all everything that a back-field man is required to do in superlative form.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Dec. 18.—Twenty-three members of the Ohio State university football squad, undefeated champions of the western conference, left this morning for Pasadena, Cal., where they will meet the University of California eleven New Year's day.

In addition to the team and its corps of coaches, trainers and camp followers, half a hundred rooters were aboard the special train, which is scheduled to land the Buckeyes on the scene of combat next Friday.

Two practice sessions are scheduled on route—at Denver, Colo., December 23 and Palo Alto, Cal., December 25—and several other stopovers will be made at points where alumni have arranged receptions for the party.

The Buckeyes finished their daily practice schedule yesterday with a light workout on a snow-covered field. Coach Wiley announced that recovery of several men from slight injuries would probably mean that all regulars would be in action at Pasadena.

Following a visit with relatives in Salt Lake, Dempsey will depart for the coast, where he will stay until it is time to hike east for his scrap with Jess Willard, March 17.

M'CARTHY WILL RESIGN POST

Coast League Meeting at Sacramento Replete With Exciting Features

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Dec. 18.—Because of what he termed a movement to "oust" him from the presidency of the Pacific Coast league, W. H. McCarthy of San Francisco yesterday twice refused re-election to that office.

McCarthy said an effort was being made "to make him pay the penalty for his stand in the Rumlum case."

There are some club owners in this league who rank even above certain major league magnates and there are others who have no place here and should not be here," McCarthy said.

FOR CLEAN UP. "While a general housecleaning in baseball is imperative, and while the conduct of the players must be carefully investigated when occasions demand, there must be a clean up among the club owners themselves if the game is to remain one of our national institutions," said McCarthy.

When it was said that Jack Cook, secretary of the Salt Lake club, head of the opposition to McCarthy, Cook issued a statement denying the report.

Cook said the fact that William Lane, president of the Salt Lake club, had voted to re-elect McCarthy president. The owners favored McCarthy's continuance as president unanimously, Cook said, but there existed this afternoon "a difference of opinion as to whether or not his salary should be increased."

Cook stated that the Salt Lake owners frankly disagreed with McCarthy regarding the Rumlum case, but that this feeling had not entered into the meeting and that the Utah magnates had no intention of bringing the case up for discussion in the league conference.

The matter of next season's schedule was carried over until the meeting in January. In view of McCarthy's determination to refuse the presidency, the selection of officers will also be completed at that meeting.
