HOME RULE BILL AGREED

LONDON, Dec. 18.—When the amended Irish home rule bill reached the house of commons from the house of lords this afternoon, it was announced by Sir Laming Worthington-Evans for the ministry, that the government accepted the proposal framed by the upper house regarding the Irish council. This removed the only outstanding difference between the houses and indicated the speedy adoption of the bill.

APPEAL AGAINST DISORDER
