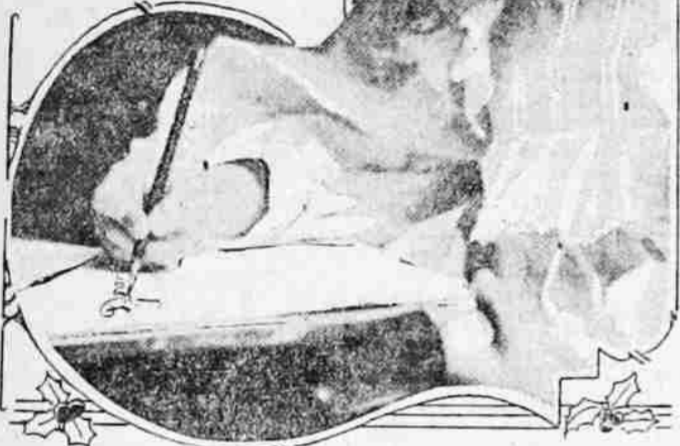


Little Tots Write for Shoes, Stockings and Xmas Gift If Any Left

Poor children of Ogden are appealing to Santa Claus to provide them with some sort of Christmas cheer. Some of the letters from these children have been received by the Good Fellows, who are making preparations to answer them in a substantial way as assistants of Santa Claus. Cases of moderate illness of parents, others where the father is crippled or out of work, some instances of where widows and their families are in dire need are being disclosed by these letters.

TO START SHOPPING.

ITALIAN NAVAL FORCES BATTLE WITH VOLUNTEERS

ROME, Dec. 18.—(Dispatches from Zara, Dalmatia, report that 200 troops by order of Rear Admiral Miliu, commander of the Italian naval forces in Dalmatia, marched to the barracks of the Dalmatian volunteer corps for the purpose of disarming the volunteers. The Italians resisted, rifle shots were exchanged and several on both sides were wounded. The commander of the carabinieri intervened and the troops were withdrawn.

Sugar took another drop in Ogden yesterday. Some of the retail stores were selling sugar at \$9 per hundred pounds, while others asked from \$9.10 to \$9.25 per hundred pounds. No additional drops have been recorded in other parts of the country according to officials of the Amalgamated Sugar company.

Ogden Boy to Debate Against Princeton

Ernest Wilkinson, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Wilkinson, 1702 Gibson avenue, former orator and debater at the Weber Normal college, and president of the student body of that school prior to his graduation, has been selected as one of the three students of the Brigham Young university at Provo who will represent Utah in a debate with the Princeton university team.

The debate will be held at Provo December 22. Interest in the debate is at a high pitch at the Provo institution and coaches and instructors of the debating team feel that the "Mormon" boys stand an excellent chance of equalling, if not defeating the all star eastern trio.

The subject for debate will be "Resolved: That Congress should pass a law prohibiting strikes in essential industries, constitutionally waived." Wilkinson has established a reputation as a debater and extemporaneous speaker. While a student at Weber Normal college he won the debating championship in 1915. He was a member of the debating team at the B. Y. U. last year which defeated the Nevada university and also won the championship speaking contest at the B. Y. U., as he did at the Weber Normal college.

Governor-elect Charles Mabey has been invited to act as chairman of the debate and judges will be selected from the best legal talent of the state. His teammates will be George S. Hallif and E. H. Hargreaves, both of whom are said to be good debaters. The Princeton team is making a tour of western states but will appear in the first contest with the Brigham Young University.
