

GARY FORESEES BRIGHTER TIMES

Steel Magnate Says People Want to Buy Freely at Reasonable Prices

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—The present economic depression in the United States is the result of "natural and necessary readjustments" and "until these are completed, we may not expect all we might hope for," Albert H. Gary, chairman of the board of directors of the United States Steel corporation, declared here Wednesday. While there are "many" things in the general atmosphere which are disquieting, he said, he is as "hopeful and confident of the future" as he has been at any time.

Attributing conditions throughout the world—criminal outbreaks, revolutions, quarrels and "the disposition to get something for nothing even by force if need be," to the war, he declared, "the capitalist will be amazed at contemplating how near insane a large number of the public officials and private individuals seem to have been."

FAIRNESS IN BUSINESS. Mr. Gary asserted "the golden rule in business has been temporarily suspended, but the majority of people have some excuse he explained. 'For they have been influenced by the examples of their national administrations.' 'Public authorities, or some of them,' he added, 'have been guilty of some of the offenses to which I have alluded. Future generations looking back to the present, will be amazed at contemplating how near insane a large number of the public officials and private individuals seem to have been.'

READY TO SPEND. The United States, he declared, "has demonstrated that, with the exercise of the proper spirit and the utilization of its natural forces, can master any economic situation far worse and more difficult than the present situation."

The reason there have not been more failures in business, Mr. Gary pointed out, "is because of the vast wealth of this country, its vast resources and the best spirit in the finest people in perhaps the greatest country in the world."

"There is abundant proof," he added, "that money in the United States is plentiful and those who have the money are willing to spend it just as soon as selling prices are considered fair, reasonable and stable."

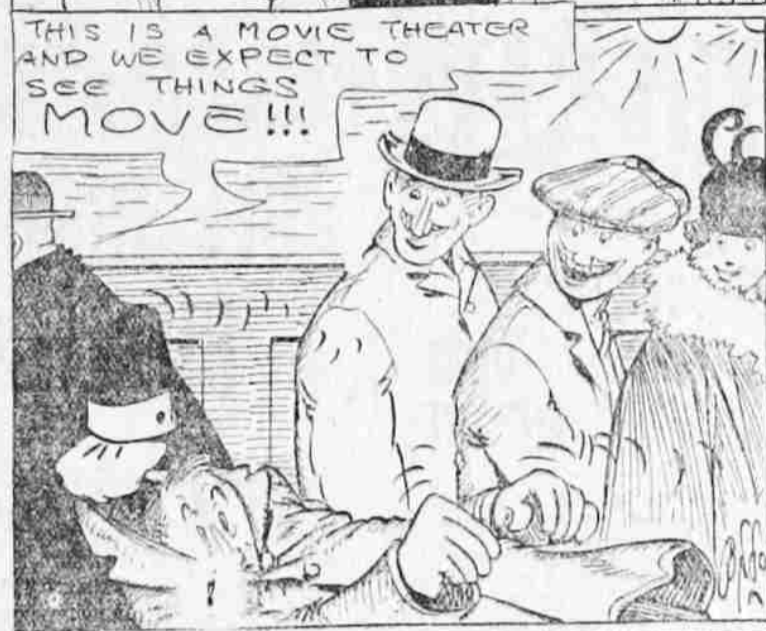

One Thousand Notables Eat War Food at Hoover's N. Y. Dinner

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—One thousand of New York's men and women of wealth paid one thousand dollars or more each last night to sit at a plain board table and eat boiled rice.

The "banquet" was a testimonial arranged by Herbert Hoover, chairman of the European relief council, of America's efforts to succor the 3,500,000 starving children of Europe.

of \$25,000,000 was launched, stood at the head of the speaker's table. Mr. Hoover said, in part: "So long as any person in this nation can entertain an automobile, he can entertain an invisible guest. There are 4,000,000 automobiles and only 3,500,000 guests. Since this nation is spending a billion dollars annually supporting automobiles, another billion on ice cream, cosmetics and chewing gum, a few billion more on drinks, tobacco and other luxuries, it has not reached a point of destitution that warrants refusal to buy happiness and cheerfulness for this mass of children."

Mr. Hoover announced after the dinner that the 1000 guests paid \$2,911,221, or more than \$2000 a plate.

JURY CONVICTS THIRD GANGSTER

Two Others Accused of Attacks on Girls Will Face Trial Quickly

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 30.—James Carey, third of a group of five alleged gangsters convicted of criminal assaults on young girls here, was found guilty today a half hour before Edmond Murphy, the first of them, to face a jury, was started for the state penitentiary at San Quentin to serve a sentence of from one to fifty years. Carey's sentence was set for Monday, January 3.

JURY DECIDED QUICKLY. The jury took but six minutes to convict Carey. Sixteen minutes were taken by the Murphy jury and eleven minutes by the jury which convicted Edward (K. O.) Krivosky, the second of the gangsters to be tried. Krivosky will come up for sentence on Friday, when efforts will be made to obtain a new trial for him.

Carey admitted driving Miss Jesse Montgomery of Reno, the complaining witness, and her companion, Miss Jean Stanley, formerly of Portland, in an automobile from a cafe in the Mission district to a house nearby in which the attack took place. He denied participation in the attack, although positively identified by both girls and received the verdict without a visible sign of emotion.

INVESTIGATE ALIBI. Announcement that the grand jury investigation into attempts to establish a post-trial alibi for Murphy, "will be continued until indictments are returned or some decision is reached," was made here by Assistant District Attorney Stanislaus Hiley, who

SOCIALISTS OF FRANCE QUARREL

Right Wing Grabs Cash and Publishing Plant After Stormy Meeting

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—The United States is the "only strong spot in the depopulated capitalist world," Morris Hillquit, socialist leader, told delegates in a debate before the twelfth annual convention of the intercollegiate conference on labor and radical movements at their convention dinner here Wednesday night.

SOCIALIST VIEWPOINT. "The ultimate proceeding of Versailles," he added, "gave the first hint that international capitalism had lost the power to rule by its inability to act in concert." The league of nations, which he termed "the dull and ineffective debating club," he declared, further emphasized the "growing political impotency of international capitalism."

Despite the strength of the United States, Mr. Hillquit asserted, conditions here "are ominously unstable." Citing the changes in Russia and other European countries, he declared "capitalistic Europe is fast becoming socialist."

With Mr. Hillquit on the affirmative side was Scott Searing. The negative was argued by Dr. Talcut Williams, formerly of the Columbia University College of Journalism, and Julius Henry Cohen of New York.
