Former Minister at La Paz, Says U. S. Has Opportunity There

Splendid opportunities are offered for the investments of American capital in Bolivia which is one of the greatest mineral countries in South America...

RETURNS TODAY

Mr. Maginnis returned last night to Ogden from Salt Lake preparatory to leaving this afternoon on the Overland Limited for New York City...

RICH IN MINERALS

Relative to the mineral resources of that country Mr. Maginnis said: "Bolivia is one of the richest mineral countries in South America."

STOREHOUSE OF WEALTH

"The interior is one tremendous storehouse of wealth awaiting the coming of American capital for its development."

The Standard Oil company is also doing considerable work in that country at present and it is reported that the oil indications point to Central Bolivia becoming one of the important oil producing sections of the world.

The present railroads are confined to those that run to La Paz and from La Paz to the Alti-Plano or high plains country. Ulen Construction company, an American organization is at present constructing a railroad from Atocha in Bolivia to La Quica in Argentine...

FRIENDLY TO AMERICANS

"The country of Bolivia is a very healthful one in which to live and the natives are especially friendly to Americans."

LEFT FOR PLEBISCITE

Before the war of 1879 between Chile on the one side and Peru and Bolivia on the other the Peru coast line included Tarapaci and Bolivia owned Antofagasta lying south of Tarapaci and north of Chile at that time...

Whichever country was to secure the provinces under the treaty of Ancon was to pay the other 10,000,000 pesos. Bolivia was not a party to the treaty in 1904 by which Bolivia gave up any claims to the seaport and Antofagasta...
