They had been confined in cells for 11 days after their arrest on indictment for the murder of Police Lieutenant Terrance Lyons, one of two policemen shot to death May 9, while investigating bomb explosions believed to be in protest of the Landis trades wages award.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Meir Steinbrink, the New York lawyer, who assisted Charles E. Hughes in the governor's aircraft investigation in 1915, was said today to have accepted an appointment by Attorney General Daugherty, as one of his special assistants in the prosecution of war fraud cases. In addition to his connection with the Hughes' inquiry, Mr. Steinbrink was employed as special counsel by the sub-committee on aircraft of the special house committee appointed to investigate war contracts in 1920.

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### PRICES OF WOOL GROWING STRONGER

BOSTON, May 27.—The Commercial Bulletin says: "The wool market has rallied again this week and prices show a slight advance in the seaboard markets. In the west there has been an excited and very strong market, typified best perhaps by the sale of some 20,000 pounds at San Angelo, Texas, where prices, clean landed, varied from about \$1.20 for the best staple to \$1.35 for the best staple, up to \$1.52 in the grease. Prices have ruled high also for fine wool in the bright wool states, 50c having been paid for Delaine clips in Ohio. The edge appears to be off the western market as the week ends.
