KEMAL MAKES NEW DEMAND TIERNANS FAIL TO GET BLOOD TEST

POULIN CASE DECISION DUE ON SATURDAY

APPEAL IS LIKELY
Preponderance of Evidence Not "Beyond Reasonable Doubt" to Rule

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—Dr. Albert Abrams, California specialist, has refused to make a private blood test to determine whether John Tiernan, Notre Dame law professor, is the father of his wife's baby boy, who Mrs. Tiernan says is the child of Harry Poulin, haberdasher of South Bend, Ind.

NO NEW LEADER

WOMAN WHO KILLED INNOCENT MAN FREED
OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Sept. 27.—Mrs. J. C. Tolbert, who shot and killed Matt Green, an innocent bystander, here Monday when she went gunning for her husband, was exonerated Tuesday by a coroner's jury. The coroner's jury held that the slaying of Green was accidental and that Mrs. Tolbert was justified in trying to end the mortal existence of her husband, who she claimed sent her to the hospital with a broken rib as the result of a beating.

The woman fired at her husband when he drew up in front of their home in an automobile. Green, who was riding with Tolbert, stopped the car. He died before reaching a hospital.

CLOSE FRIEND OF PRESIDENT IS NOMINATED

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—United States Senator Joseph Frelinghuysen, friend of President Harding and one of the administration leaders in congress, was renominated by the Republicans of New Jersey Tuesday in a sweeping victory of more than two to one over George L. Record, a Jersey City lawyer.

OTHER WITNESSES
Sarah Warden, testified concerning Poulin's attendance at church on the nights when he is charged with having visited Mrs. Tiernan. The other witnesses, Vee Woodruff, a lumberman, testified concerning one of the bills presented as an alibi for Poulin.

**FEWER HOUSE BILLS
SEEN; MORE PASSED**
WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—More than 13,000 bills—13,711 by actual count—of all sorts and recognitions were introduced in the house since the sixty-seventh congress went to work in April, 1921. Clerks checking up today said that of this number, 10,657 were passed.

**COAST PEOPLE LOSE
MILLIONS IN MARKS**
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 27.—A canvass of bankers and brokers here made by the San Francisco Chronicle reveals that San Franciscans have lost at least \$25,000,000 speculating in German marks. The same source estimated Californians have lost more than \$100,000,000 as a result of the fall of the mark.

TURKS PLACE OBSTRUCTIONS ON PEACE WAY

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—It is unofficially forecast that the Kemal reply to the allied peace note contains conditions unacceptable to the allies, in that the nationalists insist upon the seizure of the straits for transporting troops to Thrace before the beginning of the peace conference.

TROOPS EMBARK
ALDERSHOT, England, Sept. 27.—Nearly three thousand soldiers of all ranks left here today for embarkation to the near east.

OUTBREAK HAILED
CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—A wireless message sent to Chanak when the Turkish nationalists occupied Kum Kaleh and other points in the neutral zone, was all that prevented an outbreak of hostilities between the British and Turkish forces. It was learned, Colonel Shuttleworth, commanding the British forces in Chanak, was about to open fire on the advancing Kemalists when he received an urgent radio from Brigadier General Harrington in Constantinople, instructing him to suspend the attack until all peaceful measures were exhausted.

TROOPS CONCENTRATED
While the Anatolian cabinet, sitting at Smyrna, is completing its reply to the allied note, the nationalist army continues its feverish concentration of troops on the Ismid and Chanak lines.

**SEARCH MADE FOR
EARLY DAY ESTATE**
MARYSVILLE, Cal., Sept. 27.—Attorney in King Gorman representing a sister of George Heckel, who died in San Francisco 23 years ago, have written to the postmaster here seeking information concerning a \$20,000 estate which his sister believes he left. Old residents here remember that Heckel had extensive mining interests.

**SPLENDID FUNERAL
FOR 'POOREST FISH'**
NEW ORLEANS, La., Sept. 27.—Jasper, "the poorest fish," purchased from the gold fish tank of a five and ten cent store, is dead at the New Orleans Press club. Brass hands have been retained for his funeral, which is being held by local newspaper men. Jasper had lived almost four years among college students and newspaper men. He died, it was announced, from eating too many mosquitoes.

**JAP CROWN PRINCE
MAY VISIT AMERICA**
VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 27.—It is possible that the crown prince of Japan, now regent of the mikado, may visit Canada and the United States next year, according to Viscount Matsudaira, master of ceremonies in the imperial household at Tokyo, who has arrived here from Japan. If the plan of travel which is being prepared is accepted, Viscount Matsudaira said, the visit probably will be made early in the year.

POPES URGES PRAYERS
An Encyclical from Pope Pius was read Tuesday in the Catholic churches calling on the congregations to pray for peace. On Sunday solemn high mass will be celebrated, followed by the late Pope Benedict's peace litany.

INSURRECTIONISTS MOVING ON ATHENS WITH WARSHIPS, LAND FORCES AND NAVAL AIRPLANES

Strict Censorship Keeps Details From World, But Enough Information Comes From Greece to Indicate Wild State of Affairs Obtains

LONDON, Sept. 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—Confirmation of King Constantine's abdication has been received by the British foreign office, it was announced this evening.

ROME, Sept. 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—Pope Pius today telegraphed Mustapha Kemal Pasha urging that the Turkish commander adopt every possible effort to avoid further bloodshed.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 27.—The Kemalists have added to their violation of the neutral zone by pushing forward three cavalry squadrons from Bigha to Kara-Buga.

LONDON, Sept. 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—Greece is in the grip of a revolutionary movement and King Constantine is reported to have abdicated.

**GHOULS OPEN GRAVE
AND CARRY OFF
GIRL'S BODY**
ST. LOUIS, Sept. 27.—Police today were investigating the disappearance of the body of Miss Cecelia Schneider, which was taken from its grave in Mount Hope cemetery. Sexton Robbins said he found an open casket with the lid lying near, half hidden in a clump of bushes, skirting the cemetery, and later found that the Schneider girl's grave had been opened.

**REDS URGING
WORKER CLASS
TO CHECK WAR**
MOSCOW, Sept. 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—Upon the heels of the Russian soviet note to the entente and the Balkan states on the near east situation, the third international has addressed an appeal to the workers of the world, urging them to do everything in their power to prevent the European imperialists as the appeal expresses it, from taking up arms and plunging southeastern Europe into a new and far-reaching war.

**CONVICT RIDES OFF
ON TRAINER'S HORSE**
SANTA FE, N. M., Sept. 27.—Ray Lloyd, a trusty at the state prison here, was assisting in training prison bloodhounds Tuesday afternoon. The bloodhounds "caught" Lloyd about five miles from the prison and the trainer, who accompanied the dogs, got off his horse. Lloyd mounted the animal, as the trainer's intention was that they would both ride the horse back to the penitentiary. Lloyd galloped away, however, and was still at large early today.

**CENTURY OLD FIRM
ENTERS BANKRUPTCY**
RICHMOND, Va., Sept. 27.—Baldwin, Brown & Co., Inc., dealers in hardware and building materials, have come into involuntary bankruptcy after operating uninterruptedly for 120 years. Business depression and other reversals were responsible, it was said. The petition filed in federal court listed the liabilities of the concern at \$54,478 with assets of \$13,234.
