

FRANK MONDELL DECREE DENIED IN EVANSTON TO STILLMAN

House Leader Who Seeks Toga Discusses Political Issues in Address

Baby Guy Is Legitimate; Banker, Not Guide, Held Father

EVANSTON, Wyo., Sept. 29.—A large crowd gathered Thursday to hear Congressman Frank Mondell discuss the political issues of the day. The Republican rally was held at the Strand theatre. Mr. Mondell said that he was glad to be home again after spending 18 months in the legislature. He staid on the job where his supporters expected him to stay and was new in the campaign. After 24 years in service he has been away only four days. He said people could not expect deep seated and long enduring ills to be cured in the 18 months the G. O. P. actually has been in power after eight years of the most extravagant expansion of credit this country has ever seen.

Continued from Page One saw Mrs. Stillman and Beauvais misconducting themselves in the mountains preceding the infant's birth in the Stillman summer home on the banks of the St. Maurice river in Quebec and on the banker's country estate in the Poconoc hills.

BORN IN WEDLOCK. "As the infant Guy Stillman was born in lawful wedlock the burden of establishing his illegitimacy is upon the plaintiff and the plaintiff must establish such illegitimacy by clear and irrefutable proof beyond a reasonable doubt," the report said.

"The presumption of fact of legitimacy is of the strongest known to law and operates to the disadvantage of the plaintiff unless it is overcome by evidence which is stronger. The burden of proof is upon the party asserting illegitimacy and the rule in a case like the present one has been declared to be that it must be shown beyond all reasonable doubt that the husband could not have been the father of the child."

PROOF IS MET. "It is claimed by the plaintiff," the report continued, "that during the period of Christmas of 1917 to March of 1918, the plaintiff and defendant were together at the home of the defendant at Pleasantville and there was no meeting at any other place which would have permitted the usual intercourse between a husband and wife."

"To meet this proof, evidence has been offered by the adult defendant that on January 6 and January 7 of 1918 the plaintiff and defendant were together at the home of the defendant, Pleasantville, N. Y., and between the 12th and 26th of February, the adult defendant, with his family, stayed at the St. Regis hotel in New York City and on one or two occasions the plaintiff was seen by the defendant at the hotel which led to her apartments, and the plaintiff answered a telephone call to the adult defendant's apartments. It further appears without contradiction that during all this period the relations between the plaintiff and defendant were most harmonious and pleasant, no proof being offered or claimed that at that time the plaintiff and defendant were not acting in their usual marital relations, and in October previous, it is established that the plaintiff and defendant occupied a room together at Lake Dawson, Quebec, at which time the plaintiff and defendant were together at the home of the defendant at Pleasantville, N. Y., and the plaintiff played the Victrola for the benefit of the defendant and the said infant and their relations were apparently most happy and pleasant. On the question of access, the testimony of the witness Clawson (H. Phelps Clawson), son of a wealthy Buffalo, N. Y., manufacturer and a friend of the Stillman children, strengthened by letters written by him setting forth the fact of the presence of the plaintiff at Mondanone, is most convincing."

DOESN'T CONVINC. "The evidence on the part of the plaintiff as to non-access is not satisfactory, is not convincing, and does not convince me. The plaintiff has failed to overcome the presumption of legitimacy and I therefore find the defendant, Guy Stillman, to be the father of the infant Guy Stillman and the adult defendant. "While the plaintiff's own misconduct precludes the granting of any relief from the action and while the adult defendant asks for no affirmative relief, but sets up the misconduct of the plaintiff as a defense only, the plaintiff asks for an adjudication that the adult defendant is the father of the infant Guy Stillman and for a finding to that effect herein. "The testimony adduced by the plaintiff in support of the charges, uncontradicted and unexplained, are sufficient to justify him in believing her guilty of the charges made against her. A careful examination, however, of all of the testimony has broken my faith in the testimony of the witnesses called on the plaintiff's behalf."

INDIAN MENTIONED. "It is claimed that there is evidence tending to establish misconduct between the adult defendant and one Fredrick Beauvais, a Canadian guide commencing at Lake Wyagmack, Quebec, in December of 1916 and continuing down until the early part of the year 1920, and witnesses are called whose testimony the plaintiff claims establishes the following misconducts: "About November 25, 1917, and during the week preceding the said date the adult defendant and the said Beauvais occupied a room together in the Blackburn cottage at Grande Anse, Quebec. "In the summer of 1918 the adult defendant and said Beauvais lived as a couple in the Blackburn cottage at Grande Anse, Quebec. "At the latter part of June or the fore part of July, 1919, the adult defendant and the said Beauvais slept together in Beauvais' room at Grande Anse, Quebec, and the adult defendant's clothing was kept in Beauvais' room. "In September of 1919, the said Beauvais and said adult defendant slept together in the White Cottage at Grande Anse and that at various times in the blue cottage at Pleasantville, and in the main residence there, and said Beauvais and the adult defendant were guilty of acts of misconduct. "In support of the above, and tending to show an adulterous disposition on the part of the adult defendant, the plaintiff produced a number of letters and a number of alleged acts and conversations on the part of the adult defendant are offered in evidence. "The defendant not only offers evidence tending to show the falsity of the evidence of adultery on the part of the plaintiff, but also tending to show that the agents of the plaintiff offered inducements of money, position, and to purchase clothes for willfulness if they would testify as to the misconduct between the adult defendant and the co-respondent Beauvais and the adult defendant on the part of the adult defendant to show that in December of 1918, the defendant did not stay at the cottage of the Little Lake Wyagmack, Quebec, but that on such occasion the adult defendant had taken the train from Little Lake

TESTIMONY SCOUTED. "The testimony of the witness admits to the effect that in November of 1917, he had creased a roller shade curtain and at night had peeped through the crease and saw the adult defendant and the plaintiff in compromising positions, is unlikely, unsatisfactory and when it appears from the testimony of the adult defendant's witnesses that there never was a roller shade curtain in the house and that the small room in which it is claimed the co-respondent slept was not at that time used as a bedroom but as a storeroom, the effect of this testimony is absolutely destroyed."

ANOTHER PEEPER. "The testimony as to the occupancy of Blackburn house in the summer of 1918 and as to defendant and to co-respondent sleeping together in June or July of 1919, and in September of that year deserves careful scrutiny. The witness Grenon testified that on 15 different mornings he peeped through the keyhole of the door of Beauvais' room and saw Beauvais and the defendant sleeping together. It is conceded by all parties that at the time mentioned the defendant was at the White Cottage mentioned by Grenon three nights only, and the couple with the testimony of Grenon and Page to the effect that they also gazed through the window of the room while they were standing on a scaffold, and that the greater weight of evidence shows that at that time no scaffold existed, and the fact that an observation made through the keyhole would disclose only the foot of the bed, together with the participation of Grenon and Ferdinand Page with La Fontaine in a room of the second floor of the Hotel Windsor at La Touze in a conference where arrangements were being made for the rooms adjacent to Page and Grenon for testifying, destroys all confidence in their testimony and in the testimony of the witness Page as to the adult defendant and the co-respondent occupying a room together in September of 1919."

MORE DOUBT CAST. "It appears that on most of these occasions the children and at times the witness Guy will always love his mother." A nurse who was present at the birth of Guy Stillman testified that Mrs. Stillman directed her to send a telegram to Beauvais in Canada, saying "Little Black Bear has arrived." Later, witnesses for Mrs. Stillman explained that she had agreed before the birth of Guy to send notices to several friends and to her children which would say "little white bear." If the newborn babe was a girl and "little black bear" should the child be a boy.

PHRASES OF LOVE. Mrs. Stillman presented as evidence letters offered as having been written to Mrs. Stillman by Beauvais. Purported copies of these contained many amorous phrases and references to Guy. French Canadian witnesses brought down from the province of Quebec were reported to have told of peeping through keyholes and windows at Mrs. Stillman and Beauvais in the months preceding Guy's birth. "Daniel J. Gleason, a resident of Buffalo, was later ruled out of the case as privileged between a physician and patient. A letter presented as being a "confession" by Mrs. Stillman to her husband, and written in a "moment of hysteria" before Guy's birth, also was rejected by the court as privileged.

GREAT DOMESTIC SCANDAL. Mrs. Stillman's attorneys tried to show that their client did not live with his wife during the year preceding the birth of Guy Stillman, and one of the witnesses called to aid in this evidence was Mrs. Percy A. Rockefeller, the banker's sister, and niece of the founder of the Rockefeller fortune. No domestic scandal ever created, perhaps, greater public interest than the Stillman case. Mr. Stillman filed his complaint in July, 1920, in the little village of Carmel, N. Y., and it lay hidden there unknown to but few. There were rumblings of discord in the Stillman family, however, during the fall and winter of 1920, and these were echoed in society magazines. On the morning of March 11, 1921, the story broke into newspapers, and from that time on thousands of columns of type were devoted to the case. There had been a hearing in December, 1920, but outsiders did not know it. Subsequent hearings also were conducted in private, but account of the nature of the testimony

Precedent Broken When Civil War Sailor Is Named Commander General Harington Leaves To Confer With Kemal On Situation (Continued from Page One) Britain has 11, Franco 7, Italy 4, and the rest are scattered among other countries. The journalistic assaults upon British headquarters have been so numerous of late that General Harington has established daily half hour councils with the newspapermen which are presided over by Major M. A. Johnston, who gained fame in the Mesopotamian campaign and subsequently made a sensational escape afoot for several hundred miles from a Turkish prison camp. General headquarters had occasion lately to complain of the exaggerated and inaccurate character of some of the reports which have gone out from Constantinople, and officials say that if this persists they may be forced to establish a censorship. General Harington and his staff get little time for sleep or leisure these string days. The commander in chief's usual office hours are from 7 in the morning until long after midnight. "When recently a London friend approached him expressing solicitude for his health, General Harington replied: "I'm fit as a fiddle. I swam the Bosphorus this morning at daybreak in 22 minutes." Several British armored cars of the most modern type rolled through the streets Thursday afternoon, giving the capital a vivid touch of war realism. The Bosphorus also took on a martial aspect when a giant airship carried over the country in the car. Inquiry transports passed into the golden horn.

DEL MOINES, Ia., Sept. 29—Installation of officers, elected Thursday and the adoption of resolutions for the coming year, were the main business of the annual convention of the Grand Army of the Republic to-day before adjourning their fifty-sixth annual encampment.

BIG ALIENY GRANT. Pending outcome of the case Mrs. Stillman was awarded alimony of \$90,000 a year, one of the largest alimony grants ever made in this state. She was allowed \$35,000 counsel fees and \$12,500 for expenses. Altogether Mr. Stillman was believed to have spent far in excess of \$600,000 in his divorce litigation. 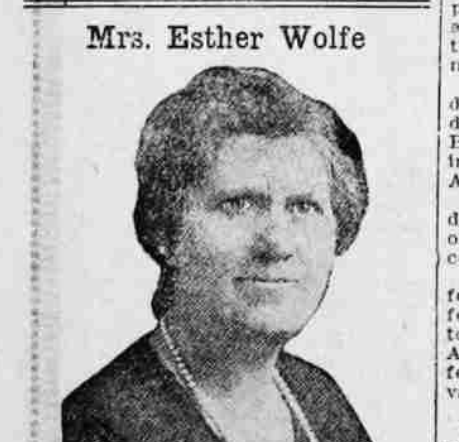
