Whole Family Asphyxiated

Retired at 11 O'clock Monday Night—Found Dead Between 11 and 12 O'clock Yesterday—Sister of the Husband and Father Has a Feeling That Something Had Happened—Goes to Home.

Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Smith and their four year old daughter were discovered smothered to death in their bed room, at their home about three miles north and east of town, at 11 o'clock yesterday, by his mother, who lives in one room of the house. The mother and child were lying in bed and Mr. Smith near the window where he had fell in an effort to get out.

As related by the mother, she had retired about 11 o'clock Monday night. They had taken a water bucket half full of red coals into the room with them. Tuesday morning she said she got up and looked into the bedroom, through a window, and seeing the mother and child asleep, thought they were just sleeping a little late and so did not go in. Near 11 o'clock she became a little more cautious, however, and entered the room finding them all dead.

The case was reported by Mrs. Claude Hitegan, a sister of the dead man.

Mrs. Hitegan went to the home of her mother and brother with a feeling that something had happened. The night before she said she had dreamed of her father, which is always a warning to her that some accident or trouble has beset their family. She notified the local Marshal, who in turn called Sheriff East. They, with County Physician J. M. Thorup, went to the place where it was absolutely proved that the three persons had met death by breathing gas that arose from the hot coals.

The bodies were brought to the Leo W. Gostes Undertaking Parlors last evening.

The woman was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Kemp of Lehi. She had been almost blind for some time, having had to be led about by her husband or others.

SCHOOL OPENS MONDAY.

The mid-year holidays for the school children end this week. Monday, January 3 the school bells will start calling the students to their work of preparing themselves for the trials of life.

During the past two weeks the various schools of Lehi have been thoroughly cleaned and the floors oiled. Within the next few days they will all be fumigated and put in condition for the next half of this school year.

The freezing and breaking of a water pipe in the Grammar grade building Sunday evening caused the gymnasium and floors below it to become flooded with water. Monday four men worked all night getting the water out. This will all be fixed up by Monday so that it will not interfere with the school work in the least.

City Officials Go Into Office Monday

Next Monday at 12 o'clock noon, the Lehi City officers-elect will take the oaths of office at the City Hall, and assume and receive the responsibility of the office. They will hold a get-acquainted meeting at the Commercial Club rooms Thursday evening, and discussed some of the most important problems, with which they will have to deal. Among these was the appointment of the different appointive officers.

The city attorney, justice of the peace and city marshal will likely be re-appointed, because of the good service they have given during the past year.

Lehi's Basketball team defeated the Payson High in the Smtin Academy Friday evening, making a third victory this season. They previously defeated Spanish Fork and Payson. The game was well attended and proved very interesting although Payson was not able to score a point in the first half while Lehi succeeded in getting 26. The Payson boys came back in the second half, however, and played a much better game, the score for this period being 14 to 16 in favor of the locals. The final score was 42 to 14.

Gray played a good game, getting 9 field baskets. Wanlass also helped the scoring materially by getting 14 out of a possible 19 points from the foul line.

Saratoga To Be New City

A new city, to be known as Saratoga, will be platted and laid out, in the near future, in the farming section adjoining Saratoga Springs. In the laying out of the town, according to the plans, sites will be reserved for churches, school buildings and hotels. The sixty acres lying north and west of the resort proper will be platted into town lots. The streets will be graded and lined with trees, and a boulevard will be made along the lake shore.

Part of the land is to be sold in ten and twenty-acre tracts for farming and gardening, and about 200 acres will be reserved by the Austin Brothers Association for a blooded stock farm.

The Salt Lake and Utah railroad will run a branch line from Kirkham to the new town, which will afford transportation facilities for those who live there.

Those who own lots in the new town will also be share holders in the resort proper, and participate in the managing of the same, and thousands of dollars will be spent on improvements, and in developing the natural resources of the country thereabout.

The new city will furnish a splendid refuge for the city business men, many of whom will make it their summer home.

Austin, head of the Austin Brothers Association, and Edward Southwick of Lehi spent Tuesday making a preliminary survey of the Saratoga farm. Mr. Southwick will be the company's agent here and will handle all the real estate deals.
