BODY OF LEHI SOLDIER ARRIVES FOR BURIAL

Funeral Services For Walter Edwards Who Died in France To Be Held Today.

The remains of Walter Edwards, one of Lehi's young men who gave his life for humanity, arrived home Tuesday evening from France. Funeral services, under the direction of the Lehi Legion Post No. 19, will be conducted today (Thursday) in the High School Auditorium commencing at 2:30 p. m.

Walter Edwards was the son of Mrs. Fannie Edwards, formerly of Lehi but now living in Milford, and was born here December 25, 1894. He grew up here and in 1918 entered the U. S. service and after short training was sent to France. There he contracted influenza and on October 26, 1918, died from pneumonia. Besides his mother, four sisters and two brothers, survive him.

All preparations have been made by the Legion members for a military funeral in honor of the great sacrifice the young man made for his country and people. An out-of-town speaker will be present.

STATE AND NATIONAL AID FOR PERSONS INJURED IN INDUSTRY

Principal Julius Banks is in receipt of a communication from the State Department of Public Instruction stating that any person who has been partially or wholly disabled in industry through accident or otherwise and who on that account is not able to follow his occupation to good advantage is invited to communicate with Francis Kirkham at the Capitol Building, Salt Lake City, and he will be instructed as to how he may be re-educated or re-fitted to go back to his former employment or to take up a new line of work.

Gov. Bamberger Issues Respite Pardoning Men

Haddock Brothers Released From County Jail This Morning.

Provo, Dec. 31.—Following what is presumed by Sheriff J. T. Williams to be the result of a plea on the part of their mother, Ben and Lee Haddock, brothers, sentenced December 24 to serve a term of 90 days in the county jail for having intoxicating liquor in their possession, were released from custody this morning by the sheriff on an order from Governor Bamberger.

It will be remembered that the two young men were arrested in Lehi last week at which time the sheriff and his deputies raided a distillery and confiscated the contents thereof, said to have been operated by these two men. It is further stated by the officers to have been the largest plant of its kind yet seized by the officers of this county. When the two men were taken before Judge James B. Tucker's court they pleaded guilty to the charge of having intoxicating liquor in their possession, and were sentenced to pay a fine of \$200 or serve 90 days in the county jail, which amount they were unable to furnish.

It is understood by those familiar with the situation that the Haddock boys were at one time employed by Governor Bamberger, who appears to be a close friend of the Haddock family. It is stated, too, that both are young married men of families and that their wives are solely dependent upon their earnings for support. It is also stated that Mrs. Haddock, the mother of the young men, was under the impression that they were hunting and trapping in the hills west of Lehi during the period that they were engaged in the illicit liquor traffic.

Following is a copy of the communication addressed to Sheriff J. T. Williams, signed by the governor: "You are hereby notified that His Excellency, Simon Bamberger, governor of the state of Utah, in exercise of his power to grant respites or reprieves in all convictions or impeachments according to section 12, article 5, of the constitution of Utah, does hereby respite and grant a respite in the case of Ben Haddock and Lee Haddock, now confined in the county jail of Utah county, Provo, Utah, and under your custody; said prisoners having been sentenced to serve 90 days by Judge James B. Tucker on Friday, December 24, 1920, upon conviction of the charge of having liquor in their possession. "You are notified that the sentence of said prisoners is suspended until the next session of the board of pardons, to-wit: the third Saturday in January, 1921."—Provo Post.

KENDALL CLAY BEDS MAY BE SOLD

Present indications are that the Kendall Kaolin clay beds, now owned by Bishop Lewis, Robert Fox, B. W. Brown and Fred Merrill, will be sold within a short time. As most local people know, these beds are located in Cedar valley several miles east of Fairfield and are of considerable value.

Montana mining men have had the beds under a \$50,000 option for several months and during the past two months have had ten miners prospecting the property to determine the extent and quality of the deposits. A series of cuts, tunnels and shafts has revealed an almost inexhaustible supply of a product declared to equal any in Europe or America. The main vein, which lies in blanket form from ten to fifteen feet thick, extends east

and west a half mile through the mountain and north and south indefinitely.

There are more than 1100 acres under option. The necessary work for patent has recently been done and an application for patent has been made.
