

Sale of Agricultural Seeds

The following law on the sale of seeds went into effect June 1, 1920: An Act to regulate the selling of agricultural seeds within the State of Utah, Passed March 13, 1919. Approved March 13, 1919. In effect June 1, 1920.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Utah:

Section 1. Statement on packages of agricultural seeds. Every lot, parcel or package of agricultural seeds offered or exposed for sale, or sold within this State shall have affixed thereon to the exterior cover, a plain, written or printed statement of the following facts:

(a) The commonly accepted name of the agricultural seed.
(b) The approximate percentage of weight of purity; by which is meant the extent to which such agricultural seeds are free from inert matter, and from other seeds distinguishable by their appearance.

(c) The approximate total percentage by weight of weed seed present.

(d) The number of each of the following named weed seeds or bulblets to wit: Canada thistle, morning glory, burdock, wild oats, tumbling mustard, quack-grass and perennial mustard in each one pint of wheat, oats and barley; number of each of such seeds in each one ounce of millet, and the number in excess of one of such seeds in each one ounce of white clover, sweet clover, red clover, alfalfa or any kind of grass seeds.

(e) The approximate percentage of weed clover seeds, dodder seeds and yellow trefoil seeds in alfalfa seed. The approximate percentage of Canada blue grass seeds, mouse-ear, blackweed seeds and red-top seeds in Kentucky blue grass.

(f) The approximate percentage of mustard seeds, cow-cockle seeds, annual ragweed seeds and sunflower seeds in small grains. The approximate percentage of thistle seeds, ragweed seeds, dock seeds and wild millet seeds in all kinds of grass seeds.

(g) The approximate percentage of all seeds, together with the date when the tests were made, the full name and address of the vendor of such agricultural seeds.

Section 2. Statement on packages of mixed seed. The mixture of agricultural seeds when sold, offered or exposed for sale as mixture within this State, whether in bulk or in packages or containers, shall have affixed on the exterior cover of the bulk package and plainly written or printed a statement of the following facts to wit:

(a) That such seed is a mixture.
(b) The name and approximate

percentage by weight of each kind of agricultural seeds present in the mixture.

(c) The approximate total percentage by weight of all weed seed present.

(d) The approximate percentage by weight of inert matter present.

(e) The name of each kind of weed seeds or bulblets present in excess of one seed or bulblet in each one-half ounce of such mixture.

(f) The approximate percentage of germination of each kind of agricultural seed present in such mixture by test, together with the date when said seed was tested.

(g) The name and address of the vendor of such mixed seed.

Section 3. When seed or mixtures exempt. Agricultural seeds or mixtures of seed shall be exempt from the operations of the provisions of this Act:

(a) When possessed, offered or exposed for sale or sold for either human or animal foods, provided the package or container is labeled "not suitable for planting."

(b) When sold to mills or merchants to be cleaned or re-cleaned and while held in storage to be cleaned or re-cleaned before being exposed or offered for sale.

Section 4. Sale of screenings—exemption—destruction. Screenings of weed seeds from agricultural seeds shall not be offered for sale or sold or given away by any person, firm or corporation to be used as animal food, except when passed over a second screen to be prescribed by the State Crop Pest Commission, but all such screenings must be burned or destroyed by the person firm or corporation doing the screening.

Section 5. Definition. The term "agricultural seed" as used in this Act shall comprehend and include all plant seeds commonly planted for economic or decorative purposes; and the term "weed seeds" when used in this Act shall include all seeds not generally and customarily planted for economic or decorative purposes.

Regulation No. 2. Size of Package to be Labeled. Every package of agricultural seed as defined shall be labeled as prescribed in Section 1 of this Act, provided that package weighing 8 ounces or less may be placed in a larger package containing more than ten pounds in total weight. Every vendor of seed offering for sale seed contained in such small packages shall keep them in the larger container until sold and shall also keep the proper label conspicuously exposed to the view of customers. Every seedman that makes up within the State of Utah packages containing 8 ounces or less of seed or importing the same must have his name and address printed plainly on every small package.

His name and address shall also be printed plainly on the larger package described above when such is used as a unit for labeling as prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

Regulation No. 3. Mixtures containing, or said to contain, one or more of the seeds listed under Section 5 above, will be subject to all the requirements of the law governing mixtures of seeds.
