ICE WILL BE HIGH

LABOR LEADER ASSERTS HIS INNOCENCE IN DYNAMITING

FRESNO, CAL., JAN. 15.—O. A. Tveitmoe, secretary-treasurer of the State Building Trades Council, declared his innocence of complicity in a national dynamite conspiracy, in his annual report, read before the eleventh annual convention of the council here today.

ITALY IS ARMING

Vienna, Jan. 15.—Considerable sensation has been caused in political circles here by some recent speeches delivered by Baron Fuchs, the clerical leader, who declared that Italy is arming against Austria and when the war in Tripoli is over, the king of Italy must either fight Austria or go into exile. Baron Fuchs also insisted that the intimate relations which have for so long existed between Austria and Germany are becoming weaker as the result of Austria's failure to support her ally during the Moroccan crisis. He likewise complained that Austria's relations with the Russian empire had not been well handled.
