

SEPTEMBER TERM OF COURT BEGINS

Three District Judges Begin Trial of Cases and One Jury Is Impaneled.

ALLEGED MURDERER PLEADS NOT GUILTY

Stanisa Mesich, Slayer of Herman Obradovitch, Will Be Tried October 2.

The September term of the Third District court began Monday, and the court vacation for 1907 is over. All four of the District court judges held court, but Judge Lewis disposed of only a few routine matters. He has no cases set for trial for some time yet.

In the criminal division of the court, presided over by Judge Armstrong, Stanisa Mesich, who slew Herman Obradovitch, his wife's paramour, in May, entered a plea of not guilty. His trial had already been set for October 2. He will be defended by Attorneys Soren X. Christensen and P. J. Daly.

James McVearney, accused of holding up the Onyx Bank saloon last spring, was to have entered his plea before Judge Armstrong, but it was deferred until Thursday. His trial is set for September 16, and is the first on the criminal calendar. Judge Armstrong's jury will report on that day. S. Dehn, accused of assault with a deadly weapon, pleaded not guilty. His case was set for September 24. Dehn is a negro.

William Thompson, pleaded guilty before Judge Armstrong to burglarizing Tom Taylor's place on Franklin avenue on the night of August 31, and was sentenced to serve three years in the State prison.

Important Case Continued. In Judge Morse's court the case of the Progress company against Salt Lake City, and a host of other defendants, which was set for Monday, was continued until September 25. This case involves water rights in Big Cottonwood creek, and is the case in which ex-Mayor Extra Thompson was fined for contempt of court last winter. The parties are not yet ready for trial.

Judge Morse resumed the taking of testimony in the case of the Union and East Jordan Irrigation company against the Richards Irrigation company et al., to settle disputes over water rights in Big Cottonwood. This is a complicated case and will consume much time of the court. Some of the testimony was taken before the court vacation began. It may take three weeks to complete the trial.

In Judge Morse's court the suit of Amos Gabbutt against Salt Lake City was dismissed without prejudice upon motion of the plaintiff. This case involved the use of waters from Parley's creek.

Sheriff Is Defendant. Judge Ritchie impaneled his jury on Monday morning, and a jury trial of the case of A. E. Snow against E. M. Weller, Sheriff C. Frank Emery and Deputy Sheriff Joseph C. Sharp, was begun. Plaintiff demands damages in the sum of \$3275, charging that the two officers, at the instigation of Weller, sold goods and chattels belonging to him under execution, which goods and chattels were exempt from execution.

From now on through the fall and winter all departments of the District court will be kept reasonably busy.
